



Nurses Notes for FEBRUARY 2016 from Parish Nurse, Eileen Cheatham RN, BC, B.S.N.!

Baby, it's cold outside!! I remember the first time I heard that song- it was Dean Martin and Doris Day. Sigh...they just don't seem to sing like that anymore- but it still gets just as cold in the winter! The winter storms and frigid weather can be a hazard to all of us. Weather related injuries can range from frost bite to falls on the ice. Since "Old Man Winter" decided to show up, let's review some safety tips that may save you a trip to the ER- or even an extended stay in the hospital.



Stay Home: This is especially important for seniors whose circulatory system is less efficient that younger adults: plus older adults to not produce heat as well as when they were younger. Older adults have less body fat and the blood vessels do not constrict to conserve energy as well. Due to this elderly adults are at a greater risk for cold-related

health problems. Babies are also vulnerable-they have a large body surface area when compared with their weight and so their body heat is lost more rapidly when exposed to the cold. Also, their ability to regulate body temperature is not well developed, which make them more vulnerable to decrease temperatures.

Outdoor Safety: Always check the weather report before leaving home and dress in layers, as you can always take a layer off if you get too warm. Keep babies bundled up and ready for cold exposure. Parents- be careful when packing the baby in the car carrier too! Watch out for ice, especially black ice. It's called black ice because it tends to look like the rest of the pavement because it is clear. It forms when the temperature is 32 degrees and below and rain is falling. Sleet and refreezing of water can also cause black ice.

Sun Glare: Sunlight reflects off the white snow, causing glare. This can lead to accidents while driving or a fall while walking. For those driving, make sure that you have a clean windshield, and that your wipers are in good repair. Keep your visor down at all times. Wear polarized sun glasses- not just a cheap pair! Polarized lenses are more efficient at reducing glare. These will protect your eyes whether you are walking or driving.

Car Safety: Driving on snow and ice can be hazardous. Have your car serviced for the winter months, making sure your wipers, antifreeze levels and tires are up to par and in good condition. If at all possible, wait for the roads to be cleared before going out. Have a cell phone with you at all times and keep an emergency kit in your car that includes: all necessary medications, shovel and ice scraper, first aid kit, bottled water, snacks, flashlight and spare batteries, sand or kitty litter for tire traction, and flares or a reflective triangle. You should also have a list of emergency contacts and a copy of your medication list in your glove compartment.

Home safety: Prepare for power outages: Make sure you have warm blankets, flashlights, candles, and nonperishable food. Make sure your furnace has been serviced, and be extremely careful with space heaters, (make sure they are several feet away from furniture and drapes). Plumbing can also need a watchful eye during frigid temperatures. Run the water at a trickle when temperatures become freezing to avoid busted or frozen pipes. Have your chimney and flu inspected every year.

Whether you live at home by yourself or in a retirement community, it is still your responsibility to be prepared in extreme conditions. In emergency conditions there may be times when you have to be on your own until help arrives. Being prepared will make you a lot more comfortable and may even end up saving you from serious injury.



The tragic skiing accident of January 15, 1995, that claimed the life of Meghan Hickerson of Hartford, IL, will never be forgotten.

God has a way of healing hurt and turning tragedy into triumph. Meghan's death immediately gave life to several people, known collectively as "organ donor recipients." Her legacy of faith and service lives on through the "Meghan Hickerson Christian Teen Leader Memorial Scholarship" that is made available through St. Paul UMC.

Meghan was a student leader who set a standard of excellence within the public school system. She also set an example of faith and dedication by spreading God's love through her church and her academic life, to all she encountered. Our goal each year is to reward one or two

deserving college-bound graduating seniors who sets for him or herself the same standards of outstanding scholastic achievement and faith reflected in their everyday life.

We encourage members to notify any student that may qualify and have them complete the application process. Application materials will be available through the counselors at the above mentioned schools or directly from the church office.



Robert Frei, stained glass artist and businessman

Robert Frei was an artist, an innovator, a mentor, a devout Roman Catholic, and a businessman, the third generation to lead Kirkwood-based Emil Frei

Associates, makers of fine art glass since 1898.

"His designs were simple, very playful, and very beautiful," said his grandson, Aaron Frei. "He knew the full beauty of simplicity, the depth of simplicity." His work can be found in almost 500 churches of all denominations around the country. He designed our windows.

Mr. Frei was the grandson of company founder Emil Frei and the son of its second leader, Emil Frei Jr., & Alice Frei. As a teenage bicyclist, Mr. Frei qualified for the Olympics, which were canceled as a result of World War II; he also worked one summer as a photographer for designer Charles Eames.

As an artist, he was greatly influenced by the Bauhaus movement," his grandson said, "But it gradually grew into something much greater than that." The Bauhaus movement put "great emphasis on simplicity & materials."

Among Mr. Frei's artworks were the glass crests and seals for the doors of the Cathedral Basilica of St. Louis for the visit of Pope John Paul II in 1999. "They were supposed to break them, but they were so beautiful, they couldn't bring themselves to do that," his grandson said. The seals are now in the cathedral's museum.

Robert Frei died at his home in Kirkwood on Wednesday (Jan. 20, 2016) from complications of heart disease. He was 90.







More From The Parish Nurse:

Foxes Grove requested that we publish this information to you about their retirement community in our newsletter. This was written by their Executive Director.

Built in 1987, Foxes Grove first opened as an individual retirement community. Then in 2007, Foxes Grove became a Supportive Living Community allowing for both private pay and Medicaid residents. As a Supportive Living Community, Foxes Grove offers assistance to its residents with activities of daily living (housekeeping, medication management, meals, and local transportation). Residents are able to come and go just as they would in their own homes; however they have the support here if they need it. We are not a nursing home, but do have LPN on staff during the day and C.N.A staff here 24/7.

There are 3 floor plans available: studio, 1-bedroom and 2-bedroom. Foxes Grove's Friendly staff is happy to assist its residents in making Foxes Grove their new home. Residents bring their own furnishings and belongings to make their apartment their own. We have maintenance staff on site to help with repair needs as well as a beauty salon, and local transportation. In addition, we have many activities available to all residents, including exercise, speakers, musical entertainment, themed parties, crafts, reading groups, and cooking groups, etc.

The following information is provided to clarify any misconceptions about our Mission Possible campaign and to further clarify how one might give to the cause. **Mission Possible** is a campaign to provide funding above and beyond our normal operational costs to address some much needed maintenance and renovation work at St. Paul. The primary target of the campaign is the replacement of our aging heating and air conditioning system (HVAC) as well as other much needed items for our church building and senior parsonage. We do this in large part as we consider the future of the ministry of St. Paul UMC and the over 50 diverse ministries that radiate from our church home, and as we consider the role our church building will play in future ministry.

The October 2015 Mission Possible Commitment Weekend was the kickoff to our fund raising campaign. So if you were absent or did not give to the campaign during that time, but now feel led to participate with your financial gifts, there is still plenty of time to participate. In order that we can know where we stand with pledges, we ask that you fill out a commitment card (which is available in the church narthex or by calling the church office) if you plan to give to the Mission Possible Campaign.
