

Here is another illustration Jesus used: "The Kingdom of Heaven is like a mustard seed planted in a field. It is the smallest of all seeds, but it becomes the largest of garden plants; it grows into a tree, and birds come and make nests in its branches." Matthew 13:31-2 NLT

On Sunday, January 31st, we have the opportunity to make a financial commitment to the 2016 General Budget. Our estimate of giving supports the ministries as well as the operating expenses for St. Paul. We depend upon your generous gifts of time, talent, and money in order to share the good news of Jesus Christ with others.

We are called to be a thankful people. After a time of sickness, we thank God for our healing. After a time of unemployment, we thank God for our new job. After a time of trial, we thank God for seeing us safely through. After a time of earnestly seeking for God, we give thanks whenever we are found in his wondrous love.

While it is a good thing to thank God for this big stuff that He does for us, we should not forget the small stuff! When I think about people who exude gratitude from every pore, it is those who thank God for the small stuff!

It is a cliché that two people can see a glass filled to the midway mark and one declare the glass to be half empty while the other pronounces it is half full. Our attitude does shape how we see the world and how we live within the world.

Those who count only the big blessings will always have a glass that is half empty. They will be waiting for more big stuff to fill the glass. Meanwhile, those who count all the small blessings of God don't focus upon what they lack but rather all they possess. Those who count all the small blessings start with their glass half full. So whenever the big stuff pours into their lives, the glass will overflow.

Paul believes that we have a generous God who gives us more than enough, so we have extra to give to others. In **2 Corinthians** he says:

"God can pour on the blessings in astonishing ways so that you're ready for anything and everything, more than just ready to do what needs to be done. As one psalmist put it, 'He throws caution to the winds, giving to the needy in reckless abandon, his right-living, right-giving ways never run out, never wear out.' The most generous God who gives see to the farmer that becomes bread for your meals is more than extravagant with you. He gives you something you can then give away, which grows into full-formed lives, robust in God, wealthy in every way, so that you can be generous in every way, producing with us praise to God."

Whether we see the glass half-empty or half-full is more than mere character trait; it reflects our view of the very character of God. Do we worship a stingy God or a generous God?

In his letters, Paul paints the picture of a generous God who has withheld nothing from us. This God did not even keep back his own Son, but freely offered the Son to die so we might live. The only response to a God like this is to give thanks.

This is why we gather on January 31st to turn in our estimates of giving. We come to give thanks for all that we have been given.

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Too often people dismiss their offerings as an insignificant trifle. There are no small gifts because with each gift we say: "Thank you, Jesus, that we have enough food to eat. Thank you, Jesus, that we have a roof over our heads. Thank you, Jesus, that we have life in you. Thank you."

Fred Craddock, famous preacher, says that when we surrender our lives to Jesus we picture those situations where we are asked to make a whole-hearted, one time commitment to Jesus. Instead, Craddock said that we need to picture our life as a roll of quarters; investing a quarter in this person, spending a quarter on this mission.

We start small. Every day we decide how we are going to spend our quarters. Every day we decide how we are going to share God's blessings in small yet significant ways.

Remember that Jesus says: "The Kingdom of Heaven is like a mustard seed planted in a field. It is the smallest of all seeds, but it becomes the largest of garden plants; it grows into a tree, and birds come and make nests in its branches."

We say thanks to God—not through grand gestures—but through small acts of discipleship day by day. We trust that God will take our small acts and multiply them beyond our imagining. From our small acts, God grows the kingdom.

God takes the commitments that each of us make on January 31st and multiplies them beyond our imagining. Our little joined with others becomes enough to fund the ministry of St. Paul. That is the awesomeness of the church!

I hope that you can join us for our celebratory potluck after the second service. We will supply the meat and drinks. You bring the side dishes to share. As we break bread together and share fellowship across the table, we will realize that our glass at St. Paul isn't half empty or half full. No, it is overflowing with the grace of God. Nurses Notes for JANUARY 2016 from Parish Nurse, Eileen Cheatham RN, BC, B.S.N.!

Here we are in **January 2016**- a New Year with new possibilities. I am excited. The start of a New Year gives us a picture of having a slate that is wiped clean; a new beginning with new opportunities. Of course, we should feel like that each morning that we wake up, as God's mercies are new to us with each new day!



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Although there is nothing in the Bible about resolutions, many good stewards take advantage of this time to become closer in their walk with the Lord. This can be done through body, mind, and spirit.

Here are a few suggestions:

- 1. Practice gratitude: Have a grateful heart. Every day express thankfulness to the Lord and to others in your life. Show each person love and respect.
- 2. Encounter the Lord each day: Find time to be with the Lord each day, whether it is ten minutes or an hour. Have a conversation. Give him your joys and your worries. Let Him transform them. Whose hands are better able to handle those things- yours or God's?
- 3. Resolve to watch your tongue: Only speak about others in truth and love- not gossip. Some of us already live with the scars of hurtful words of others.
- 4. Be content with what you have, and don't worry about what others may have: We cannot find fulfillment in possessions- they add nothing to our self-worth. And some of you have probably heard me comment-"I have never seen a U-Haul behind the hearse." You can't take anything with you anyway when you leave this earth.
- 5. Get healthy: Even if you just start by changing one thing. Drink more water; stop eating foods made with white flour that are processed. They have no nutritional value but wreak havoc on your blood sugar level, which can lead to diabetes. Studies show that people in the U.S. are accelerating their own decline due to poor eating. Be a good steward of your body. *There is a heart fair at Alton Memorial on Saturday, February 6th. Start on your path to better health by signing up and attending.
- 6. Serve others: Give more. Your money, your time, your talents. Realize that everything that you have has been entrusted to you and is a gift to be shared. What can you do for your church community? The church can use your talents! A retired minister once said, "When we help we see others as weak. When we fix them we see them as broken. When we serve we see others as holy." We are called to serve.
- 7. Resist overwork: There is daily pressure to produce, meet goals, and be successful. This can lead to over work, fatigue, and worry- and does not give glory to God. Be mindful that life requires balance, down time, and letting go of unrealistic goals.
- 8. Be present to others: There is much joy and sorrow in other people's lives. What a blessing it is to be able to share both and not let those around us experience them alone. The gift of presence is much more valuable than you realize.
- 9. Forgive: Don't carry that burden. It takes a strong person to say "sorry" and an even stronger one to forgive. It is the strongest form of love- we have the greatest example in Jesus!
- 10. Don't give up: Take it slow, be kind to yourself and keep trying! It's a brand new year that we have been given. Don't waste a moment of it.

UNDERSTANDING & GIVING TO MISSION POSSIBLE

The following information is provided to clarify some misconceptions about our Mission Possible campaign and to further clarify how one might give to the cause. Mission Possible is a campaign to provide funding above and beyond our normal operational costs to address some much needed maintenance and renovation work at St. Paul. The primary target of the campaign is the replacement of our aging heating and air conditioning system (HVAC) as well as other much needed items for our church building and senior parsonage. We do this in large part as we consider the future of the ministry of St. Paul UMC and the over 50 diverse ministries that radiate from our church home, and as we consider the role our church building will play in future ministry.

The October 24th & 25th Mission Possible Commitment Weekend was the kickoff to our fund raising campaign. So if you were absent or did not give to the campaign during that time, but feel led to participate with your financial gifts, there is still plenty of time to participate. In order that we can know where we stand with pledges, we ask that you fill out a commitment card (which is available in the church narthex or by calling the church office) if you plan to give to the Mission Possible Campaign.

Providing your gift(s):

- If you are interested in a one-time gift, send the donation to the church or place it in the Sunday offering, but please be sure to note Mission Possible (or CFC for Capital Fund Campaign) on the check memo line/ offering envelope.
- You can also give online through our website.
- You can give using your credit card when you provide that information to the church office.
- You can give by cash or check.
- You can also provide financial contributions via securities, real estate, personal properties, or an estate gift by contacting the church office or Bob Blacklock.

If you use the **2015 envelopes** to donate to the *Mission Possible Capital Campaign*, please designate your gift to either Mission Possible or CFC (for Capital Fund Campaign). Beginning in January 2016, you would place the designated amount for "Mission Possible" gifts on the Capital Campaign line. Donations toward the expenses of our Church Operations (i.e. the General Budget) would go on the Undesignated line as always. What is now Capital Improvements, funds meant for unexpected major expenses, will be labeled Building & Grounds Improvements on the 2016 envelopes.
