

Whether you watched the *Mission Impossible* TV show or the movie series, Jim Phelps on TV and Ethan Hunt in the movie go into a location where they hear a pre-recorded message on record/cassette/disc that begins with the words: *Your mission, should you choose/decide to accept it...and then here follows an outline of the mission, usually with pictures of the villains and the record/cassette/disk ends with these words...As always, should you or any of your I.M. Force be caught or killed, the Secretary will disavow any knowledge of your actions. This record/tape/disc will self-destruct in five seconds. Good luck, Jim/Ethan."* 

It was interesting to see that in the latest movie, *Mission Impossible: Rogue Nation*, Ethan received his instructions via a vinyl record in a record booth. Everything old is new again!

IMF stands for Impossible Mission Force although to my knowledge every mission has been successfully completed. No one's been captured or killed. Every impossible mission has become a *Mission Possible*.

Although it is clear that Jim or Ethan lead the mission, they never complete the mission alone. They rely upon a team of experts to carry out their piece of a finely tuned plan. There are strongmen (or women), techies, beautiful, distracting women, and others as part of the team. The suspense is provided by last minute obstacles delaying the completion of a crucial part of the plan.

At our Church Conference on September 27th, you approved a Capital Fund Campaign to raise \$575,000 to complete the projects listed under Priority One and Two on the Board of Trustees' list. For some this might seem like an impossible mission. Yes, it is if we attempt it alone. The impossible mission becomes possible only if we work together as a team. Unless everyone does their part, we will fail.

This is true whether we are raising funds to address the physical needs of the church or whether we are seeking to do ministry together. Paul observes in I Corinthians 12:12-13 (The Message):

Your body has many parts—limbs, organs, cells—but no matter how many parts you can name, you're still one body. It's exactly the same with Christ. By means of his one Spirit, we all said good-bye to our partial and piecemeal lives. We each used to independently call our own shots, but then we entered into a large and integrated life in which he has the final say in everything. (This is what we proclaimed in word and action when we were baptized.) Each of us is now a part of his resurrection body, refreshed and sustained at one fountain—his Spirit—where we all come to drink. The old labels we once used to identify ourselves—labels like Jew or Greek, slave or free—are no longer useful. We need something larger, more comprehensive.

Whether you love Barney played by Greg Morris or Benji played by Simon Pegg, we know that neither Jim nor Ethan could have pulled off their missions without the help of these lovable geeks. In the same way, St. Paul cannot be the church and accomplish all that God intends without the assistance of every one of you.

Paul's point is that no-one's contribution is greater than another's because all are empowered by the Holy Spirit. Everyone's contribution is needed for God's plan for the church to succeed. And, together what seems impossible to the world becomes possible because added to our efforts is the power of God!

Being the Body of Christ, the Church. Now, there is an impossible mission for you. For we are aware of how far we are from the perfection of God. Yet, that is what we have been called to be: Christ's Body in Rosewood Heights!

It only works like the carefully crafted plans of the IMF if we each do our part. Neither Jim Phelps nor Ethan Hunt accomplishes the mission on their own. It is the power of the team that brings success. In the same way, it is the power of the team that will bring success to our *Mission Possible Capital Fund Campaign*.

Well, we are now in to the beautiful season of fall. Have you made your fall bucket list of things to do? Let's see....visit a pumpkin patch, find your way through a corn maze, bake pumpkin bread, pick apples, have a bonfire (with s'mores), or go on a havride. But don't forget one more to add to the list-

#### get vour flu shot!

The CDC recommends a 3 step approach to fighting influenza, or flu. The first and most important is to get the flu vaccine. The second step is if you do get the flu get early treatment. This is especially important for the elderly and young children. Third, there are preventative actions that you can take to decrease your risk of getting the flu. Each year thousands of people die from the flu, and many more need hospitalization.

Please consider the flu vaccine to keep you and your family from getting the flu.

The symptoms of flu include: fever/chills, sore throat, muscle aches, fatigue, cough, headache, and runny or stuffy nose. The flu spreads from person to person contact with droplets from an infected person is passed through a cough, sneeze, or while talking. The flu can also be spread by touching something that has the flu virus on it and then touch their eyes, mouth or nose. According to the CDC, if you do get the flu, you can infect people as early as the day before you even start having symptoms and up to 7 days after becoming sick.

#### To attempt to prevent getting the flu here are some suggestions to keep in mind:

- Try to avoid contact with sick people. If you are sick, stay away from others as to not infect them.
- If your child becomes sick with the flu the CDC recommends that they stay home for at least 24 hours after the fever is gone. The fever needs to be cleared without the use of fever-reducing medications
- Cover your mouth and nose with a tissue when you cough or sneeze. Cover that cough!!
- Wash your hands. Seriously, wash your hands! Use an alcohol based sanitizer when water is not available. Keep some in your car, purse, or your pocket when you are out in the community. Don't forget vour workspace!
- Clean and disinfect surfaces and objects that may be contaminated with germs. Avoid touching surfaces when possible that may be contaminated with the flu virus from others- think door knobs, telephones, and elevator buttons!
- Know where your employer keeps supplies such as tissues, alcohol based hand sanitizers, and disposable wipes.

Jill Woodward, RPH, and owner of The Medicine Shoppe- Wood River will be providing the flu vaccines. She will accept most insurances, plus Medicare, and self-pay. Just bring your insurance or Medicare card with you, and the self-pay fee is \$30.00. I will be her assistant this year! **Remember:** there is **NO** live virus in the flu vaccine; therefore you cannot get the flu from the vaccination! My prayer is that all of you are able to get out and enjoy this beautiful fall weather- a gift from the Creator!
