Reality TV abounds with *makeover shows*. Whether it is our house, our restaurant, or ourselves getting a makeover we love to watch the process of transformation.

During the month of January, our worship services will focus upon *God's Extreme Make-over*. Galatians 5 provides a blueprint for the changes God desires to make in our lives. When our spirit is joined with God's Spirit, here is the fruit that is evident:

love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control.

As I have started thinking about this new sermon series, here are some ways God's makeover is like those reality TV makeover shows.

- It's hard to let go of the familiar. Even when something isn't really working, we hesitant to let go of the known for the unknown. Although the old menu isn't attracting customers, chefs are still reluctant to adopt Chef Ramsay's changes on *Kitchen Nightmares*. Too often, we would rather cling to our old life filled with failures and sins than embrace the new life offered by Jesus. The old life may not be working for us, but it is comfortable for us.
- It's almost impossible to effect change without help. Even positive change is difficult to accomplish without expert assistance. Change requires a group effort. When we strive to make spiritual changes, we need the help of the Trinity: Father, Son and Holy Spirit. God does what we could not do. In Ephesians 2, Paul says: "We were dead because of our failures, but he made us alive together with Christ. (It is God's kindness that saved you.) God has brought us back to life together with Christ Jesus and has given us a position in heaven with him." The positive changes in our lives are the result of the grace of God at work within us.
- The makeover doesn't always last. When shows return to see how the makeover is faring, sometimes the business or person has regressed to their old ways. Often this is frustrating for the show's host who has invested considerable time and energy into the makeover. God must be disappointed and hurt whenever we abandon our new life and return to our old way of living. God has gone beyond investing time and energy into our makeovers. He gave the Son so we might change. Still, God doesn't give up on us. God always gives us another chance at a makeover.

It's January. You may be striving for a makeover by enrolling in a gym, following a new diet, or changing your wardrobe. I encourage you to go deeper than this. Go extreme by turning to God for your makeover. Unlike other makeovers which move from the outside in, God's makeover moves from the inside out. Until the inner self is changed, any changes we make are merely cosmetic. In Galatians, Paul contends that "Those who belong to Christ Jesus have crucified self with its passions and its desires."

This month, I invite you to enroll in *God's Extreme Makeover*. It's free. It's available to everyone. And, best of all, it comes with an eternal guarantee.





Nurses Notes for JANUARY 2014

HAPPY, HAPPY NEW YEAR TO ALL!

The New Year, like a new born child, is placed in our hands as the old year passes away. The days and weeks to come are God's gift; they carry God's blessing. As a blessing we welcome them. Our hope for the year ending is that all that was good in it remain with us. It is now time to look forward to another year of life- a precious gift from our Lord.



As we ring in the New Year, we also prepare for the winter months. Many of us look forward to bundling up in our scarves, hats and gloves and playing in the snow, taking a brisk walk, or maybe cozying up in front of the fire with a cup of hot chocolate and family or friends. However, winter can also be dangerous because of weather conditions and the hazards that come with them.

As temperatures drop, the risk for heart attacks rises for people with heart conditions and those who are involved in physical activity. When the temperature drops outside our blood vessels narrow to prevent the body from losing heat. This can put people with heart conditions and those involved with strenuous exercise at greater risk for a heart attack. 15 minutes of shoveling snow counts as moderate exercise. To protect your heart this winter, **follow these safety tips:**

- Stretch and warm up your muscles with light activity before rigorous activity such as shoveling snow.
- Stay warm. Wear a scarf over your mouth and nose to warm the air you breathe.
- Dress in layers.
- Instead of lifting a shovel, push it to remove snow. Pace yourself and take breaks.
- If your body is telling you to stop, then listen and stop.
- Change the batteries in your smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors. If they are over 10 years old, replace them. According to the CDC, most carbon monoxide poisonings happen in January.
- Have your chimney or fireplace cleaned annually.
- Check your furnace/heating system: Have your furnace inspected by a professional. A space heater can be the most dangerous appliance in your home.
- Prepare your vehicle: Have your vehicle serviced regularly. Check the tread and air pressure in the tires.
 Check the antifreeze, and wiper fluids.
- Check your fire extinguishers. Replace if necessary.
- Have supplies in your car in case of a winter emergency. Keep your tank full or near full in case of bad weather.
- Have a vehicle emergency kit in your car in case you become stranded.
- Focus on footware to prevent winter falls: Wear shoes with plenty of tread. Try to keep at least one arm free to help you maintain your balance.
- Be careful when getting in and out of a car: Always make sure your footing is secure before entering or
 exiting the car. Beware of ice stay on pathways that have been cleared and salted.
- Let someone know your destination and route and the time to expect you to arrive.
- If the power should go out do not use candles for lighting. Use flashlights instead.
- Get up early! If you stay in bed you will not experience enough daylight which can lead to feelings of depression.
- Get up and move to keep your mood elevated.

Winter can be an enjoyable time if you make safety a priority. Avoid rushing and give yourself extra time to reach your destination safely.

May God richly bless you this year.

your GIFT GIVES HOPE TO THE HOPELESS

"That's mine," says Monte Payne, pointing to a pretty brick bungalow. "Twenty years ago, I was homeless, on the streets, on drugs. I bought that home this year. God is good."

Monte traces much of his success to the Hoover Treatment Center at Theressa Hoover United Methodist Church. As the only licensed, faith-based provider of its kind in Arkansas, the center provides a structured, 24-hour, intensive residential and outpatient program for adults.

BRINGING PEOPLE OUT OF D ARKNESS

Thanks to the program, Monte realized he had to change. "I was dying spiritually."

Today, Monte works full-time as a counselor at Will's House — supportive housing for recovering addicts — and leads recovery meetings at the church.

"I lived in the dark," he said. "Now I live in the light."
