"Indeed, who would ever believe it? Who would possibly accept what we've been told? Who has witnessed the awesome power *and plan* of the Eternal in action? *Out of emptiness* he came, like a tender shoot from rock-hard ground. He didn't look like anything or anyone of consequence—he had no physical beauty to attract our attention. So he was despised and forsaken by men, this man of suffering, grief's *patient* friend. As if he was a person to avoid, we looked the other way; he was despised, *forsaken*, and we took no notice of him. Yet it was our suffering he carried, *our pain and distress, our sick-to-the-soul-ness. We just figured that* God had rejected him, that God was the reason he hurt so badly. But he was hurt because of us; *he suffered so*. Our wrongdoing *wounded and* crushed him. He endured the breaking that made us whole. The injuries he suffered became our healing."

Isaiah 53:1-5, The Voice

"There is a balm in Gilead, to make the wounded whole; There is a balm in Gilead, to heal the sin sick soul."

An American Folk Hymn

God wills healing and wholeness. When God observes Evil destroying His good creation, He sends Jesus to oppose the Evil and restore the creation.

The early church believed that Jesus came to fulfill the promise embodied in these words of the prophet Isaiah. In Jesus, God comes to earth to share in our suffering, our pain, and our death. God comes to us, not as someone who dwells in the heavens—far removed from human affairs—but as a brother who has felt the rejection of others, the searing pain of the whip, the humiliation of the crown of thorns, and the agony of the cross. Here is one who has known death and yet lives.

Underlying the sermon series, *Second Chances*, is the belief that God takes our broken lives and through His Son makes them whole. Jesus' grace is at work in our lives—even before we are aware of His presence—forgiving us for the evil we have done and the good left undone. Jesus offers us the life we seek; if only we choose to follow Him.

This is why we are concluding the sermon series with a Healing Service on Sunday, September 15 at 8:15 and 10:30 a.m. Whether or not you worshiped with us during this sermon series, let me encourage you to come and take part in this Healing Service. For we are all sick—sick unto death—and only Jesus may make us whole. Isaiah is right: "The injuries he suffered became our healing." Jesus is the wounded healer.

What festering, life-sapping wounds afflict you? Bring them to Jesus on September 15th. Through Jesus, the wounded healer, our relationship to God, to the Creation, and to each other may be restored. For God always acts to build up, sustain, and heal the Creation. Isn't God great? Pastor Daryl

She married Jim R. Hill in Wood River on Dec. 21, 1957. He passed away June 26, 1987.

Marilyn worked as a children's librarian at the East Alton Library and as a Jr. High English teacher for the Roxana school district. She was a founding member of the Riverwind Storytellers and was an avid St. Louis Cardinals fan.

Survivors include two daughters, Alicia (John) Webb of Benton, MO and Lori (David) Kamp of East Alton; two sons, Andy (Tracie) Hill of Boise, ID and Jay Hill of Jasper, GA; a daughter-in-law who was more like a daughter, Michele Denton of East Alton; eight grandchildren, Elijah, Rosie, Amy and Mason Hill, Timothy and Brandon Plummer, and Katelyn and Haley Webb; six great-grandchildren; & a sister, Elizabeth "Bibby" Kaminsky of Joplin, MO.

My sermon was based on Philippians 4. In particular, vs. 4: "Most of all, friends, always rejoice in the Lord! I never tire of saying it: Rejoice!" I observed that Paul rejoiced even when the world gave little cause for rejoicing. We have joy because Jesus lives; the victor over death and evil.

Marilyn Hill was someone who looked for the joy in life. I think that was why she was such a good storyteller. Her joy sold the story. I remember seeing the joy on my daughter's face in the midst of the *Bear Hunt Story*.

As she related her travels with her friend, I could see those journeys and later the memory of those journeys gave her great joy. The joy was there when she talked about her husband and her children. Even greater joy was present whenever she related the latest accomplishments of her grandchildren or the antics of her great-grandchildren. As sick as she was these past few months, she found joy in eating her chocolate chip cookies.

As Christians, we have joy because we worship a God of empty tombs and glad hearts. Our joy is a never ending stream flowing from the cross of Jesus. Our joy is a gift from God. So no one or nothing can snatch it away from us.

This joy gives us a peace beyond the understanding of those in the world. It is a peace that comes when we live in harmony with God and His plan for us. A peace that comes from knowing our life is secure with God.

Marilyn had this joy. She knew this peace. It is why until she became so very sick she joked with those who cared for her: with family and friends. It is why we were requested by Marilyn not to wear black today. Marilyn kept her joy so that others would see what it is like to walk in the footsteps of Jesus.

Marilyn believed that while this day would give us little reason to rejoice, Jesus always does! The story of the women testifies that Jesus is not rotting in the grave, but living in our hearts. Our Easter faith means that we look forward to life not death, dawn not darkness, hope not despair and love not hate.

Geoffrey Kennedy, priest and poet, wrote these words:

Peace does not mean the end of all our striving, Joy does not mean the drying of our tears, Peace is the power that comes to souls arriving Up to the light where God Himself appears.

Give me, for light, the sunshine of Thy sorrow, Give me, for shelter, shadow of Thy cross; Give me to share the glory of Thy morrow, Gone from my heart the bitterness of Loss.

Gone today from our hearts is the bitterness of loss because dwelling there is the peace that passes all understanding. The peace that assures us Marilyn lives and one day we shall see her again. Then, we will whoop and holler and hug each other and listen intently as Marilyn leads us on a bear hunt once more

BODY * MIND * SPIRIT:

This month's newsletter will be a hodgepodge of information that has been coming in to my office over the past few months. I think that each piece of information needs to be mentioned, as all have something important for different people in the congregation. It is my hope that each of you find something useful to use, share, or put into practice.

<u>Tanning</u>: A recent study found that 30% of teenage high school students are using tanning beds, despite warnings that it increases the risk of skin cancer. According to the cancer prevention division of the CDC, the risk of skin cancer, including melanoma, is increased among younger users and those who use tanning beds frequently. Dr. Melanie Palm stated that there is a disconnect in our culture between the risk of cancer and having a "healthy glow." She continued that parents need to be role models and educate their children about the dangers of UV exposure, to use sunscreen, and to try other methods of tanning, such as a tanning spray. Children should also be educated that cancer is not the only risk of tanning- UV exposure ages the skin and causes wrinkles and spots. Tanned skin is damaged skin.

<u>Kid's Backpacks</u>: Backpacks are designed so that the weight of the load will be equally distributed among the body's strongest muscles. If the backpacks are worn incorrectly, injury, such as sprains, strains, and other posture problems can occur. Children should never carry more than 15-20% of their body weight in their backpack. They should be taught to use both shoulder straps. Parents should adjust the load to keep the pack close to the back. Place the heavier objects in the backpack low and to the center. When lifting the backpack, bend at the knees. Carry only the items needed for the school day. If the pack looks to heavy, parents should encourage the child to carry some of the books in their arms to ease the load.

Concerns about BPA: BPA is found in polycarbonate plastics and epoxy resins. Polycarbonate plastics are often used in containers that store food and beverages, such as water bottles. They may also be used in other consumer goods. Some research has shown that BPA can seep into food or beverages from containers that are made with BPA. Exposure to BPA is a concern because of possible health effects of BPA on the brain, behavior and prostate gland of fetuses, infants and children. The FDA is continuing its review of BPA, including supporting ongoing research. In the meantime, if you're concerned about BPA, you can take these steps to reduce your exposure:

Seek out BPA-free products. Look for products labeled as BPA-free. If a product isn't labeled, keep in mind that some, but not all, plastics marked with recycle codes 3 or 7 may be made with BPA.

Cut back on cans. Reduce your use of canned foods since most cans are lined with BPA-containing resin. **Avoid heat.** The National Institute of Environmental Health Sciences, part of the National Institutes of Health, advises against microwaving polycarbonate plastics or putting them in the dishwasher, because the plastic may break down over time and allow BPA to leach into foods.

Use alternatives. Use glass, porcelain or stainless steel containers for hot foods and liquids instead of plastic containers.

The American Cancer Society is looking for volunteers to join their Cancer Prevention Study-3. They are recruiting men and women between the ages of 30 and 65. If you feel lead to volunteer, the sign up will take place on September 26th at Madison County Health Dept. from 10:00 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. For more information call 1-800-604-5888.



As a teen, she served as a youth group leader. "The church encouraged me to become involved in my community," she says.


