

Every year, I watch Charles Dickens' *A Christmas Carol.* Currently on my DVR, I have the version with George C. Scott as Scrooge. My favorite. And, every few years I reread the classic story.

My favorite line in the book appears near the end where a transformed Ebenezer Scrooge vows: "I will honor Christmas in my heart, and try to keep it all the year."

Most of us share this sentiment without the visitations of the ghosts of Christmas Past, Present and Future. Christmas carols seem too beautiful to be sung only during this brief season. Christmas trees too lovely to be taken down on New Year's Day. Christmas love too needed to be discarded after the Yuletide.

Although we attempt to keep the spirit of Christmas burning brightly within us, life has a way of dimming its glow. Come July we desperately need another infusion of Christmas spirit.

While Dickens does not explicitly say it, we honor Christmas by honoring the Christ child every day. Jesus is literally the embodiment of Christmas. God come to us. God with us.

The name of the baby, *Jesus,* means "God saves." Once more, God has acted to save us. When Jesus touches our lives, our sins are stripped from us, our hearts are renewed, and we are set free at last! Free to live the life God intends for us: Jesus' life.

In Ebenezer Scrooge, Charles Dickens has created a character who is so very much like all of us. I think that is why the character is so enduring. The question posed by Dickens is **which scrooge shall we be? The miserly scrooge at the beginning of the story or the transformed scrooge at its ending?**

The longer I live the more I learn that there is no success except from following Jesus' way, no beauty without Jesus' presence, no power except the power of Jesus' love and no peace except the peace Jesus brings.

Here is the truth spoken so long ago by the prophet Isaiah:

FOR A CHILD HAS BEEN BORN FOR ŬS, Á SON GIVEN TO US; AUTHORITY RESTS UPON HIS SHOULDERS; AND HE IS NAMED WONDERFUL COUNSELOR, MIGHTY GOD, EVERLAST-ING FATHER, PRINCE OF PEACE.

Long after the manger scene has been packed in its box and stored in the closet...long after the last of the pine needles has been swept out of the living room carpet...long after the last of the Christmas toys has been broken and tossed into the trash...the baby remains. And, wherever the baby abides--in church, in home, in heart-- lives Christmas all the year.

Charles Dickens ends his story by writing: "It was always said of Scrooge, that he knew how to keep Christmas well, if any man alive possessed the knowledge."

May the same be said of each of us. And so, as Tiny Tim says throughout the story: **"GOD BLESS US, EVERY ONE!"** Merry Christmas! Pastor Daryl








OUR CHURCH FAMILY & THANK YOUS!


REPORT ON "God Owns the Cattle; We Manage the Range!" COMMITMENT SUNDAY



Nurses Notes for DECEMBER 2014 from Parish Nurse, Eileen!

"Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace to those on whom His favor rests." Luke 2:14

Christmas is a glorious holiday in which we celebrate the birth of the Savior. We have much to keep us busy- parties, family, Christmas programs at church, caroling- many ways to celebrate. Yet for some it can be a time of sadness, loneliness, anxiety, and depression. Why is it that we have every good intention of having a Christmas season like the Maxwell House coffee commercials and the Hallmark Holiday movies but it never turns out to be that way? Because those are not so real and don't reflect real life. But take heart- we as believers can offer the love and peace of Jesus during this time of year.

Why is it such a hard time for many of us? Well, we tend to focus on our schedules, finances, our weight gain from Thanksgiving, (that is for all the women out there), and all of the things that we have to hurry and get done so we can enjoy Christmas! How about this year we try to focus our hearts and minds to anticipate the season with a quiet heart- a time to receive God's love and peace and be refueled to do the work He has called each of us to do.

<u>REST</u>: Rather than thinking of all you have to do this season, can you consciously slow down long enough to remember why (if there is a reason) everything needs to get done? Christmas was never meant to be a time of busyness, stress, long lines, packed to-do lists and running around like goose trying to get all of it done. Rather, it is a time to slow down and reflect on the greatest gift that we have received—the gift of a Savior, to a world that was previously without hope. To rest is to trust Him in all things, and to trust Him in all things is to rest.

RELY: With so much to do to prepare for the holidays, it's natural for us to rely on people around us to notice when we're overwhelmed, offer a helping hand, or just lend some encouragement and support. The problem is, at this time of year, everyone else around you is as busy as you are. These are the times to go to God in prayer and pour out your heart before Him. Scripture says God understands our thoughts from afar (Psalms 139:2) God is not too big to listen to our needs, even when we think they are not important. Everything about us is important to Him! When we depend on others for emotional support, or a kind word to keep us going, we tend to feel let down. But God, our Sustainer, knows and understands our feelings. Go to Him in prayer. Talk to Him about how you feel. Rely on Him for what you need. Relax knowing He hears, He cares, and He understands.

REFRESH: Are you tired and dragging? Take some time to read your Bible and be "refreshed". Let the Word be a source of energy for you. We are told that all scripture is God breathed (2nd Timothy 3:16) so get yourself a breath of fresh air each day! Start with your favorite passages, or pick up a Christmas devotion book and see if you don't get your second wind by spending time in the Word.

REMEMBER: When we remember what's most important in life it can keep us from stressing out. We were made to love God and enjoy Him forever. And Jesus said the greatest commandment was to love God with all our heart, mind, soul and strength, and love others as ourselves (Matthew 22:37-39). That means that all you think you have to do, and all the money you feel you have to spend, pale in comparison to the people right in front of you. As you start to stress, ask yourself this question: What is most important: the project or the people? The perfectly-decorated house or the kids who want me to play with them? The amount of money I spend on someone, or the time I'm willing to spend with them? Remember to ask yourself- is this something that I feel "called" to do? We are not all called to the same mission.

REFLECT: I am speaking to faith based communities- two churches and the United Methodist Village. Christmas is about the greatest gift you and I could ever receive—the gift of a Savior that God sent to this earth be a perfect example to us of living faith, to die for our sins and be the perfect sacrifice God required for our justification, and to rise again to conquer death and offer us life eternal. Because there was nothing we could ever do to deserve that gift, we accept it humbly and, out of our love for God and His perfect gift to us, we are to seek to love and give to others.

RESPOND: It is all about what we have been given, and what we can give to others. It doesn't have to be all about money or materialistic gifts. Maybe all you can give is some of your time, a smile, a soft comfy shoulder to lean on, and a word of encouragement. Ask God to help you find a way to give a bit of "you" to each person in your life-family and stranger that you may encounter. Sometimes they are "divine" appointments!

<u>REJOICE</u>! Emmanuel has come! This precious piece of news is all we need to have a celebration!

May your Christmas be one of **REMEMBERANCE** this year! Eileen

We Say Goodbye To...

Kyle Allen ''Al'' Trimm, 27, passed away suddenly due to an unforeseen medical condition. He was at home with his family. He was born to Mike and Karen (Ballard) Trimm on his mom's birthday, August 20th, 1987.

Kyle graduated from Civic Memorial High School (Class of 2006). He was an avid outdoorsman. He enjoyed hunting, fishing, and sand volleyball. He spent many a goose seasons with his Dad and The Goose House Gang of Southern, IL. When he wasn't outside, he was cheering on the St. Louis Blues and/or Cardinals or whipping up something amazing in the kitchen. Boy that kid could cook!

What he loved most was his family. His Mom, Karen; Dad, Mike; Sisters, Michele and Jennifer; and Nieces, Chloe and Baylee. He is also survived by his Maternal Grandma, Mildred Ballard.

Kyle will be joining the many that passed before him, including his Grandpa Bob, his Grandma Rossie and Grandpa John, his Uncle Dale, and Cousin Shawn. Kyle is also going to have his hands full with his Nephew, Mikyle Lee Trimm. Kyle will have him hunting and fishing in no time.

In addition to his family, Kyle is survived by many aunts, uncles, cousins, and friends.

Kyle Trimm died unexpectedly. Here is small part of the message I shared at his funeral service: If you come here today asking God why, you are not alone. And, in our faith, it is okay to ask the Why question. There is a whole series of Psalms that scholars label **the lament psalms** because they complain that the evil prosper, while the good suffer; that God's ways seem hidden to us, and that God seems to have quit caring for us.

The most familiar one is Psalm 22. Listen today to the first two verses of this psalm: ¹*My God, my God, why have you forsaken me? Why are you so far from helping me, from the words of my groaning?* ²*O my God, I cry by day, but you do not answer; and by night, but find no rest.* You might have remembered that Jesus speaks those words of the first verse from the cross: ¹*My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?*

King David—a hero of the faith—does not hesitate to complain to God here and later in Psalm 69: ³ I am exhausted from crying for help. My throat is hoarse.

My eyes are strained from looking for my God. We come here feeling like these: exhausted from crying for help, wondering *why* and hearing no good answers, no satisfying answers in return.

Sometimes, that's how life is this side of heaven. God isn't going to punish us or kick us out of His kingdom for asking the *hard questions*. Our faith is strong enough to endure the harsh realities of life. The inclusion of the lament psalms in our Holy Scripture is proof of this.

So if you ask me: WHY KYLE, WHY NOW—my response is I don't know. I'm going to add Kyle's death to all those that I plan to ask God about whenever I meet Him face-to-face. In this imperfect world, some very bad things happen to some very good people. To a gentle giant whom everyone loved. If there is a greater purpose in this, I don't see it.

But you know, I'm not God. My sight and my understanding are limited. Paul observed in I Corinthians 13 that: ¹² We don't yet see things clearly. We're squinting in a fog, peering through a mist. But it won't be long before the weather clears and the sun shines bright! We'll see it all then, see it all as clearly as God sees us, knowing him directly just as he knows us! ¹³ But for right now, until that completeness, we have three things to do to lead us toward that consummation: Trust steadily in God, hope unswervingly, love extravagantly. And the best of the three is love.

Until we reach heaven, we live with uncertainty because we aren't God and we don't see the big picture. Let me highlight for a moment how Paul says we shall live in the meantime because it does help us through this time of grief. First, we are to **Trust steadily in God.**

The wife of a Scottish Pastor died suddenly and, of course, he was devastated. When he returned to a pulpit weeks later, the first sermon he preached was called *But When Life Tumbles In, What Then?* Although the language is a little archaic, what Rev. Arthur Gossip says is timely for us:

I do not understand this life of ours. But still less can I comprehend how people in trouble and loss and bereavement can fling away peevishly from the Christian faith.

In God's name, fling to what? Have we not lost enough without losing that too? If Christ is right – if, as He says, there are somehow, hidden away from our eyes as yet, still there, wisdom and planning and kindness and love in these dark dispensations – then we can see them through...If Christ was right, and immortality and the dear hopes of which He speaks do really lie a little way ahead, we can manage to make our way to them...You people in the sunshine may believe the faith, but we in the shadow must believe it. We have nothing else.

We in the shadow we must believe the faith today because we have nothing else. Christ is the rock upon whom we stand to keep from slipping into utter despair. Christ alone comforts us by promising that as He cared for Kyle upon this earth, He continues that care in Heaven.

Paul says we **hope unswervingly.** In I Thessalonians 4, Paul proclaims: ¹³ Brothers and sisters, we don't want you to be ignorant about those who have died. We don't want you to grieve like other people who have no hope. ¹⁴ We believe that Jesus died and came back to life. We also believe that, through Jesus, God will bring back those who have died. They will come back with Jesus.

Our great hope is that Jesus is the Resurrection and Life. Those who believe in Him will be raised to new life. Our separation from this life we love is but for a little while.

Finally, Paul advises us to **love extravagantly.** Out of these three: faith, hope, and love, the greatest is love. Paul is certain of this. I always try to find a Bible verse or a portion of a verse that captures the essence of person. Michele shared this statement that captured the family's feelings about Kyle: **HAVING A SOFT HEART IN A CRUEL WORLD IS COURAGE NOT WEAKNESS.** All of us are gathered here because Kyle's soft heart made this world a little less dark, a little more friendly, and a lot less lonely. In this time of sorrow, we are thankful that with Kyle...we never left our love for each other unspoken. It was always there at the core of our relationship!


