On Sunday mornings, we are looking at a topic often experienced by our members, but rarely talked about within the church: undeserved, unjust, and unmerited suffering. We have done this by looking at two innocent sufferers: Job and Jesus.

Job is a decent, God-fearing man. He is blessed with wealth, a large, loving family. Life is good. Satan—the father of lies—says to God: "Of course, Job is a God-fearing, upstanding man. He has nothing to complain about. But I'll bet you—God—that if you let everything be taken away from Job HE WILL CURSE YOU!"

God is convinced that Job loves God for being God and will stand fast in faith—despite the assaults of Satan. God is so convinced of this truth that God gives Satan permission to take everything from Job—except his life.

Then everything goes to pot as my grandmother would exclaim. A messenger arrives to say that men from Sheba have taken all of Job's livestock in the field and slaughtered all the servants except for him.

Another messenger says that fire fell from the sky and burned the rest of Job's flocks and servants. Only the messenger survived to tell Job the bad news.

A third messenger arrived to announce that three companies of Chaldeans had carried off all the camels and killed the servants working with them.

Just when Job thinks it can't get worse, it does. All of his sons and daughters are enjoying a fine feast at the oldest son's home when a windstorm sweeps across the desert, causing the house to collapse, and killing all ten of his children. Only the messenger survived to convey the terrible news.

In that moment, Job is truly grief stricken. He tears his robe, shaves his head as was the practice of a person in mourning, but then he falls to the ground in worship saying:

"Naked I came from my mother, and naked I will return. The LORD has given, and the LORD has taken away! May the name of the LORD be praised."

Notice that Job does not curse his bad luck or even God for what has happened. Instead, Job worships. Not my first inclination!

Like Job, we have three choices when something catastrophic happens. We can let it *destroy* us. We can let it *define* us. Or we can let it *develop* us.

WE CAN LET THE CATASTROPHIC DESTROY US:

We know people who are so devastated by misfortune that they never recover from it. They live their lives a shell of their former selves. They plod through life with little joy, simply marking the days until they too will die. In a real sense, they have died with their loved one. What happened is so terrible that it has destroyed them.

I had an uncle who came back from Korea suffering from what we would now call *post traumatic stress syndrome*. As children, our uncle would not pick us up for fear of contaminating us. The war destroyed him.

WE CAN LET THE CATASTROPHIC DEFINE US:

The Great Depression shaped my grandparents' behavior as it did so many Americans. When his life insurance company folded, my grandfather lost all the equity he had built up in his policy. He never bought life insurance again. Instead, he took what he usually paid in premiums each month and placed that money into a savings account.





Nurses Notes for MARCH 2016 from Parish Nurse, Eileen Cheatham RN, BC, B.S.N.!

March's newsletter is a discussion about diabetes. As I work out in the churches and the community, I meet many people that have diabetes. It is a major health concern in the United States, with 29% of the population having the diagnosis. Plus, it is thought that over 8 million people have it and don't realize it! It is a concern because diabetes leads to so many other problems, such as eye (retinopathy), nerve damage (neuropathy), skin, kidney and heart complications. Diabetes is the leading cause of blindness, kidney disease, and lower limb amputation. Yet, there is good news. Many of these complications can be avoided when people with diabetes will manage their disease with proper lifestyle changes.

There are three types of diabetes.

Type 1: the body fails to produce insulin, which is the hormone that "unlocks" the body's cells to allow glucose to get in to be used for fuel. Every cell needs glucose to survive.

Type 2: is a result of insulin resistance, in which the muscle, fat and liver cells fail to respond to the insulin in the body. So the cells do not get the insulin needed, and the pancreas works overtime sending out more insulin to see if it can "jump start" the body to receive the insulin. This increase in insulin helps the body receive the glucose in the cells, and it will work for a while, but then the pancreas just cannot keep up anymore. Although insulin resistance alone does not cause diabetes, it can, over time set the stage that leads to diabetes. Research now suspects that insulin resistance is caused by obesity- especially belly fat. Belly fat causes excess inflammation in the body that can lead to many other complications. Other causes of insulin resistance can be certain medications, steroid use, smoking, sleep problems (especially sleep apnea) and older age.

Type 3: Gestational diabetes- 7-10% of pregnant women develops this, but usually blood sugars return to normal after delivery.

Diabetes greatly increases the risk of heart disease and stroke. It is very important for all of us to make good choices in order to lead a healthy life. The good news is that insulin resistance can be reversed by losing weight; maintaining a healthy weight, stop smoking, and increasing physical activity. The body also requires a good night's sleep!

Alton Memorial Hospital offers an **American Diabetes Self-Management Program** for all ages. We have on staff a certified diabetes educator, Lisa James, and a Registered Dietician, Naomi Ward, and both are ready and available to assist you with personal consultations, education and resources. Services include: diabetes overview and explanation, medication instruction, dietary and carbohydrate counseling, exercise planning, sick day management, instructions with finger sticks, and insulin pump training.

If you would like to have the assistance of the Diabetes Management Center at the hospital, start by getting a referral from your physician. If you have an appointment with your doctor, I can provide you with a form to take to your physician- and will make some available to the church offices too. I will leave forms with the Wiseman-Pollock receptionist for UMV residents. Should you have any questions, I can assist you. Medicare, IPA, and private insurances will cover program fees. Before you are set up, your insurance company is contacted.

There is also a **monthly Diabetes Support Group** for people with diabetes, and family members. The group offers education and the opportunity to share valuable experiences with others- and just to share fellowship and support. The monthly dates are located on the bulletin boards at the churches and also on the information board across from Wiseman Pollock receptionist for UMV residents. If you have any questions or would like further information you may also call 618-463-7526 and ask for Lisa James, or Naomi Ward.

Please remember the **Daffodil Campaign** at the hospital on March 7th & 8th. The parish nurses and other AMH employees will sell daffodils in the connector lobby. We sell them by the bunch (10 stems) for 10 dollars or a bunch in a vase for 15.00. All of the money raised is placed in a fund and used for the cancer patients here at the hospital. In the past, the funds have been used to help pay the patients bills, such as an electric bill or rent, transportation expenses, or whatever assistance the patient could need because of their illness. It is a wonderful way to be gracious to others! Many thanks to the church members who came out last year!

Enjoy the Easter season! Easter gives us the greatest reason for being thankful, which is our salvation and eternal life in Jesus. Easter reminds us of the forgiveness, peace and joy that we have in the Risen One. Even in the midst of crisis, such as financial problems, health concerns, family or friends that harbor unforgiveness-there is a Light that shines through within the darkness. Have hope dear friends- Jesus has overcome and His mercies are new each day! My prayer for all of you is a renewal of love, joy, and life through Him. A Joyous Easter to all of you. He is risen! He is risen indeed! **Eileen**

WE CAN LET THE CATASTROPHIC DEVELOP US.

Does God test us in order to strengthen us...to develop our character?

I don't believe so. We live in an imperfect world filled with pain, suffering and death. These afflictions were not part of God's original plan for the world. I don't believe that God singles out this person to get cancer, that person to have a child die, or a young man to die in combat.

Philip Yancey, a Christian writer, puts it like this: "Life happens." Or as the Bible puts it: "The rain falls on the just and the unjust." In other words, sometimes evil people prosper while the good suffer. There is no rhyme or reason for this—at least not this side of heaven.

We can't control what happens to us in life. We can control how we respond to life events. This is why it is significant that Job worships God at the moment Satan is convinced Job will turn away from God. We can flee from God, but whom will we flee to? Satan? What comfort will we find there?

When Job lost everything, all that he had left was faith. The belief that even though he did not understand why his whole world had collapsed around him, he must still trust God. Somehow, someway God would bring some small good out of this great evil.

Satan tested not only Job, but Jesus as well. He tested Jesus to the point of death.

When we experience a devastating and catastrophic loss it's normal to feel like "It's the end. It's all over. I'm done. I'm ruined forever. Nothing good can ever come from it. All is lost." We lose all hope.

When we cry out, from the depths of our crushed lives, "Where are you, God?" Jesus says: "I'm here, feeling your pain, dying your death. I'll always be here for you. And when the New Jerusalem comes down from heaven, replacing the brokenness of this old world, then I will reach out my hand and like a Kleenex wipe away every tear from your eye. There will be no more death, no more grieving, no more crying, no more pain. All this will be gone forever."

As we continue our journey with Job and Jesus, my hope is that we will come to Easter able to say with **Job 19:25-27:** "I know my Redeemer lives, and in the end He will rise and take His stand on the earth. And though my skin has been stripped off, still, in my flesh, I will see God. I, myself, will see Him: not some stranger, but actually me, with these eyes. Toward this end, my deepest longings pine away within my chest." (God's Voice) Pastor Daryl

Hickerson Scholarship 2016

The tragic skiing accident of January 15, 1995, that claimed the life of Meghan Hickerson of Hartford, IL, will never be forgotten.

God has a way of healing hurt and turning tragedy into triumph. Meghan's death immediately gave life to several people, known collectively as "organ donor recipients." Her legacy of faith and service lives on through the "Meghan Hickerson Christian Teen Leader Memorial Scholarship" that is made available through St. Paul UMC.

Meghan was a student leader who set a standard of excellence within the public school system. She also set an example of faith and dedication by spreading God's love through her church and her academic life, to all she encountered. Our goal each year is to reward one or two

deserving college-bound graduating seniors who sets for him or herself the same standards of outstanding scholastic achievement and faith reflected in their everyday life.



UNDERSTANDING & GIVING TO MISSION POSSIBLE

The following information is provided to clarify any misconceptions about our Mission Possible campaign and to further clarify how one might give to the cause. **Mission Possible** is a campaign to provide funding above and beyond our normal operational costs to address some much needed maintenance and renovation work at St. Paul. The primary target of the campaign is the replacement of our aging heating and air conditioning system (HVAC) as well as other much needed items for our church building and senior parsonage. We do this in large part as we consider the future of the ministry of St. Paul UMC and the over 50 diverse ministries that radiate from our church home, and as we consider the role our church building will play in future ministry.

The October 2015 Mission Possible Commitment Weekend was the kickoff to our fund raising campaign. So if you were absent or did not give to the campaign during that time, but now feel led to participate with your financial gifts, there is still plenty of time to participate. In order that we can know where we stand with pledges, we ask that you fill out a commitment card (which is available in the church narthex or by calling the church office) if you plan to give to the Mission Possible Campaign.

Providing your gift(s):

- If you are interested in a one-time gift, send the donation to the church or place it in the Sunday offering, <u>but</u> <u>please be sure to note Mission Possible (or CFC for Capital Fund Campaign) on the check memo line/offering envelope.</u>

Mission Possible



The Trustees wanted to take this time to update you about our "Mission Possible" project. The Trustees have approved using Sigman, Indoor Climate Solutions, Inc. of Belleville, Illinois as our contractor for the project. Sigman was chosen from 3 contractors expressing an interest in our project (although we had sent invitations to bid to several firms we only had 3 firms move to examine our project and 2 submitted bids). Sigman comes highly recommended having worked with several churches on both sides of the river including churches of some of the members of the UMC District Building and Location Committee.

The project involves replacement of the majority of our HVAC equipment with more efficient equipment and a re-instrumentation of our current boiler as a backup source of heat. The bid also includes replacing ceiling tile and lighting throughout the church (with the exception of the main portion of the sanctuary) and any necessary electrical work required of an updated system. The Trustees are working diligently to bring the project costs in under \$500,000 including priorities one, two and possibly three. The Trustees met with the contractor for a final run through on the bid, at their February 21 meeting, which is the signal to begin final work toward financial aspects and developing a project schedule.

Our hope is that the HVAC work will begin fairly soon and be completed by the end of May if not before. Thanks again for all of your support and encouragement!
