

It's Christmastime! I'm getting in the spirit. I've been listening for three weeks to the two Christmas radio stations in St. Louis. Also, we're preparing for my family Christmas gift exchange on Thanksgiving evening. (It's the only time that we are all together during this season.)

Now it is finally time to begin the celebration at St. Paul. We are lining up families to light the Advent wreath, planning the decoration of the church, and entering the home stretch in preparations for the Christmas Cantata.

For Christians, Christmas is the beginning of the Christian year. For us, everything we relish—namely, the life we have through Jesus Christ—begins with the birth of the baby Jesus. God-in-the-flesh appearing to reveal His love for us and show us the way back into His presence. Christmas is the Christian New Year where a fresh start is made available to us.

At Christmas, we have a message our friends and neighbors are anxious to hear. There is something within us that responds to the message of hope that the angel announces to the shepherds when Jesus was born: "Don't be afraid! I have good news for you, a message that will fill everyone with joy. Today your Savior, Christ the Lord, was born in David's city. This is how you will recognize him: You will find an infant wrapped in strips of cloth and lying in a manger." The single angel is replaced by a whole gaggle of angels praising God by say-ing: "Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace to those who have his good will!"

Charles Wesley captured this message of hope in his Christmas carol, "Hark! The Herald Angels Sing." Every day on those Christmas stations, people hear the hope that is proclaimed most prominently in the 3rd verse: "Hail the heaven-born Prince of Peace! Hail the Sun of Righteousness! Light and life to all he brings, risen with healing in his wings. Mild he lays his glory by, born that we no more may die, born to raise us from the earth, born to give us second birth. Hark! The herald angels sing, "Glory

to the newborn King!"

The greatest Christmas gift we may give our friends and neighbors is to invite them to come and see this for themselves. This Jesus born in Bethlehem. The One who gives us life. Pastor Daryl

Nurses Notes for December 2013

"Joy is the true gift of Christmas, not all of the expensive gifts that call for time and money. We can communicate joy simply: with a smile, a kind word, a kind gesture, a little help, forgiveness. And the joy we give will certainly come back to us! Let us pray that this presence of the liberating joy of God shines forth in our lives." ~Pope Benedict XVI~

Before the season of Christmas takes hold, sit down and reflect on what the holiday is truly about and how you can prepare yourself and your heart to truly enjoy the season.

- Start out by desiring to be the very best you can be- ways to keep yourself healthy and rested up for the activities. Spend some time outdoors in the
 sunlight or near a window on sunny days if you are unable to get out. It stimulates production of serotonin- a neurotransmitter responsible for mood
 stabilization.
- Get some citrus! Researchers studying depression found that certain citrus fragrances boost feelings of well being. Try dabbing on some lemon or
 orange essential oils.
- Walk- the rhythm and repetition of walking has a calming effect- it decreases anxiety and improves sleep.
- Stick with your routine and don't try to fit in more than you can handle: Is it really worth all of the running around if you are so tired or frazzled that you don't enjoy the activity?
- Forget perfection- you won't achieve it this side of heaven anyway! The world won't come to an end if your house is a bit cluttered, if dinner is a bit late to the table, or you don't get the front row seat at the Christmas program. Focus your energy on enjoying the people in your life.
- Be a picky volunteer: Take on one or two tasks and do them well.
- Let go of old customs: Have things changed in your life? The loss of a family member or friend, or maybe a new health concern prevents you from the old traditions? Then start a new tradition- one that can fit your life.
- Plan ahead: A six hour shopping trip may not be the best for you. Make sure that you know what the activity is before accepting to go along. Askmaybe family/friends can adapt the activity to fit your needs.
- Eat healthy! Use common sense to avoid over indulgence. Yes, eating is a part of the holiday celebrations but reason needs to rule. Do you really need a piece of every kind of pie? Is it really best for you to take a "little bit" of every dish? Those "little bits" add calories quickly. There is nothing joyful about a stomach ache, indigestion, or an increase in blood pressure or blood sugar. Pretend like your doctor is sitting next to you at dinner- and leave the big belly to Santa!
- Prepare! Advent is the perfect time to clear and prepare the way- for the true peace that only Jesus can give! Take time each day to sit, reflect and quiet your heart to reflect and prepare for the Christmas. How can you prepare? Ask yourself:
 - -Do I have any unforgiveness in my heart? Any feelings of resentment?
 - -Do I look down on others of lesser social standing or education?
 - -Do I constantly look for ways to be critical of others or their work? Do I enjoy gossip?
 - -Am I generous with the gifts that God has given to me; do I see myself as a steward of those gifts? Am I aware of the needs of others?

These and other questions can be advent "lights" to search our hearts- the hearts that God already knows and desires to transform. Then we can ask God to change our hearts and use us during the Christmas season to spread His light- the light of the gospel! Then go out with great joy- and give away some special gifts!

- A firm handshake or loving hug to a shaky soul
- A kind word to a lonely person
- A warm smile to the disheartened
- A sincere concern for someone troubled
- A feeling of compassion for the neglected

- A comforting thought for someone suffering
- A respect for the dignity of others
- A defense for the rights of those who cannot speak for themselves
- A word of witness to a seeking soul
- Do I look for ways that I can be on the "receiving" end and not the "giving" end.

This week as I rang the bells for the Salvation Army a young man walked up and asked what we were doing. My friend Amy, another nurse explained and he told her that all he had was his debit card but that he would be back. A few hours later he returned with a large cylinder shaped container filled to the brim with change. We thanked him and he replied, "Oh it was just in my room doing nothing!" How profound- the gift that he had been given was now being used to be a gift to others! As he walked away I called out that I hoped that God would truly bless him, and he smiled. I then thought to myself, he has been blessed. God blessed him with a generous heart! I will never forget that young man, his smile or his words. Oh that all of us could see our "stuff" or our coins in a jar like this young man- just sitting around doing nothing.

This December may all of us sit down and reflect on our own "lights" and how they can lead us on a path this Advent to the Star- settling over a tiny manger in a tiny town of Bethlehem. Receive the gift with open arms, and amazing joy. Celebrate!

• A total of <u>81</u> individuals, couples, and families have completed *Estimate of Giving Cards* to-date (<u>11/26/2013</u>).

• The total committed on these *Estimate of Giving Cards* to our ministry for 2014 to-date is <u>\$175,114.00</u>.



The Finance Committee and Church Council have decided that the **undesignated amount** of the Christmas Offering will be used for the general budget. The general budget provides the funds for the ministry and operating expenses of the church.

As always, you are encouraged to designate your Christmas Offering for missionaries, ministries, or projects supported by St. Paul. There is a Christmas Offering envelope included in your box of envelopes. You may also use any pew envelope to make the Christmas Offering. Simply mark the envelope as your "Christmas Offering."

Although your Christmas Offering may be placed in the offering plate on any Sunday or mailed to the Church Office, many people like to lay their offering at the feet of the baby Jesus during the March to the Manger. March to the Manger occurs during both worship services on Dec. 22nd. Some people choose to wrap their offering as a gift for the baby Jesus.

We say goodbye to our dear friend...







Patricia Jane Traitor, 64, went to sing in Heaven at 4:45 p.m. Wednesday, November 20 at her home. Born Feb. 23, 1949 she was the daughter of C. Wayne and Louise (Lewey) Thayer of Greenfield, IL. She worked as a risk manager at Wood River Township Hospital and Alton Memorial Hospital. Later she was a liability analyst for the Illinois State Medical Society.

She loved music and singing, and her beloved grandchildren. She was a dedicated member of St. Paul United Methodist Church in Rosewood Heights, and served as Parish Visitor.

Surviving are two daughters, Erika (Tony) Ramirez of Piasa and Tiffany (Jeremy) Nairn of Shipman; a stepson, Patrick (Carmen) Traitor of Jacksonville, NC; 3 grandchildren, Madelaine, Morgann and Mylie Ramirez; and a brother, Robert (Karen) Thayer of Bertram, TX.

Pat Traitor was not only a fellow worshiper, choir member, and friend, but also a colleague for those on staff at St. Paul. As a Parish Visitor, she made close connections with our older adults and those in the hospital. She told others that God had called her into this ministry. Week after week, I saw the enjoyment and fulfillment this ministry provided her.

Pat put a lot of thought into the themes for our 70+ Senior Luncheons. This year, she brought in a swing band, *Miss Jubilee & The Humdingers*, to perform. The Fellowship Hall was decorated like a jazz club and we served a supper club meal to all who attended. Miss Jubilee enjoyed the setting so much that she sang for an hour and a half. Pat knew how to throw a great party!

In her reflections on Pat's life, Marilyn Cisler, retired organist & choir director, said: "The song she and I most liked doing as soloist and accompanist was "Sweet Little Jesus Boy." She put so much feeling into this piece of music and I will have her beautiful voice and this song in my heart for the rest of my life." The Holy Spirit must have been at work because in my reflections on Pat's life, I said: "When Pat sang "Sweet Little Jesus Boy" on Christmas Eve the congregation grew quiet and no one applauded at the end. She so succeeded in conveying the awe, the wonder, and magnificence of that night that we all simply sat in stunned silence before the Christ child. That song—one of her favorites—showed me the depth of her faith. When she sang it you knew that Sweet Little Jesus Boy was her Lord and Savior."

A testimony to the impact of Pat's life is shown by the return of two former pastors, Rev. Ed Weston and Rev. Phil Gardner, to assist in the service. During the service, Rev. Gardner reminded us all of the assurance of eternal life that is ours in Jesus Christ. Rev. Weston lifted up the consolation offered to us in the Scriptures and his personal reflections on Pat's life.

We will miss Pat in our weekly staff prayer sessions. Prayer with Pat was always interlaced with laughter. Her last act of service at St. Paul was preparing the hotdogs for the Youth Chili Cook-off. Meanwhile, Harvey Chiles, our Music Director, is rewriting the Christmas Cantata because there is no one else to do those soaring soprano solos. Pat Traitor's death leaves a big hole in our ministry, but an even bigger hole in our hearts.

I leave you with a quote from Martin Luther that I shared during the celebration of Pat's life: **"You have as much laughter as you have faith."** Pat had bushel baskets of faith because she was filled with laughter. Her great gift was to make all of us laugh.
