And I know that same faith continues strong in you. ⁶ This is why I remind you to fan into flames the spiritual gift God gave you when I laid my hands on you. ⁷ For God has not given us a spirit of fear and timidity, but of power, love, and self-discipline. ⁸ So never be ashamed to tell others about our Lord. And don't be ashamed of me, either, even though I'm in prison for him. With the strength God gives you, be ready to suffer with me for the sake of the Good News."

2 Timothy 1:5-8

In our sermons, our prayers and our hymns, God the Father and Jesus the Son are often mentioned. Far rarer is the mention of the Holy Spirit. It is almost as most churches have decided that if you want to talk about the Holy Spirit you need to go to a Pentecostal Church.

Our summer sermon series revealed that the primary actor in the early church wasn't Stephen, Paul, Peter, Philip, John, or Lydia. Oh, they all had an important role in the formation and spreading of the faith. However, the primary actor is the Holy Spirit. Until the Holy Spirit arrives the followers of Jesus are hopeless and hapless. Afterwards, they are filled with a holy boldness.

The Spirit fills their preaching. The Spirit directs where they go. The Spirit expands their mission from the Jews to the Gentiles. The Spirit gives them power. The Spirit kick starts the Church and fills all those who are baptized. Without the presence of the Holy Spirit, not much would happen in the Book of Acts.

That is why Luke repeats the command of Jesus in the first few verses of his book: "Once when he [Jesus] was eating with them, he commanded them, "Do not leave Jerusalem until the Father sends you the gift he promised, as I told you before. John baptized with water, but in just a few days you will be baptized with the Holy Spirit." Acts 1 Jesus wanted his followers to hang around and wait for the Holy Spirit because without it they could not complete their mission.

In his instructions to Timothy, Paul underlines how crucial the Holy Spirit is to the beginning and sustaining of faith and ministry. Only with the Holy Spirit roaring like a bonfire may Timothy carry on Paul's ministry. All of us are here at St. Paul not by our own virtue, but because when the Holy Spirit nudged us we moved forward to be baptized. And, when the Holy Spirit entered where only sin dwelt before in our lives, we found the courage and the power to do the task that the Spirit placed before us.

We cannot be all that Jesus wants us to be and do all that we are meant to do without the presence, guidance and power of the Holy Spirit. That in a nutshell is the message of our next sermon series, *When God's Spirit Moves*, which begins Sunday, September 21st. I hope to see you in worship on the 21st at either 8:15 a.m. or 10:30 a.m. with a friend whom you have invited! Pastor Daryl








Nurses Notes for SEPTEMBER 2014 from Parish Nurse, Eileen!

"Dear friend, I pray that you may enjoy good health and that all may go well with you, even as your soul is getting along well." 3 John 1:2 (NIV)

It's official- we must soon get ready to say goodbye to Summer 2014. A season that was filled with BBQ's, church picnics and outdoor services, vacations, summer breaks for the kiddos, and Cardinal baseball games. Some parents have become empty nesters as they send off a child to college (sigh). I on the other hand, have one more year left, and am determined to thoroughly enjoy the time with my senior guy, Jonathan! Still, I say yay, autumn is near! No more sandals- or



worrying about pedicures and shaved legs! (Sorry gentlemen, it's a girl thing!) I am ready for sweaters and scarves and a chilly autumn breeze! But for those of you who will mourn the end of the season and try to cram in some more summer fun, here are a few things to think about!

It's really hot out there! We all like the sunshine but we need to stay safe. Consider the following:

- -Skin cancer is the most common form of cancer in the United States.
- -In 2010 (most recent stats available) over 61,000 people in the U.S. were diagnosed with melanomas of the skin and over 9,000 of those people died from the disease.
- -The most preventable cause of skin cancer is exposure to UV light either from the direct sun or artificial tanning beds.

The Basics: The two most common forms of cancer are basal cell and squamous cell carcinomas. They are highly curable if caught and treated early. The third most common is melanoma- it is the most dangerous and causes the most deaths

UV/Ultraviolet light: an invisible kind of radiation that comes from the sun, tanning beds, and sunlamps. UV rays penetrate the skin and can change the skin cells.

UVA: the most common kind of sunlight at the earth's surface. UVA can damage connective tissue and increase the risk of skin cancer.

UVB: Most is absorbed by the ozone layer. These rays help produce vitamin D in the skin and don't reach as far into the skin, but can still cause some damage. (We can get the Vitamin D we need from food!)

Excessive exposure to UV rays can cause sunburns, change skin texture, cause the skin to age prematurely, and lead to skin cancer. UV rays are also linked to cataracts.

UV Index: The National Weather Service and the EPA developed the UV Index to forecast risk of sun exposure. The UV Index predicts exposure on a scale of 1-15, and takes into consideration cloud cover and other local conditions.

When UV rays reach the skin (from sun exposure or tanning beds) the skin produces more melanin. Melanin is the pigment that colors the skin. It moves towards the outer layers in an effort to protect the skin- and this is what you see as a tan. A tan does not indicate good health! It is the body's response to an injury. The skin cells have signaled that they are being damaged. People burn or tan depending on their skin type and how long they have been exposed to the UV rays. Have dark skin? The sun's rays still penetrate deeply into dark skin and cause damage too.

Symptoms: A change in the skin is the most common sign of possible skin cancer. A new growth, a sore that doesn't heal or a change in a mole are some others. Remember the ABC's of skin cancer:

- A- Asymmetry: One half of the mole does not match the other half
- **B- Border irregularity:** The edges of the mole are irregular, ragged, blurred or notched.
- **C- Color:** The color over the mole is not the same all over. There may be shades of tan, brown, or black.
- **D- Diameter:** The mole is larger than about ¼ inch about the size of a pencil eraser; although, doctors are now finding more melanomas that are smaller.

If you find a worrisome change in your skin you should report it to your doctor. Alton Memorial Hospital also offers skin screenings the second Wednesday of each month at the Cancer Center. The screening is free; you need only call 800-392-0936 for an appointment. They do fill up fast! The next screening will be September 10th.

Please check the church bulletin boards for more information concerning sunscreens, myths about tanning, and the Surgeon General's call to action to prevent skin cancer. I will also have the UV Index posted. If you have other questions you can always stop by during office hours and I will try to get you an answer.

Enjoy what is left of this summer season- but stay safe in the sun! Have a great Labor Day weekend.







We say goodbye to our dear friend...



Born in Wood River on April 21, 1930, he was the son of William Crews and Minnie (Hamilton) Crews-Gimmeson.

A U.S. Air Force veteran, he worked 30 years as a mold maker for Owens-IL Glass, then became an AFL-CIO Community Service Representative for the United Way. He was later elected President of the Riverbend Growth Association and served until he retired. He was a member of the Mold Makers Union and an active member of St. Paul United Methodist Church in Rosewood Heights. On April 10, 1954, in Wood River, he married the former Shirley Calvin. She survives.

Surviving also are a daughter, Tracy (Tom) Scoggins of Rosewood Heights; son, Greg (Kathleen) Crews of Bethalto; four grandchildren, Jessica (Brent) Springer, Jacob Crews, Miranda Scoggins, Leland Scoggins; great-grandchild, Kansas Scoggins; two sisters, Maxine Burns of Waynesville, MO, Norma (Floyd) Dean of Oklahoma; and several nieces and nephews.

Preceding him in death were his parents; stepfather, Frank Gimmeson; grandson, Zachary Crews; and two sisters, Ruth Dreisbach and Velma Hutte.

As I reflected upon Bill Crews' life, the verse from Proverbs popped into my mind. Faithfulness captured for me what Bill Crews was all about. Here is a portion of what I shared at his Memorial Service.

"Many a man proclaims his own loving-kindness and goodness, but a faithful man who can find?" Proverbs 20:6 AMP

Bill Crews was not one to proclaim his own loving-kindness and goodness, but rather one who faithfully lived it. He served as an embodiment of this proverb. Indeed, what makes today so very difficult is that he would have been the one to guide us through this valley of life as he had done so many times before. He would have been the one to sit beside Shirley and comfort her, the one to be a steady presence for his children Tracy and Greg, and the one who was a fountain of encouragement for his grandchildren and great grandchildren.

Bill Crews did not proclaim his own loving-kindness and goodness because he was aware of his shortcomings. He knew he wasn't perfect. However, Bill also knew that his sins were forgiven. He came to church--not to show how good he was--but to proclaim how great God is. Every day Bill experienced new examples of God's loving-kindness and goodness. When I think of Bill, these words from Lamentations 3:21-25 spring to mind: "But this I call to mind, and therefore I have hope: The steadfast love of the LORD never ceases; his mercies never come to an end; they are new every morning; great is your faithfulness. "The LORD is my portion," says my soul, "therefore I will hope in him." The LORD is good to those who wait for him, to the soul who seeks him."

Bill was one who was ever seeking that closer relationship with his Lord, so more and more mercy would pour into his life.

I want you to think about this. All those words we have used in our mind to describe Bill were the result of his faithfulness. He was there for us; especially when we needed him. A faithful man like Bill is so very precious.

Bill's faithfulness in worship points us to a God who promises to never abandon us, but to be there for us. A God who promises to walk with us even through the valley of the shadow of death. A God who promises that even though Bill has died; yet he lives. Bill lives not just in our memories, but with the God who he loved. And, with all those who he loved and have gone on before him to God's house. *Continued on Page 12*

Wilford "Leon" Davis, 84, went to be with the Lord, 10:27 a.m. Wednesday, August 6, 2014 at his home with his family by his side, under the care of St. Anthony's Hospice.

He was born on February 6, 1930 in Hartford, IL, the son of the late Ray O. & Mable R. (Jones) Davis. He married Ola V. "Sally" (Hosford) Davis on June 7, 1952, enjoying 52 years of marriage. She preceded him in death in on December 16, 2004. He then married Betty J. (Elledge) Campbell on May 15, 2011 at St. Paul United Methodist Church in Rosewood Heights. She survives.

Leon served his country in the United States Army serving in Germany and recalled during the Korean Conflict. He was employed at Olin Corp. for 30 years, retiring in 1990 as the superintendent of maintenance. He attended St. Paul United Methodist Church in Rosewood Heights. I don't know why this person is restored to health while another one isn't. This I do know. Leon's death doesn't mean that God took his eyes off his back.

Paul is a sports junkie because he is referring to the footraces that many had participated in and all had seen. They would put the prize--usually a garland of olive branches--at the finish line as an inspiration for every runner to put forth maximum effort.

Instead of a garland of olive branches, there is a crown of righteousness awaiting us at the finish line. And, the Lord himself will place that crown upon our head. Now, this race is different because there isn't just one winner but many. In fact, all who confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, who receive his grace and eagerly look forward to his return...all these will receive a crown. No one will be left out.

When we moved here in July 2000, the nearest branch bank for us was located on West Florissant Ave. in Ferguson, Mo. Since the church still issues paper paychecks, sometimes I would deposit my paycheck at the Ferguson branch.

My cursory impression was that Ferguson was a lot like the neighborhoods on the south side of my hometown. It was racially mixed with small houses that often lacked garages. I guessed that most of the people were living from paycheck to

paycheck as we did. My impression was that with the well-kept houses and thriving business strip, Ferguson looked more prosperous than the south side of my hometown today.

I don't want to be another pundit commenting upon Ferguson when I do not live there. My heart has ached for the people of Ferguson. Those who have watched the stores where they worked or shopped destroyed. The parents who scrambled to find a safe place for their children to stay while the schools could not start classes. Those huddled in their houses at night hoping the violence would remain on West Florissant Ave. Those who hoped that West Florissant Ave. would be opened in time for the buses to run because they couldn't afford to miss a day of work. I have been praying for these.

And, yes, I have been praying for the family of Michael Brown. Only those of you who have lost a child can begin to know the depth of their grief. Also, I have been praying for the police officer, Darren Wilson. I doubt whether the officer intended to kill anyone that day. Regardless of where the evidence takes us, this is a great tragedy for all involved.

While we have an African-American president, the racial divide remains within our nation. As the Kerner commission noted in 1967, our experience of America is often dependent upon the color of our skin. I pray for a time when this is no longer so.

Finally, I pray for all of us. May we seek justice. May we strive to be peacemakers. Most of all I pray that there will be no more Fergusons. Pastor Daryl

Our church is participating in "Back to Church Sunday," part of a national movement of churches across America, which will be held on Sept. 21 at 8:15 a.m. & 10:30 a.m. Our church and service times are listed on their website, www.backtochurch.com.

National Back to Church Sunday is an initiative that is "Inviting America Back to Church." It seeks to reach the "un-churched" and "de-churched"—people who have never attended church, or who once attended church but don't any more—and invite them to return on Sept. 21. In 2013, a Gallup survey stated that 87% of people believe in God. Yet only 27% of those surveyed individuals attended church in the last 7 days. In addition, 82% of people who don't attend church say they would attend if invited by a friend, yet only 2% of Christians ever invite someone to church.

We are asking you to make a list of five friends, relatives, neighbors, or coworkers to invite to join us in worship on Sept. 21. First, pray over each person. Second, invite them to worship with you...offer them a ride.

Since its inception six years ago, National Back to Church Sunday participating churches have extended an estimated 8.5 million invitations to their churches. Over 30,000 churches representing 120 denominations are expected to invite over 3 million people to church this year.

There are nearly 100 million Americans, including teens and children, who are presently un-churched as people increasingly move away from attending church and practicing religion. Back to Church Sunday is not just a day—it is a movement to empower church members to invite everyone to come to church. It is designed to help combat the decline of evangelism and church



attendance by providing an easily implemented "invite-able" event that gives church members a reason to invite, and gives people a reason to try church again or for the first time.
