

"Why worship? I mean, really, why worship? This is the deeper question that is really asked by the rapidly growing population of spiritually yearning, institutionally alienated people in Western culture today. This group includes people with no religious preference and "nones;" but it also includes a multitude of formerly active church members who are stepping further and further from regular worship attendance. What is the point? Why bother? Does it really matter? If Sunday morning worship suddenly ceased in our neighborhoods, towns, and cities, would anybody really miss it other than a handful of professionals who live off the income it generates?

We believe that worship design will never be able to get on the right track unless it answers this fundamental question. It is really a pre-Christian question for postmodern times. All the classical theological and cultural answers to this question are no longer valid in the current environment of religious skepticism and irrelevant churches. Why Worship?

From the Introduction to <u>Worship Ways: For the People Within Your Reach</u>
By Thomas G. Bandy with Lucinda S. Holmes

I am part of a Clergy Covenant Group that meets weekly from Sept.-May. While about half of our time together is spent in prayer, the rest of the time we engage in Bible study or discuss a book. Our current book, *Worship Ways*, begins with the above quote and has sparked spirited discussion. Thomas Bandy is a longtime teacher and church consultant. Lucinda Homes is former executive pastor of worship at Church of the Resurrection near Kansas City and clergy coach.

Bandy and Holmes describe seven different worship options:

- Coaching Worship that gives practical advice for effective and fulfilling living.
- Educational Worship helps people make sense of the world. It explains, interprets, compares and critiques, and engages the mind.
- <u>Transformational Worship</u> brings people into direct and immediate experience of the Holy in such a powerful way that it dramatically changes or redirects an individual's life.
- <u>Inspirational Worship</u> is an uplifting experience that gives participants new confidence, courage, and optimism for the future.
- <u>Caregiving Worship</u> leads people to experience the embrace of God as a constant companion, protecting power, and generous benefactor.
- <u>Healing Worship</u> is an environment that helps people experience physical, emotional, mental, or relational wholeness. People come expecting miracles.
- <u>Missional-Connectional Worship</u> may be described using metaphors like "launching pad" and "action center," because the activities of worship are so closely tied to commissioning missionaries and supporting outreach efforts locally and globally.

In their chapters describing in greater detail each way of worship, Bandy and Holmes list those groups in our society reached by these seven options. Indeed, they contend that our worship ways divide us in our churches more than our musical preferences. Moreover, they claim that a church may only blend two different worship ways within a single service. Some ways blend together more easily than others. Finally, the more worship options a church is able to provide the more people it connects with God.

While I know that you don't necessarily read the newsletter for book summaries, I believe <u>Worship Ways</u> explains how our three distinct worship options at St. Paul reach three vastly different groups. Each service connects people with God in different ways.

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The 8:15 a.m. Sunday Service is Educational Worship. Bandy and Holmes state: "The formula of educational worship is continuity, predictability, and profundity." Many people find comfort and meaning in a fixed order of worship.

The 10:30 a.m. Sunday Service is a blend of Caregiving/Educational Worship. The greeting time is particularly important in caregiving worship. Bandy and Holmes observe that people leave their seats, cross the aisle, and especially greet visitors and new members. "Conversations may be brief but they are significant. They communicate concerns about life and death, health and happiness, peace and well-being, and do not just recite formulas or comment about the weather." Doesn't this capture this service?

The 5 p.m. Awakening Service is a blend of Transformational/Inspirational Worship. The typical comment of a person leaving this worship is *they felt the presence of the Holy Spirit or the service lifted their spirits*. This service is centered on personal testimonies that aim at the heart.

<u>Worship Ways</u> contends that a lot of our discussion about worship centers around elements that don't really matter: music, technology, architecture, presence of food, style of preaching, or whatever. Bandy and Holmes state: "The truth is that God can use anything, anyone, in any way in order to bless people and redeem the world." People often emerge from each of our three worship options expressing that God has used that service to bless them.

This I do know: we are wired to worship. Worship we will do—whether that is the one, true God or a pale imitation. That is why false idols are so abhorrent in our faith. As we continue our conversations about worship at St. Paul, it is important for us to consider this conclusion from *Worship Ways*:

"In the pre- and post-Christendom world there are only three things sacred about worship: **the experience of Christ, the blessing of Christ, and life with Christ.**Church leaders need to ask and answer "sacred questions" before they take on the awesome responsibility of designing worship.

What is the mission purpose of worship? What are the compelling reasons that drive specific groups of people to worship?

How does worship emerge from the spiritual life of leaders and deepen the spiritual life of seekers? What spiritual habits will be reinforced, and what positive changes to lifestyle will result?

How does worship drive people to serve in God's greater purpose to redeem the world? How will the community (or world) be any different because we worship?

Worship is sacred because Jesus Christ is really present. Wherever Christ is, people are blessed in special ways, go on to live differently, and pass the joy on to others."

I hope this exposition on worship has proved informational and helpful to you. My prayer is that God will continue to grow our church so we move from offering only three ways of worship to as many as we are able to support. There are people who need the experience of Christ, the blessing of Christ, and life with Christ. Too many people have decided that worship isn't worth the bother! Pastor Daryl



Nurses Notes for MAY 2015 from Parish Nurse, Eileen Cheatham RN, BC, B.S.N.!

We have been very blessed with some beautiful spring weather! It is so nice to wake up to the sunshine and the warmer weather- it seems to help everyone smile and enjoy their day just a bit better. May brings many celebrations this year- my youngest turns 18 and graduates from Alton High School, my oldest son will be 37! We all probably know someone going to prom this month, too! I will be busy with final plans for a graduation party which will be bittersweet. We will celebrate Mother's Day and Memorial Day- and then on to summer! God's creation will be in full bloom- and we all enjoy being in the sun- whether at Cardinal game, a trip to the zoo, or to the community pool!

So, I have one question for you. I bet there are some who can't wait to get out by the pool to get that "killer" tan. Or maybe you go to a tanning salon to get that golden bronze look. Please think again- because you very well could be doing just thatgetting a "killer" tan. Please read this before you go out to tan, garden, swim, mow, or just walk! Each year about one million people find out that they have skin cancer- that is about one in every seven Americans. According to The National Council on Skin Cancer Prevention, 85 percent of the cases were from damage that occurred before the person reached their 18th birth-day. Wow!

Let's start with a brief overview of the skin. The skin is the body's largest organ and its job it to protect you from heat and light, injury and infection. It has two main layers: the epidermis, or outer layer and the dermis or inner layer. The epidermis is made up of flat, scale like **squamous** cells. Under these are **basal** cells. The deepest part of the epidermis has **melanocytes**, which produce melanin which gives the skin its natural color. The dermis contains the blood and lymph vessels, hair follicles, and glands. Sweat is produced there and helps with body temperature control, and sebum which helps keep the skin from drying out. The sweat and sebum reach the surface of the skin through pores.

People get cancer when for whatever reason cells within the body begin to divide without any order or control. The extra cells can produce a tumor that can be benign (not cancer) or malignant (cancer) that can harm other tissues nearby and spread to other parts of the body. The two most common forms of skin cancer are basal cell carcinoma and squamous cell carcinoma. (Remember the cells that make up the skin?) These cancers are slow growing and rarely spread, and are rarely life-threatening, but early treatment is important because they can destroy surrounding tissue. My father died from squamous cell carcinoma because he did not seek treatment early and it did finally spread. A far more deadly form of skin cancer is malignant melanoma. The diagnosis of melanoma has doubled in the past 20 years. It can spread to the lymph nodes and then to other parts of the body.

Melanoma begins in the melanocytes. When your skin is exposed to the sun, the melanocytes produce more pigment, and that is why your skin darkens, or "tans." Melanoma can appear without warning, but 70% of cases begin in or near a mole or other dark spot on the skin.

Are you at risk? Anyone can develop skin cancer, but some have more risk factors: light or fair complexions, a tendency to burn easily, long periods of daily sun exposure, a history of bad sunburns, previous history of skin cancer or a family history of skin cancer, more than 50 ordinary moles or a history of abnormal moles, if you are undergoing any type of immunosuppressive therapy or take medications that interact with light to cause chemical reactions that increase sensitivity to light.

So what can you do to prevent skin cancer?

- 1. Limit your sun exposure between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m. when rays are strongest.
- 2. Cover up with hats that shade your face, neck, and ears- and with shirts and slacks.
- 3. Use sunscreens every day on skin not covered by clothing or a hat.
- **4.** Sunscreen should be at least a SPF (Sun Protective Factor) of 15. Apply it liberally 30 minutes before sun exposure and reapply every 90- minutes. Zinc oxide can be applies to sensitive areas like the nose, ears, cheeks and shoulders.
- 5. Avoid tanning beds and lamps. There is no such thing as a safe tan. Tanned skin means it has been damaged.
- **6.** Early detection: Look for the following symptoms in a mole, birthmark, scar or freckle:
 - A change in color or the appearance of two or more colors (colors can be black, brown, red, grey, or white).
 - A change in shape or an irregularly shaped mole.
 - A change in the surface, including scales, nodules or lumps.
 - A change in size or a mole bigger than the size of a pencil eraser.
 - A change in the borders or irregular, faded borders.
 - · A persistent lump or swelling.
 - A new mole.
 - A sore that does not heal or begins to bleed.

You may start to bring your items any time and no later than Sunday, JUNE 7th.




CAMPING...CAMPING... CAMPING

any of our six campsites. There are horse camps, treehouse camps, night owl camps, Bible camps, archery camp, sailing camp, just girls camp, and more.




