¹⁵ For this reason, because I have heard of your faith in the Lord Jesus and your love toward all the saints, ¹⁶ I do not cease to give thanks for you, remembering you in my prayers, ¹⁷ that the God of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of glory, may give you a spirit of wisdom and of revelation in the knowledge of him, ¹⁸ having the eyes of your hearts enlightened, that you may know what is the hope to which he has called you, what are the riches of his glorious inheritance in the saints, ¹⁹ and what is the immeasurable greatness of his power in us who believe, according to the working of his great might ²⁰ which he accomplished in Christ when he raised him from the dead and made him sit at his right hand in the heavenly places, ²¹ far above all rule and authority and power and dominion, and above every name that is named, not only in this age but also in that which is to come, ²² and he has put all things under his feet and has made him the head over all things for the church, ²³ which is his body, the fullness of him who fills all in all.

Ephesians 1 (RSV)

What kind of memories does Thanksgiving evoke in the child in you? In grade school, we cut out turkeys from construction paper and traced our hand to provide the tail. At home, I recall the smell of turkey baking in the oven and mincemeat pies cooling on the countertop. Our cat, Boots, loved Thanksgiving because she loved turkey. Every Thanksgiving she paced in front of the oven impatiently waiting for the bird to be done so she could get her piece of thanksgiving turkey. I'm sure you have your own special memories of Thanksgivings past.

Every Thanksgiving season, my mother placed a cornucopia or "horn of plenty" as the center-piece on our dining room table. The cornucopia was a wicker basket shaped like a horn with fruits and vegetables flowing from it. It is an ancient symbol, going back to Greek and Roman times. In Greece, the goat Amalthea, whose milk fed the baby god, Zeus, was said to have a horn that what always filled with whatever anyone wanted to eat or drink. In Rome, the goddess of plenty, "Copia," always wore or carried a horn filled with fruits and drinks. Her magical horn of plenty was always full; its supply was never exhausted.

Paul gushes in the scripture passage above about the cornucopia of blessings made available to us through Jesus Christ. Like that cornucopia of mythology, God's cornucopia of blessings are never exhausted. Among the blessings Paul mentions here are:

1/The Hope To Which He Has Called You. Paul calls upon the Ephesians to see with the eyes of faith and claim the salvation that is theirs in Jesus Christ. In Jesus is found genuine life. The life that is worth living.

Paul calls Christians to live as people filled with hope. Hopeful because we no longer fear death. Our bodies may pass away, but our spirits live with God. We are Resurrection People who live in the light of the Risen Son. During this Thanksgiving season, let us give thanks for the hope we find only in Jesus Christ and the life He offers us.

2/The Riches Of His Glorious Inheritance. Paul felt that the things which once mattered to him, now seemed like garbage when compared to the riches of Christ. We don't need to hit the jackpot on the Alton Argosy, because the riches we enjoy are those that cannot be stolen, lost or gambled away. It is the love of God that we experience through the church. It is the knowledge that Jesus walks with us and, sometimes, carries us on our journey through life. It is the peace that comes from having a right relationship with God. It is the endless grace that grows more abundant as we

walk with God. These are the riches beyond measure and price. During this Thanksgiving season, let us give thanks for the riches that are ours because we have chosen to be disciples of Jesus Christ.

3/The Immeasurable Greatness of His power In Us Who Believe. So often it seems as though evil rules within our world and it doesn't pay to be good. Paul points to God's raising of Jesus from the dead and placing Jesus at his right hand as ruler over all as the greatest sign of God's power. We do not fully understand how this power works or why it doesn't always provide the things we want, because our vision is limited by this earth. Only in heaven will all this be revealed to us. We trust that somehow God is working for us to bring good things into our lives. During this Thanksgiving season, let us give thanks for God who uses His power to care for us.

Above all else, Paul calls for us to give thanks for Jesus Christ. Christ is our head while we who believe are Christ's Body, the church. Christ's presence fills the church and fits us all for heaven. While the Greek and Romans fantasized about a horn of plenty whose supply was never exhausted, we experience the overflowing and never ending blessings of Jesus Christ. Indeed, Paul says in Ephesians 1:3: "Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has blessed us in Christ with every spiritual blessing in the heavenly places." During this Thanksgiving season, let us give thanks for Jesus who is the only true cornucopia for us.

Bounty Sunday is a time when we as a church gather together to give thanks for the never-ending blessings that flow into our lives through Jesus Christ, our horn of plenty. We celebrate on Sunday, November 24 at 8:15 and 10:30 a.m. by sharing out of our blessings with others. Bring your offering of food on Bounty Sunday for our food pantries, Community Hope Center in Cottage Hills and Operation Blessing in Wood River. Bring your Thanksgiving Offering which (if undesignated) goes to our Helping Hands fund. Through this fund we assist our neighbors with rent assistance, utilities, emergency lodging, and gas. Nurses Notes for November 2013

"In everything give thanks, as this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus." 1 Thessalonians 5:18

Many people will plan for weeks for a job interview or a vacation but how about a trip to the physician? Planning before your doctor's appointment is one way that you can assist in getting the best care from your healthcare team. You are to be an active player on the team! Be prepared and begin by asking yourself the following questions:

What do I want to accomplish from the doctor's visit?

- to discuss a healthcare problem
- to discuss changing a medication

- to discuss a medical test

- to discuss treatment options

What questions do I have for my doctor? You will build a trusting relationship that leads to better patient satisfaction if you ask questions. Your healthcare is a team effort; it is not just the responsibility of the physician. Since time is limited at an appointment, you will feel less rushed if you are prepared with a list. Before the appointment write down all of your symptoms and you will not have to worry about forgetting something that you feel is important.

After the physician's exam and his response you made need to ask the following:

- what is my diagnosis (it is important that you fully understand the diagnosis)
- what are my treatment options? Is surgery the only option?
- what is this test for? What will the results tell me? Is it covered by my insurance?
- what is this new medication for? Why are you prescribing it?

If there is something you do not understand, or that you do not want to forget write it down- or have someone write it down for you.

Lots of questions and lots of answers! If you have trouble with hearing or vision, you may want to take someone with you- a family member or trusted friend to help you to get the complete message so you can make informed decisions. Do bring a list of current medications, and which doctor prescribed them for you. There can be many doctors on your health team, and they do not always communicate or share information.

Call the doctor's office if you experience any of the following:

- side effects from new medications
- if your symptoms get worse
- -if you receive new medications from other doctor to get test results (don't assume that no news = good news)
- -to ask questions about results that you do not understand

I hope these tips will be helpful when you are getting ready for your next doctor's appointment.

One other suggestion: Consider a healthcare binder. This could include yourself, or your spouse and children. It is an excellent way to have your records easily available for your primary physician or a specialist or surgeon. I know of some people in the community that also keep any results of lab work and other tests in their binder. It is also ready in case of an emergency. I hope to have a sample prepared and at each church and the village for review soon. It will at least give you an example and then you can personalize it as you think would best serve your needs.

During this time of year, let us remember to be thankful in all circumstances! A prayer to remember God's goodness.




November's Loose Change Project is the Mid-West Mission Distribution Center in

We say goodbye to our friend...

Billy Hugh Greer 87, died October 15, 2013. He was the son of the former Beulah Margaret Schroeppel and Hugh Hampton Greer. He was born September 15, 1926, in Collinsville, IL, where he was delivered by his grandfather, Dr. Gustav H. Schroeppel, at the family home at 317 West Main Street. His paternal grandfather was John Franklin Greer, an attorney in Whitehall, IL. His stepfather was Wilfred Davis (Whitey) Thorne.

He married the former Shirley Roberts of Granite City on February 7, 1948, and they had 4 children, Rebecca Dee Greer Tanner of Lakeland, FL, and sons Jon Jeffery Greer of Moro, IL and Victor Christian Greer of Collinsville, and daughter Constance Joanne (Jim) Hickerson of Hartford. Billy was also a father figure, friend, and mentor to our brother Darin McCall (Traci). He is survived by 11 grandchildren and 10 great-grandchildren.

He was proceeded in death by his wife Patty Ferris Fields, daughter Rebecca Tanner, son-in-law, Alan Arthur Tanner, daughters-in-law, Sue Miser Greer, and Linda Madison Greer, and granddaughter, Meghan Marie Hickerson.

Billy's earliest interest was in aviation, and he made his first solo flight at Lakeside Airport on Christmas Day, 1942. It became a lifelong habit to leave the family festivities every year on that day and go to the airport to fly. He received his Private and Commercial Pilot's licenses at Midwest Flyers School of Aviation, and his Instrument and Airline Transport Ratings at Parks Air College. He was a certified Flight Instructor and Airframe and Engine Inspector. In a lifetime of flying, he logged more than 35,000 hours of flight. He was a member of the Experimental Aircraft Association, Aircraft Owners and Pilots Association, and Quiet Birdmen, Professional Pilot's Association, and St. John UCC.

After graduation from Collinsville High School, he was accepted as an aviation cadet for pilot training by the Army Air Corps, but WWII ended as he began training, and he was given a discharge from the service. He then resumed his training on the GI Bill. He had been a Captain in the Civil Air Patrol: Illinois, Missouri, and Florida Wings. He flew ground and sea patrol with the Miami, Florida Squadron.

He worked for Eastern Airlines in Miami and St. Louis, and for Ozark Airlines. He had been a flight instructor at Lakeside Airport, flew the U.S. Mail out of Lambert Field on the old route flown by Charles Lindbergh, and was a corporation pilot for Fabick Equipment Co., Horseshoe Bend Corp., and Chief Pilot for Central and Southern Truck Lines. His co-pilot much of the time was life-long friend and former Military Flying Ace, Harold "Keets" Allen. He drove a big rig for Yellow Transit after he quit flying professionally. He kept a small airplane at St. Louis Regional Airport and continued to fly for pleasure after his retirement.

In my sermon I quoted this passage from Lane Wallace's article, "Eyes of a Child," in Flying magazine, February 2000: "I'll run my hand gently over the wing of a small airplane and say to him, 'This plane can teach you more things and give you more gifts than I ever could. It won't get you a better job, a faster car, or a bigger house. But if you treat it with respect and keep your eyes open, it may remind you of some things you used to know — that life is in the moment, joy matters more than money, the world is a beautiful place, and that dreams really, truly are possible.' And then, because airplanes speak in a language beyond words, I'll take him up in the evening summer sky and let the airplane show him what I mean."

Those gathered here have been impacted by the lessons Billy taught us through his love of flying: Life is in the moment, joy matters more than money, the world is a beautiful place, and that dreams really, truly are possible. To this I would add from my observation of Billy's children, grandchildren, and great-grandchildren: find what you are truly passionate about and do it.

Let us give thanks for all that we learned from Billy Greer. And let us thank God who made him the unique person we loved. Billy Greer wasn't perfect, but he didn't have to be because he believed in a perfect Savior who came to save imperfect people like him...like us. And, this is the promise: Those who die believing in Him shall be raised to new life. This promise gives us great comfort today.

For one day, we shall see Billy again and all those who have gone before us. We will join them around the throne of God singing: Lord, our Lord, how majestic is your name throughout the earth!

Sometimes in the church we get so caught up in our busyness that we lose sight of our mission: to make disciples for Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. For all the good we do in our time, we will have failed if our children do not have faith!

One of the things we recognize at St. Paul is that one worship style does not fit all! While we are all wired by God for worship, we worship God differently. Being rather geeky, I admit a fondness for pipe organs. In my ministry, I've had only one appointment without a pipe organ. The rich, deep tones of the pipe organ playing the great hymns of faith lead me into the presence of my God. Pipe organs don't do much for our daughter, but Meg loves playing the drums in the youth praise band and singing with the **CRAVE** worship group. A Chris Tomlin song is more likely to prepare her for worship. It's a different generation.

Neither way of worship is more spiritual or authentic than another. It is simply different generations and different people choosing different ways to worship the same God.

As we have considered our future at St. Paul during the Long-Range Planning Committee meetings, there are several core values that have emerged (at least that I see):

A conviction that Jesus is the Savior of All Generations

A desire for St. Paul to be a multi-generational church

A shared appreciation across generations for the beauty of our sanctuary

A passion to reach the next generation for Christ

These core values are important; they unite us as a church in our mission to make disciples for Jesus Christ.

This month you have the opportunity to support our campaign to fund our ministry, *Generations of Generosity*. Although Commitment Sunday is November 17, you may return your *Commitment Card* on any Sunday or by dropping it off at the Church Office. If we value something in our life, we support it with our time, our talent, our gifts, our energy.

I have seen many evidences of this in October. The **CRAVE** group spent hours to plan and prepare for *Illuminate* on Oct. 13th. *Illuminate* was the unique service that had people weeping at the beauty and the moving of the Holy Spirit among us. Another group, led by Pat Traitor, spent hours planning and preparing to celebrate our 60th Anniversary on Oct. 20th. Kyle Norris interviewed people from all generations who told what they loved about St. Paul and shared their dreams with us. We remembered the Ebenezers along the way; our stones of help that remind us up to this point God has been with us. So why would God abandon us now. God is with us! As people picked up their Ebenezer prayer rocks, I felt the strong presence of the Holy Spirit among us. Completely different services but the Holy Spirit was present in both.

As your pastor, I recognize how difficult the changes have been for some at St. Paul. Times of transition are never easy. More than once, I wished I had Dick Young and Jim Nunn to help me. When I arrived at St. Paul, Dick Young shared that his prayer was for St. Paul to reach the next generation for Christ. He had been praying for a revival. Within the last two years, I believe that Dick's prayer has been answered as our young adults have risen up to lead us. Jim Nunn lectured me about the need to change the music in the second service. He was impatient with the slowness of our change. He wanted us to sing the songs of his grandchildren and great-grandchildren's generation. When Jim's great grandchildren request certain worship songs to be sung because they help connect their generation with Christ, I wish Jim were here. I'm sure he would not hesitate to tell me: "I told you so!" There are other saints who have helped me and prodded me during my time at St. Paul. All have shared a desire for this church to be all it could be. And all did not want their generation to be the last one worshiping at St. Paul. All wanted to be part of a multi-generational church.

Given where we are at in our faith journey, given the spirit of the worship services preceding the *Commitment Service* on Nov. 17th, it seemed the right time for us to celebrate *Generations of Generosity*. All of us are here because of the generosity of those who have gone before us. Those who follow us benefit from our generosity today.

Our church is like a family with multiple generations all living under the same roof. Like most families it is messy and sometimes we disagree and there is a crazy aunt or uncle in the mix, but we love each other. In this church, I see us loving each other with the love of Christ, praying for each other, thereby sharing our burdens, and worshiping together the one true God, the Father of All Generations. I look forward to all generations making their commitments on the 17th. It will be a glorious sight.
