"He's making a list, checking it twice. Going to find out who's naughty and nice.

Santa Claus is coming to town."

Even for those of us who are not list makers, Christmas forces us to make lists so everything gets done. We want to make sure that we get the right toy or have the right clothing size for those on our presents' list. The Christmas concerts, cookie walks, craft fairs, Christmas parties, and family gatherings need to be placed upon our crowded calendars.

In the booklet, *Walking the Road to Bethlehem: Your Journey to Christmas*, Adam Hamilton makes the observation that "though we've extended the season of Christmas, we have moved further and further from the meaning of Christmas." When I was shopping at *Dollar General* last week, I noticed the Halloween candy and decorations were on sale and they were stocking those shelves with Christmas decorations. 102.5 FM in St. Louis is already playing Christmas music all day.

While we make our Christmas lists, I am challenging all of us to make a list of how we are preparing our hearts for Christmas. The early church believed God coming in the flesh to us is so important that we should set aside the four weeks before to contemplate the meaning of Jesus' birth. Hamilton says: "Since sometime in the late fifth or early sixth century, this [Advent] season has been a time to recall the meaning of Christmas. The word Advent is from the Latin adventus, and it means "coming." Christians use this opportunity both to recall Jesus' coming to the earth as a babe in Bethlehem and to prepare themselves for his promised return to earth."

We are in the midst of the Advent season and a new sermon series on Sundays at 8:15 & 10:30 a.m., *The Amazing Emmanuel*, which reminds us Jesus is the real superhero in our lives. It is because of Jesus' life, death, & resurrection that we enjoy the good life God intended for all of us to live.

Our Christmas Dinner on Sat., Dec. 5th at 6 p.m. is a time for us to sit down for a meal with our church family. Chef Bob Brown is providing a great meal. After we eat, the children and youth will retell the story of the first Christmas with the play, *Sleepover At The Stable*.

Our annual Christmas Cantata on Sun., Dec. 20th will tell at 8:15 & 10:30 a.m. the story of the promised Messiah who has come to save us. Join us for this cantata, *The Christmas Promise*, sung by our Worship Choir and directed by Eldon Wold, Jr. On this same Sunday is *March to the Manger*: an opportunity to bring our Christmas gifts and lay them down at the feet of the baby Jesus. (A family from our church portrays the Holy Family.)

On Christmas Eve, we offer two worship services: a Family Service at 5 p.m. and a Traditional Candlelight/Communion Service at 7 p.m. God seems especially near to us on this Holy Night.

The Awakening Services on Saturdays: Dec. 12, 19 and 26 at 5 p.m. will offer opportunities to sing carols and new Christmas music as we celebrate the birth of the Christ child.

These are a few of the many events at St. Paul that are offered to help your family prepare for the coming of Jesus into our world. There are many other opportunities for the remembrance of this event throughout this newsletter!

In his book, Hamilton says: "Jesus is a flesh-and-blood reminder that God walks with us, suffers with us, loves us, has redeemed us, and offers us eternal life. John Wesley, as he lay dying in his chambers near the New City Road Chapel, put it this way: "The best of all is, God is with us."

I can face anything if I know that God is with me. That promise is part of the gift of Christmas: Emmanuel, God with us."

As we prepare for Christmas during this Advent season, let us make room in our hearts for the greatest gift of all: Emmanuel, God with us. Pastor Daryl

Nurses Notes for DECEMBER 2015 from Parish Nurse, Eileen Cheatham RN, BC, B.S.N.!

"Off to one side sits a group of shepherds. They sit silently on the floor, perhaps perplexed, perhaps in awe, no doubt in amazement. Their night watch had been interrupted by an explosion of light from heaven and a symphony of angels. God goes to those who have time to hear him—and so on this cloudless night He went to simple shepherds." **~Max Lucado~**

What a glorious night that must have been for those simple shepherds. As you know, shepherds were considered the lowliest on the social ladder- and because of their occupation were not even allowed in the synagogue as they were ceremonial unclean. The shepherds really did not deserve a visit and an invitation from God- but neither do we. We are just as unclean in our own sinful nature. Yet God, in His love and mercy bowed low to meet us. He came low to get down to where we are, that He might pick us up, change us, and to one day take us to where He is. This is the reason to have great joy!

We live in a sinful broken world. Last month in Paris, we saw again what men, filled with hate and darkness, can do to others. People fear for their safety, their families, and loved ones in the military. They are afraid due to a loss of health or a job situation, or perhaps fear of the future and the unknown. But the situations in this present world and our personal lives should not steal our joy- especially the joy we have at Christmas.

We have the Lord to provide for all of our needs. Trust that He will give resources and strength to meet what comes our way. To live in such fear and anxiety is like living in a prison. The Lord is competent, the Lord is caring, the Lord is always in control of each and every situation- even the ones that we do not understand. Be joyful that God is in control!

There may not be peace in the world, but we have something far better: we have peace **with** God. Nothing can undo the relationship we have with Him. It is permanent and forever. Be joyful that the message of Christmas and Christ's love was a personal message just for you!

We also have the peace of God. It comes as we do the will of God in our daily lives and deny sin and the flesh through God's power. The peace of God comes though obedience to do His will each day and deny sin each day though His power. We sometimes fail miserably but that's okay- His mercies are new each day! What joy we can have this Christmas! This Good News and joy must be shared. Christmas should draw us together to tell the world's greatest story once again, and share true fellowship.

What joy we can know when, in the spirit of Christ, we exercise the same prerogative that God exercised in sending His only Son to the world, the prerogative of forgiveness and reconciliation. The grace that we choose to extend to others is available to us without limits! Christmas affords a stern reminder that people we have left in the cold could have a warm place with us around the Christmas tree if we were only willing to be more like the One we celebrate. How can we truly celebrate the One but hold on to past hurts, anger, and resentment? There is freedom in the joy of Christmas!

The Christmas season affords an opportunity to rid the heart of sadness and gloom. Hope brightens and whitens all that it touches. The Bethlehem manger is much, much more than a historical milestone; it is an unfolding promise to all who believe. Jesus is the Gift who keeps on giving. The Christian can rejoice in things eternal, even when temporal circumstances are difficult.

The joy of Christmas is to be found in a spirit of love and generosity. While we should not be carried away with excessive shopping and pride-driven spending, we should exercise generosity in deed and spirit as a true celebration of Jesus. Remember that the gift is always a token of the heart. Most gifts are soon broken, used and forgotten, but a loving, giving heart endures the tests of time.

Don't let the Christmas season pass us by like a pagan holiday. Let's truly celebrate Christ, the greatest gift ever given. Make your holiday a joyous day! Add another seat or two at your table. Set free whatever grudges or ill will you would hold on to. Sing the carols at the top of your voice. Tell Christ's story with thanksgiving and wonder. Wrap every present in love. *You* are the reason Jesus came. No one has more cause to celebrate than you do!

The scientist knew that society was in trouble. The whole planet would explode in less than a month. But the government leaders did not believe him. They ignored him and demanded he keep silent so not to cause chaos. So he promised the government council that neither he nor his wife would speak out or leave the planet. But they did put their infant son in a spacecraft. They launched him to a solar system six galaxies away just as the planet exploded.

You know who that infant son is, don't you? Of course you do. His name is Kal-el. His father and mother, Jor-el and Lara, launched him to earth just before the planet Krypton exploded. Jor-el realizes he's sending his only son to the primitive planet earth to use his powers for good and justice. Kal-el landed in a field in rural Kansas. He was found by Jonathan and Martha Kent. They adopted this young boy and named him Clark.

On earth, with its heavier gravity, young Clark exhibited super-human strength. Nothing could hurt him, except remnants of meteorites from his native planet. He was faster than a speeding bullet. He was more powerful than a locomotive. He was able to leap tall buildings with a single bound. Do you know who I'm talking about now? It's a bird! It's a plane! No—it's Superman.

While Superman is make believe, there was a real wonder child who came to earth. We celebrate his birth every December. Like Kal-el, he was also sent by a Father to this planet earth. Like Kal-el, he has extraordinary powers. He is able to walk on water. He is more powerful than evil. He is able to rescue people from an eternity of meaningless, hopelessness, and selfishness. But unlike Kal-el, this young Child is not make-believe. His story is history—not fantasy. As we come to the four Sundays of Advent, we will come to adore, admire, and appreciate Jesus, the Amazing Emmanuel!

The Amazing Emmanuel is more than he appears. When little Kal-el landed in a field in Kansas, he was certainly more than he appeared to be. He looked like a mild-mannered child, but he was really the most powerful being on the planet.

When Jesus was born in a stable in Bethlehem, he was certainly more than he appeared to be. He looked like a little baby lying in a manger, but he is really the most powerful being in the universe. Unto us a hero is born! And this is a true story! This is history!

This hero too wonderful for words is not just a good teacher or a great prophet. He is God himself. John says, "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God" (John 1:1). No wonder angels appeared to shepherds. No wonder shepherds bowed in a stable. No wonder wise men came with gifts. Unto us a hero is born. The Amazing Emmanuel has come to earth!

Jesus' existence did not begin one starry night in Bethlehem. He was with God in the beginning, the gospel of John tells us. He is the pre-existent holy one! He is God himself. This is a mystery too wonderful for words. This is God's indescribable gift. We can't fully fathom it. We just need to thank God for a hero too wonderful for words.

The Amazing Emmanuel has intersected our sphere of existence. When Kal-el's spacecraft landed in that field, he intersected our sphere of existence (at least in the comic books, TV shows, and movies).

When Jesus came to that Israeli stable, he entered our sphere of existence. The timeless, eternal, allpowerful Creator took on the form of his creation. John describes it like this, "The Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us. We have seen his glory, the glory of the One and Only, who came from the Father, full of grace and truth."

God himself pitched his tent in our backyard! Our Lord is not far away. He is not unapproachable. He is not uninterested or uncaring. He has come clothed in human flesh and dwells among us. It's true—we have seen his glory! If you haven't, I pray you will by the time we come to Christmas day when we celebrate the indescribable gift God sent to Bethlehem over 2,000 years ago! Emmanuel. God with us. Thank God for a hero too wonderful for words! He has entered our sphere of existence. He's right here, right now!

The Amazing Emmanuel is a Gift and the Giver of Gifts. When Superman came to earth, our planet received a precious gift (at least in entertainment.) We were honored to have this powerful Kryptonian live here! But people also received gifts through Superman. Time after time, Superman rescued Lois Lane or Jimmy Olson or countless others from danger.

The Christmas Cantata!


"The Christmas Promise" is an inspired worship program in 3 parts. Drawing upon familiar seasonal melodies and texts,

UNDERSTANDING & GIVING TO MISSION POSSIBLE

The following information is provided to clarify some misconceptions about our Mission Possible campaign and to further clarify how one might give to the cause. **Mission Possible** is a campaign to provide funding above and beyond our normal operational costs to address some much needed maintenance and renovation work at St. Paul. The primary target of the campaign is the replacement of our aging heating and air conditioning system (HVAC) as well as other much needed items for our church building and senior parsonage. We do this in large part as we consider the future of the ministry of St. Paul UMC and the over 50 diverse ministries that radiate from our church home, and as we consider the role our church building will play in future ministry.

The October 24th & 25th Mission Possible Commitment Weekend was the kickoff to our fund raising campaign. So if you were absent or did not give to the campaign during that time, but feel led to participate with your financial gifts, there is still plenty of time to participate. In order that we can know where we stand with pledges, we ask that you fill out a commitment card (which is available in the church narthex or by calling the church office) if you plan to give to the Mission Possible Campaign.

Providing your gift(s):

- If you are interested in a one-time gift, send the donation to the church or place it in the Sunday offering, <u>but</u> <u>please be sure to note Mission Possible (or CFC for Capital Fund Campaign) on the check memo line/</u> offering envelope.
- You can also give online through our website.
- You can give using your credit card when you provide that information to the church office.
- You can give by cash or check.
- You can also provide financial contributions via securities, real estate, personal properties, or an estate gift by contacting the church office or Bob Blacklock.

If you use the **2015 envelopes** to donate to the *Mission Possible Capital Campaign*, please designate your gift to either *Mission Possible or CFC* (for Capital Fund Campaign). Beginning in January **2016**, you would <u>place the designated amount for "Mission Possible" gifts on the Capital Campaign line</u>. Donations toward the expenses of our Church Operations (i.e. the General Budget) would go on the <u>Undesignated</u> line as always. What is now Capital Improvements, funds meant for unexpected major expenses, will be labeled <u>Building & Grounds Improvements</u> on the 2016 envelopes.

Uplifted by the response of St. Paul congregants, the Trustees have selected an HVAC (heating/ventilation/cooling) company and are now moving forward to prepare for a new and more efficient system between now and next May.

If you have not yet made your decision about your role in this "train trip" you still have time to get aboard and participate. All gifts, whether small or large, provide the fuel necessary to make this "train trip" truly a Mission Possible. Just pick up a brochure containing a commitment sheet and an envelope, decide what you can give, and either put your envelope into the Sunday morning offering plate or turn it into the church office.


