

Where cross the crowded ways of life, Where sound the cries of race and clan Above the noise of selfish strife, We hear your voice, O Son of Man.

Frank North was requested to write this hymn for inclusion in the 1905 *Methodist Hymnal*. Since North grew up in New York City, the words reflect the reality of ministry in an urban setting. Where cross the crowded ways of life. Isn't it interesting that we like so many United Methodist Churches are located on a corner? Intentional or not, we plant the cross of Christ at the crossroads of life.

Throughout the years, I have had so many people tell me that they attended Vacation Bible School or Sunday School at St. Paul as children. Or they were part of the Methodist Youth Fellowship or the choir. Their memories have always been fond ones of growing in their experience of God because of the love of Christ they felt here. That love did not float down from heaven, but rather was shared by this person or that person. You—the people—are the church!

For 62 years, we have planted the seeds of faith in the hearts of adults living from coast to coast. Our ministry has impacted the lives of these adults and the communities of faith to which they now belong. Would it be nice if they still lived in Rosewood Heights and were part of our church family? Yes, of course. In our mobile society, that is an unreasonable expectation.

So shouldn't we give thanks that we have lived out Paul's words in 1 Corinthians 3: ⁶ I planted, and Apollos watered, but God made it grow. ⁷ So neither the one who plants nor the one who waters is important because only God makes it grow. ⁸ The one who plants and the one who waters have the same goal, and each will receive a reward for his own work. ⁹ We are God's coworkers. You are God's field. You are God's building. (God's Word)

Over the years, our neighborhood has changed. Many union jobs with good wages have disappeared, so poverty has increased. Addiction to alcohol, prescription drugs, and heroin is more prevalent in our church community and our neighborhood. Rather than give up, we are convinced more than ever that Jesus Christ—the one who supplies the power to set us free from whatever binds us— is needed by all of us.

In haunts of wretchedness and need, On shadowed thresholds dark with fears, From paths where hide the lures of greed, We catch the vision of Your tears.

North believed that Jesus leads us to minister in the midst of human need. Whatever breaks Jesus' heart should break our hearts. The church exists to show the world a God who wipes away the tears of suffering and pain from our eyes. The God who in the words of Jeremiah 29 says: ¹¹ I know the plans that I have for you, declares the LORD. They are plans for peace and not disaster, plans to give you a future filled with hope. (God's Word)

As Wesleyans, we believe in the presence and the power of God's grace. We believe that no one is beyond the reach of grace and that grace may transform any life. Believing this, we don't give up on people or neighborhoods.

O Master, from the mountainside Make haste to heal these hearts of pain; Among these restless throngs abide; O tread the city's streets again.

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Till sons of men shall learn Your love And follow where Your feet have trod, Till, glorious from Your Heaven above, Shall come the city of our God!

We have all heard the saying "*It's not over until it's over*." Before Jesus went to be with God the Father, He left these explicit instructions for the disciples in Matthew 28: "*All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me*.¹⁹ So wherever you go, make disciples of all nations: Baptize them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.²⁰ Teach them to do everything I have commanded you. "And remember that I am always with you until the end of time." (God's Word)

We believe God isn't finished with us yet! When the Young Adults approached me with the idea of starting the *Awakening* service on Saturdays, there was no *rational reason* given for doing this. They simply said: *"The Holy Spirit is leading us to do this."* This isn't to say that the Holy Spirit isn't present in our other worship services, but only to affirm that the *Holy Spirit* is leading us in new directions so we might reach new people. During the *Awakening* services, we have been moved as speaker after speaker has testified how God's grace has carried them through rough patches in their lives. We are not permitted to rest until all know this grace.

I realize that the church is not a building but a people. Our beginning in the basement of Zike's Drug Store is proof of this. Our building is a resource for ministry for the church and a meeting place for the community. It was easy for us physically to start the *Awakening* service because we had the stage with its spotlights. The Cub Scouts and Boy Scouts are able to host regional gatherings because we have the room for multiple small groups. The Food Coop provides low cost food because we offer a free space to meet. In recent years, we have been able to dedicate a room for use by the Craft Ladies. My point is that we possess a building that is adaptable to the needs of ministry in the 21st Century. A building that we could not afford today but is the legacy of the faithfulness of the generations who have gone before.

As we continue to consider how best to address the physical needs of our building, we are going to immerse ourselves in a time of prayer. Using Mark Batterson's book, *The Circle Maker*, as our guide we are delving into a month long period of prayer. Through the worship services and the Sunday afternoon small groups, we are going to draw a prayer circle around our church's needs and our personal needs. We are convinced that God has great plans for us that may be accomplished only with His help.

Later, you will have an opportunity to consider the nuts and bolts of a possible Capital Campaign. Right now, I want us to join in prayer about our mission. It is important for us to bathe everything we do in prayer.

As we do this, I challenge you to ask these questions: Do we believe that it is important to have the cross standing at the crossroads of Airline Drive and Center Street? Do we believe that God is still working through us to accomplish His plans? Are there people in our neighborhood who need to experience God's amazing grace and are we willing to share that message with them? Are we prepared to make the sacrifice that ensures St. Paul is here until Jesus returns?

The cup of water given for you still holds the freshness of your grace; yet long these multitudes to view the sweet compassion of your face.





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Nurses Notes for SEPTEMBER 2015 from Parish Nurse, Eileen Cheatham RN, BC, B.S.N.!

"I am certain that I never did grow in grace one-half so much anywhere as I have upon the bed of pain." -Charles Spurgeon I am so ready to welcome God's season of autumn- how about you? I think that we are very blessed to live in an area of the country where we can experience all of the seasons, although sometimes our weather can get a bit extreme. Yesterday I mentioned to someone that fall was my favorite time of the year, and she replied, "Not mine. Everything is dying." I had to ponder that for a while. The season of fall is a dying process. The trees, flowers and grass prepare for the cold of winter. The leaves change to beautiful, striking colors- but then turn brown and brittle and fall from the trees. But God, in the middle of this process does demonstrate His creativeness by giving us a brilliant explosion of color in the process; and not only color, but the crisp air and even fall smells, such as burning leaves and bonfires, and fresh baked goods. Like nature, we also have those "fall" seasons of life. One of them is something that I have recently seen people struggle with, and that is chronic pain.

Chronic pain refers to pain that does not improve with time. It can affect any part of the body, or involve many regions of the body at the same time. Pain is the body's alarm system. Pain can come in many ways- and can be described as burning, stabbing, dull, sharp, or even throbbing. One thing we must remember about pain is that is cannot be measured. No test or device can measure how much anyone hurts. That is why many doctors agree that "pain is what the patient says." Because of chronic pain, many people develop difficulty functioning in their day to day activities, to the point of having a diminished quality of life.

There are many ways that the doctor and patient can work together to relieve chronic pain, or to make it more manageable: **Medication Management:** When used properly, some medications can reduce pain with limited side effects. Analgesics are the mainstay for pain management. Aspirin, Tylenol, and a group of drugs called NSAID's are the initial medications attempted. NSAID's include ibuprofen (Motrin), naproxen (Aleve), and celecoxib (Celebrex). Opioid medications are used to treat moderate to severe pain and can include codeine, fentanyl, hydrocodone, hydromorphone, and morphine to name a few. Opioids can have side effects such as insomnia, stomach upset, or constipation. Other medications used to treat chronic pain can include antidepressants, and anxiolytics- to improve mood and decrease the anxiety associated with chronic pain.

Alternative Methods: Sometimes called "complementary therapies", alternative methods have been successful is helping manage chronic pain. They include acupuncture, deep tissue massage, hypnosis, meditation (don't forget the power of prayer!), and biofeedback. These therapies can often help the person to relax and decrease tension, which can lead to a decrease in pain.

Physical Therapy and Occupational Therapy: Physical therapy can assist with proper body mechanics, posture and strengthening and stretching. P.T. will focus on increasing stamina and functioning to help with daily activities. Occupational therapy will focus on what occupies your 'time" during the day. The goal of O.T. will focus on creating balance between work, self-care and leisure activities.

Self Help Tips: There are many things that you can do to assist with the process of pain management. Exercise regularlybut start slow and easy and with your doctor's permission. Stay flexible- Yoga can be a great way to become more flexible and decrease tension. Lose weight- extra weight strains joints, muscles, and your back. Learn how to lift, sit and stand correctly-posture is important! Work with your doctor- always be honest about your pain! Some people are afraid to tell the doctor for fear of looking as if they are weak or "drug seeking." This can block progress towards relieving the pain. Work with a Pain Specialist- a pain specialist attempts to restore patients to their normal day-to-day activities, and is trained to treat the whole person, not just the pain.

The key is to be educated and responsible. It may take some time to find the best balance between what your goals are and the treatment to reach them. Remember that in today's world of modern medicine, you have a right to adequate and effective pain relief. Work closely with your doctor, the healthcare team and a pain specialist if needed. Also include your family and friends, and pastoral care for support.

We in this life journey have our "fall" seasons. God knew we would experience these. But I have witnessed many "fall" journeys, and one thing I have noticed is that God's magnificence can be seen in the midst of them. His love, grace and mercy shine through others that He has placed on our path- at just the right time. God is our healer, our hope, and life giver- but most important, our season changer! Rest in that knowledge during your season changes in life!



They had a profound time of prayer, and their experience was shared with thousands of other youth from across Texas in the form of a challenge in June 1990 at a large conference. More than 56,000 students on 1,200 campuses in Texas and three other states were documented at the first See You at the Pole[™] in September of that year. Since 1991, See You at the Pole[™] has grown to God-sized proportions. Within the first few years, the movement began to spread to other nations through missionaries from the U.S. Now

each year, more than 3 million students from all over the world participate in See You at the Pole[™]. Students in more than 20 countries take part. In places like Canada, Korea, Japan, Turkey, and the Ivory Coast, students are responding to God and taking seriously the challenge to pray. For 2015 the date is Wed., September 23rd! 





It is significant that Charles Tindley who wrote this glorious hymn knew his share of pain. An African American who was born to a father who was a slave while his mother was a free woman, his aunt raised him after his mother died at the age of 4. His father gave up custody because he wanted his son to grow up as a free man; not a slave.

Tindley taught himself to read and write and at 17 married his wife Daisy. They ended up in Philadelphia where Charles worked as a custodian of the John Wesley Methodist Episcopal Church. Called into the ministry, he continued working as a custodian while taking correspondence courses at Boston School of Theology. After his ordination as a Methodist minister, he served several churches in the Philadelphia area until 25 years after serving as custodian of the John Wesley Methodist Episcopal Church he was appointed its pastor. Noted for his powerful preaching interspersed with

the many hymns he wrote, the church rapidly grew to a membership of 10,000 people.

I mention this—not to impart a history lesson—but to remind us that so many of our hymns of faith emerge out of lives filled with hardship, pain, and questioning of God's purpose. As Christians, we say that we don't have all the answers. Instead, we know Jesus who is the answer. Jesus who is the Way, the Truth, the Life.

When Mildred insisting upon removing the pump that was dispensing the heart medicine supposedly keeping her going, the ER doctor said Mildred would not live long. As the weeks and later the months went by, Mildred often said "I don't know why I'm still here." I know that I, along with others here, would say: "Only God knows the length of our life. There is reason why you are still here."

In my office, there is a little plaque that says: **Each day is a gift from God. That is why it is called "The Present."** Maybe these extra days weren't a gift for Mildred as much as they were God's gift to all of us. Chloe and Baylee had a weekend sleepover, Mildred and her older brother had a great visit. She was able to celebrate one more birthday with her family.

Maybe God extended Mildred's time for us! To be a witness of God's faithfulness with **trials dark on** every hand. To be trusting in the Lord even when We are often destitute of the things that life demands, Want of food and want of shelter, thirsty hills and barren lands.

As Charles Tindley wrote and Mildred understood:

We are tossed and driv'n on the restless sea of time; Somber skies and howling tempests oft succeed a bright sunshine; In that land of perfect day, when the mists have rolled away, We will understand it better by and by.

Until that time when we reach heaven's shore and what is hidden is revealed, Mildred has reminded me throughout these last three months to: **trust steadily in God, hope unswervingly, and love extravagant-ly.** I along with the rest of our community will miss Mildred so very much. But I know that I will see her again: by and by.
