"I give you a new commandment: love one another; as I have loved you, so you are to love one another.

If there is this love among you, then all will know that you are my disciples." John 14:34-35

Jesus did not have in mind a philosophical ideal of love that we are supposed to all subscribe to. No, Peter is to love John. James is to love Andrew. The disciples are to love the person beside them at the table during that Last Supper; the one who sometimes gets upon their nerves.

God's love is concrete—encased in the flesh and blood of Jesus Christ—who is the example for all of us. I John 3:16 says: "It is by this that we know what love is: that Christ laid down his life for us." In those moments when we are tempted to doubt God's love for us, we need look no farther than the dying form of Jesus upon the cross for the assurance of God's love

Our love for each other isn't a matter of thinking lofty thoughts, but rather of doing small, quiet deeds. It is taking a dish of food to a neighbor who just came home from the hospital, driving a friend to the hospital for treatments, sending a "Thinking of You" card to a friend. I John 3:18 reminds us that: "Love must not be a matter of words or talk; it must be genuine and show itself in action."

Christian love isn't an emotion, but rather a commitment. It is a commitment to be Christ towards each other. A commitment to open ourselves to God, so God's love might flow through us toward our neighbor.

Jesus understood how easy it is for the best of us to become self-absorbed in our own lives. How easy it is for us to live with little thought about others. Jesus wanted his community to be different. He wanted us to think first—not of ourselves—but of others. He wanted the mark of his disciples to be their love for each other and their love for the world.

And, it worked. Commenting upon the first century Christians, a Roman historian said: "OH, HOW THEY LOVE ONE ANOTHER!" Loving others as Christ would have us love them is hard. Through these words Dr. Karl Menninger, the famous psychiatrist, captured how hard it is to love:

PEOPLE ARE UNREASONABLE, ILLOGICAL, AND SELF-CENTERED. LOVE THEM ANYWAY.
IF YOU DO GOOD, PEOPLE WILL ACCUSE YOU OF SELFISH, ULTERIOR MOTIVES. DO GOOD ANYWAY.
IF YOU ARE SUCCESSFUL, YOU WILL WIN FALSE FRIENDS AND TRUE ENEMIES. SUCCEED ANYWAY.
THE GOOD YOU DO TODAY WILL BE FORGOTTEN TOMORROW. DO GOOD ANYWAY.
HONESTY AND FRANKNESS MAKE YOU VULNERABLE. BE HONEST AND FRANK ANYWAY.
PEOPLE FAVOR UNDERDOGS BUT FOLLOW ONLY TOP DOGS. FIGHT FOR UNDERDOGS ANYWAY.
WHAT YOU SPEND YEARS BUILDING MAY BE DESTROYED OVERNIGHT. BUILD ANYWAY.
PEOPLE REALLY NEED HELP BUT MAY ATTACK YOU IF YOU HELP THEM. HELP PEOPLE ANYWAY.
GIVE THE WORLD THE BEST YOU'VE GOT AND YOU'LL GET KICKED IN THE TEETH. GIVE THE WORLD THE BEST YOU'VE GOT ANYWAY.

This is what God did. God gave the world His best. He gave us His only son that whosoever believed in Him should not perish, but have everlasting life. There is no greater love than this!

Nurses Notes for MARCH 2015 from Parish Nurse, Eileen!

"By the sweat of your brow you will eat your food until you return to the ground, since from it, you were taken for dust you are and to dust your will return." Genesis 3:19

Well, I guess we were due for some winter weather and I don't even mind a little snow, but -5 degrees is just a little too cold for me. I am keeping my eye on March, which is fast approaching. Hopefully, it will come in like a lion and go out like a lamb. I trust that while all of you are staying inside to keep warm that you are spending some time during this 40 days of lent to reflect, repent, and pray- so that your hearts are prepared for our glorious Easter morning celebration!

Recently the parish nurses have had many questions come up concerning the recent measles outbreak. I thought I would give some information on the topic for this newsletter. According to the CDC, this outbreak started of all places in Disneyland. From January 1- January 28 there were a total of 84 reported cases in 14 states. The CDC reported that most of the cases are due to adults and children not being vaccinated. Measles are brought in to the country by people who get the disease while traveling.

Many people are asking if they need measles "boosters". Let's start with a bit of information on measles. Measles (also referred to as "hard", 7, 8, or 10-day, or red measles) is a highly contagious, respiratory disease caused by a virus, transmitted by direct contact with infectious droplets or by airborne spread when an infected person breathes, coughs, or sneezes. Measles virus can remain infectious on surfaces and in the air for up to two hours after an infected person leaves an area. (Think about that while you are out in the grocery store-use those hand sanitizers and wipes!) Typically, measles starts with a fever, runny nose, cough, red eyes, and sore throat, and is followed by a rash that spreads from the face, down the back and trunk, and then extends to the arms and hands, and progresses to legs and feet. The symptoms of measles generally appear 7 to 14 days after a person is exposed; however, the incubation period ranges from 7 to 21 days. Patients are considered to be contagious from 4 days before to 4 days after the rash appears. Measles can be very serious or even fatal. Serious complications of measles include pneumonia and encephalitis (inflammation of the brain). Rubella (three day or German measles) is contagious as well, but generally without the morbidity, except in the case of pregnant women. It is quite serious for the pregnant woman, as it may cause congenital defects in the fetus if the mother is exposed within the first 20 weeks of pregnancy.

A licensed vaccine to prevent measles was first available in 1963 and an improved measles vaccine in 1968. Vaccines for the mumps and rubella became available in 1967 & 1969, respectively. A combined vaccine, MMR (measles, mumps, & rubella) became available in 1971.

As of February 11, 2015, IDPH reports that ten cases of measles have been confirmed in Illinois this year. All cases reside in or are linked to a daycare in suburban Cook County. Onsets range from January 16 to February 7, 2015. Contacts to cases are being identified and actively monitored and additional cases may be identified.

Presumptive evidence of immunity to measles includes any of the following:

- Written documentation of vaccination with 2 doses of live measles or MMR vaccine administered at least 28 days apart
- Laboratory evidence of immunity (titer),
- Laboratory confirmation of disease, or
- Birth before 1957* -Prior to the vaccine, it was assumed that everyone caught the measles as it is 90% contagious if an unprotected person is exposed.

(*Although birth before 1957 is considered as presumptive evidence of immunity, in some circumstances a person may be required to show lab confirmation of disease—for instance—a titer. Healthcare providers & travelers may have to consider vaccination with two doses of MMR vaccine at the appropriate interval.)

In an interview with BJC Today, Rachel Orscheln, MD, Washington University Pediatric Infectious Diseases Specialist at St. Louis Children's Hospital, says, "The St. Louis area has avoided the recent measles outbreak so far, but it will take vigilance on the part of parents and physicians to keep it that way. The most recent outbreak, thought to have been triggered by an infected international tourist visiting Disneyland, has spread — mostly in California, home to a larger percentage of parents who don't immunize their children due to concerns about vaccines. Though measles was declared eliminated from the United States in 2000, public health officials and doctors fear that this serious childhood disease, along with others like polio and mumps, may reappear in a big way.

"These diseases are poised to make a comeback," says Dr. Orscheln. "Whenever the vaccination rates drop, diseases like measles and whooping cough make a roaring comeback. We've seen it in Europe and other places around the world." Measles is so highly infectious that an outbreak can build momentum quickly, Dr. Orscheln says. "It's very easy to catch. 90% of unprotected people exposed to it will become ill. It's airborne and unlike many diseases it's infectious before symptoms appear."

For many of you born before 1957 it looks as if you are in the clear as you probably had measles as a child. Although born after 1957, I had the measles vaccine and am protected, too. My concern is for the young children who are immune compromised, such as those battling childhood cancer- and for pregnant mothers. Many pediatricians report a growing number of parents who are declining to immunize their children based on misinformation or research from unproven sources. The evidence is clear that the outbreaks are spread from people not vaccinated. The CDC recommends that all children receive two doses of the MMR vaccine, starting with the first dose at 12-15 months and then a second at 4-6 years of age.

I hope that this clears up any questions that you may have about measles.

Stay warm. Begin your 40 day journey with Jesus. It will lead you to the cross- and eternal life with Christ!

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Pauline Shongo believes that one day **Africa University** will be the key to peace on the continent of Africa. The university, located in Zimbabwe and established by The United Methodist Church in 1992, draws students from all over Africa. The current enrollment of 2,000 represents students from 29 countries.

From the beginning, Africa University has been a place where dreams come true. "I think because of the diversity and the opportunity to get to know each other as friends we will someday bring peace to all of Africa because we have learned to love each other," said Shongo. A student from the Democratic Republic of Congo, she is majoring in economics and French.

In what seems a short 20 years, Africa University has grown from a school with classes in refurbished farm buildings to a world-changing university with more than 4,000 graduates throughout Africa and the world.

From its inception, we have enjoyed a unique and important role in Africa University. We built the bridge that enabled the construction of the university. We built the chapel where worship

services are held. Bishops and members from our Conference have sat on the Board of Trustees.



Now we are challenging ourselves to raise 1 million dollars to endow scholarships at Africa University. Our church will be asked to join others in the Illinois Great Rivers Conference in making a pledge toward the scholarship fund. A kick-off rally for our district effort will be held on <u>Thursday, March 19 at Nameoki United Methodist Church in Granite City at 7 p.m.</u>
