"There are different spiritual gifts, but the same Spirit gives them. There are different ways of serving, and yet the same Lord is served. There are different types of work to do, but the same God produces every gift in every person."

I Corinthians 12:4-6 (God's Word)

Now that he has won a second Super Bowl, Peyton Manning is a shoo-in for the NFL Hall of Fame. He has thrown more touchdown passes (539) than any other quarterback. Brett Favre is in second place with 508; Tom Brady with 428.

Because he was injured most of last season, Manning threw a total of 9 touchdown passes. He had the worst season record of any quarterback who has ever won a Super Bowl. Still, Peyton Manning has that ring!

Even a casual football fan understands that it was the Denver Broncos' defense that was most responsible for winning Super Bowl 50. If the other pieces are functioning on the field at a high level, it is possible to win with a 40 yr. old quarterback whose best years are behind him. Another reminder that football is a team sport.

Paul's message is that church is a team sport. The church at Corinth is the church that every pastor dreams of serving; a church filled with strong, gifted leaders poised to do tremendous ministry. The church has failed to realize its potential because these gifts have become a point of division.

Some claim that their gifts are more spiritual than those possessed by their brothers and sisters in Christ. Others feel superior because they have multiple talents while their neighbor has only one. Little ministry is being done because they are too busy fighting with each other.

Paul pleads with this church to get it together for the big game. To harness their potential to do great things for God. In vs. 10 of the first chapter, he says: "Brothers and sisters, I encourage all of you in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ to agree with each other and not to split into opposing groups. I want you to be united in your understanding and opinions".

These precious gifts from God that should have united the church ended up dividing it. This church that has been blessed more than most finds itself unable to do anything significant for God. That is sad. If we are going to fully utilize our spiritual gifts within the church, we need to be sold on and sold out to Jesus. Christ is the head of the church. He is the quarterback. Our role is to bring our "A" game to each play that is called. We are to work together for the good of the whole team. Christian love calls us to seek—not what is best for us individually—but rather what is best for the Body of Christ.

We need love to fully utilize our spiritual gifts within the church. For love leads us—not to elevate ourselves in the eyes of the world—but rather to humble ourselves before God; yielding all that we have to His glorious kingdom. Love leads us to seek—not what is best for us—but rather what is best for the Body of Christ. Love does not divide, but rather unites!

What united the Denver Broncos was their love and admiration for their quarterback, Peyton Manning. The players knew that Peyton had fought back from neck injuries that would have ended most careers. Without complaint, he had labored behind weak offensive lines and on teams with ineffective defenses. The players wanted to win the Super Bowl—not only for themselves—but for their leader.

Until I watched a documentary of a sculptor on TLC, I had never thought how challenging this profession is. Unlike painting where the blank canvas will receive any image, the sculptor begins with a hunk of stone.

The artist talked about how he would spend days, weeks, even months studying a stone, living with it—patiently waiting for the statue within to reveal itself to him. What emerges from the stone is a union of the artist's skill and vision and the potential within the stone.

Paul reveals that God is more like a sculptor than a painter. You see, God doesn't begin with a blank canvas that will receive any vision. God begins with a stone—a particular people with particular talents located in a particular place.

God gently shapes us—not with hammer and chisel—but with His love. It is His love that releases the potential within all of us. It is His love that inspires us to use our gifts to encourage each other and build up the Body.

In one of his early hits, the country artist, John Anderson, sang: "I'm just an old chunk of coal. But I'm gonna be a diamond some day."

I am convinced that we are "chunks of coal" waiting for Jesus to speak the words that will release the "sparkling diamonds" within us. What separates us from the crowd isn't our intelligence or our ability. What separates us from the crowd is that when Jesus says: "Follow me," we follow!

Maybe life has beaten you down and convinced you that you will never be anything but a chunk of coal. This is the great lie of Satan. Within each of us are special gifts waiting to be released. Within each of us are noble deeds waiting for the courage to do them. Within each of us is more than we ever dreamed, more than we ever imagined, more than we could conceive. For within each of us is a dazzling diamond to be revealed.

Once we were chunks of coal, but we opened our lives to Jesus' love and He sculpted us into dazzling diamonds we have become. Jesus has done the same for the diamonds seated next to you on Saturday nights and Sunday mornings. The beautiful people of God.

While some of us share the spiritual disease of the Corinthians—pride—I think more of us are convinced that we have nothing to offer the church and feel utterly useless. We make excuses. We are too young, too old, too busy, or lacking any useful talent.

Nurses Notes for APRIL 2016 from Parish Nurse, Eileen Cheatham RN, BC, B.S.N.!

I decided to do the newsletter this month on the **Zika virus**, which has been in the news a lot lately. If you've been thinking about traveling to warmer climates or have been catching a few news stories, you know that the Zika infection is caused by the Zika virus, and that is spread to people primarily through the bite of an infected Aedes species mosquito. The most common symptoms of



Zika are fever, rash, joint pain, and conjunctivitis (red eyes). The illness is usually mild with symptoms lasting for several days to a week after being bitten by an infected mosquito. People usually don't get sick enough to go to the hospital, and they very rarely die of Zika. For this reason, many people might not realize they have been infected. Once a person has been infected, he or she is likely to be protected from future infections.

Zika virus was first discovered in 1947 and is named after the Zika forest in Uganda. In 1952, the first human cases of Zika were detected and since then, outbreaks of Zika have been reported in tropical Africa, Southeast Asia, and the Pacific Islands. Zika outbreaks have probably occurred in many locations.

Zika causes mild illness in some; however, recent outbreaks are being closely tracked by the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) as they believe Zika may be linked to serious birth defects in babies of mothers who were infected with this virus while pregnant.

While this virus is not new, it is new to the Americas. The first case was reported in Brazil just last spring. Since that time, it has spread through South and Central America, and the Caribbean. No locally transmitted Zika cases from mosquitoes have been reported in the continental U.S., but cases have been reported in travelers returning from areas where Zika is present. As Zika continues to spread in our region, the number of cases among travelers visiting or returning to the U.S. is likely to increase.

O: What is the Zika virus?

A: Zika is a mosquito-borne virus that is similar to dengue fever, yellow fever, and West Nile virus. Most people who contract Zika don't experience any symptoms. For those who do, the effects of the illness are usually very mild — fever, muscle aches, and rash are the most common symptoms — and it's rare to see people develop issues that require them to go to the hospital.

Q: How do you contract the Zika virus?

A: Most people get the Zika virus from a mosquito bite. There have been a few cases of sexually transmitted infection, but such cases would have to occur during the incubation period, which is approximately three to 12 days. Expectant mothers infected with the Zika virus can pass it on to the fetus through the umbilical cord or at the time of delivery.

O: Why have pregnant women been particularly affected by the Zika virus?

A: Being pregnant does not necessarily make you more vulnerable to contracting the virus, but if you are infected with Zika and pass it on to your baby, there is a concern of an increase in birth defects. We've known about Zika for decades, but it wasn't until the large Brazilian outbreak in 2015 that the link between the virus and fetal microcephaly, as well as many other abnormalities, was discovered, and we realized the significant impact of Zika.

Q: If Zika has been around for decades, why is it only now becoming a concern?

A: There are a few possibilities why the Zika virus is now becoming a concern:

- •Zika may have mutated and become more virulent.
- •Once it reached the Americas, it may have been able to be transmitted more frequently.
- •It may have been underreported previously.

The CDC and other agencies continue to perform research and promote awareness, as there is a likelihood that more cases will be reported and further discoveries can be made.

Q: The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention has advised pregnant women to postpone travel to more than 20 countries in South and Central America and the Caribbean. Why are these countries at greater risk for Zika outbreaks?

A: The countries on the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) list have all experienced Zika outbreaks so far. This is likely due to the warmer climates present in these countries, which are ideal for Zika-transmitting mosquitos. These mosquitos, primarily of the Aedes species, are sometimes found in the southern United States as well, making it imperative to promote awareness of Zika virus in the U.S.

Q: What treatments are currently available for Zika?

A: While antiviral treatment is being investigated, nothing is currently available. Right now, only symptomatic relief is possible for illness-related fever or rash. The most important thing for women is preventive measures. Overall, the best form of prevention is to limit your exposure by not traveling to affected countries. But if you are pregnant or considering pregnancy and must travel to affected areas, you can do the following:

•Wear protective gear like long-sleeve shirts and pants. Avoid skin exposure as much as possible to prevent

- •Wear protective gear, like long-sleeve shirts and pants. Avoid skin exposure as much as possible to prevent mosquito bites.
- •Use Environmental Protection Agency-approved insect repellents as directed, which are safe for pregnant women.
- •If you are pregnant and have a male partner who travels to an area of active Zika virus infection, you should abstain from sexual activity or consistently and correctly use condoms during sex for the duration of the pregnancy.
- •Talk to your OB/GYN if you have traveled to an affected area. Your physician will perform a blood test for evidence of Zika virus infection. You will also have at least one ultrasound to evaluate your fetus for infection.

We all may not be of child bearing age, or even female- but all of us have family members who are. It is always good to be educated so that you can share information with others.

The following information is provided to clarify any misconceptions about our Mission Possible campaign and to further clarify how one might give to the cause. **Mission Possible** is a campaign to provide funding above and beyond our normal operational costs to address some much needed maintenance and renovation work at St. Paul. The primary target of the campaign is the replacement of our aging heating and air conditioning system (HVAC) as well as other much needed items for our church building and senior parsonage. We do this in large part as we consider the future of the ministry of St. Paul UMC and the over 50 diverse ministries that radiate from our church home, and as we consider the role our church building will play in future ministry.

The October 2015 Mission Possible Commitment Weekend was the kickoff to our fund raising campaign.
