Palmer says: "WHEN THE MILPITAS HIGH SCHOOL ORCHESTRA ATTEMPTS BEETHOVEN'S NINTH SYMPHONY, THE RESULT IS APALLING. I WOULDN'T BE SURPRISED IF THE PERFORMANCE MADE OLD LUDWIG ROLL OVER IN HIS GRAVE DESPITE HIS DEAFNESS.

YOU MIGHT ASK, "WHY BOTHER." WHY INFLICT ON THOSE POOR KIDS THE BURDEN OF TRYING TO RENDER WHAT THE IMMORTAL BEETHOVEN HAD IN MIND? NOT EVEN THE GREAT CHICAGO SYMPHONY ORCHESTRA CAN ATTAIN THAT PERFECTION.

MY ANSWER IS THIS: THE MILPITAS HIGH SCHOOL ORCHESTRA WILL GIVE SOME PEOPLE IN THAT AUDIENCE THEIR ONLY ENCOUNTER WITH BEETHOVEN'S GREAT NINTH SYMPHONY. FAR FROM PERFECTION, IT IS NEVERTHELESS THE ONLY WAY THEY WILL HEAR BEETHOVEN'S MESSAGE."

We thank you in advance for your generous response to God's great goodness.



Nurse's Notes for OCTOBER 2016 from Parish Nurse, Eileen Cheatham RN, BC, B.S.N.

Have you or any of your family ever had this happen before? You are at the doctor's office and a new medication is prescribed. The doctor says: "Take this medication 3 times a day. If you get nauseous, you can take it with food, but not after 8 p.m. Take the second medication twice a day without food but not before 8:00 a.m. or after 11 p.m. I think that's about it. Do you have any questions?"



Patient: "No, no questions right now. Thank you." The doctor leaves and the patient starts to leave. He/She thinks to themselves, "Ok, I take this medication 3 times a day but if I get nauseous I can, what did he just tell me? And did he say that I can take the two medications together? I am not sure I understood, but he is already in another room and I need to get going..."

How many times have YOU gone to the doctor, been prescribed medication and arrived home, only to find that you're not exactly sure about possible side effects, dosing challenges, or the risk of taking a new medication along with other medicines you've already been prescribed? And sometimes, you may be too embarrassed to clarify the instructions and may even decide not to take the medication at all. If you've experienced this, you are not alone. According to a recent study conducted by the National Council on Patient Information and Education (NCPIE), only 56 percent of patients report high to very high adherence to treatment regimens, and approximately 62 percent of patients are not aware of their medicines' risks. This cycle of medication non-adherence and lack of effective patient-healthcare provider (HCP) communication has long-term implications, contributing to as much as \$290 billion per year in avoidable medical spending or 13 percent of total healthcare expenditures.

In an effort to help eliminate the communication gap, the FDA has created a public education initiative, the "Talk Before You Take" campaign. This is a public education initiative to increase communication about medications between health care professionals and patients. It provides a list of questions and other resources that can make it easier for patients to talk with their healthcare providers about medications.

- 1. *What is the name of the medication, and what is it for?* There are many times that I will have someone tell me that their doctor gave them a new medication and they cannot tell me the name of the drug or why they are to take it. It is important for you to know why you are being prescribed a medication.
- 2. How and when do I take it and for how long? Not all medications are meant to be taken over a long period of time. Antibiotics are to be taken until done- and NOT saved for later in case you get sick again!
- 3. What side effects should I expect and what should I do about them? Sometimes this can be a difficult one, as drug companies list every possible side effect that can occur, which can make some people nervous about even beginning the medication.
- 4. Should I take this medication on an empty stomach or with food? Some medicines need to be taken "before food" or "on an empty stomach." This is because food and some drinks can affect the way medicines work.
- 5. Should I avoid activities, foods, drinks, alcohol or other medications while taking this? Perhaps the bestknown example for food/medication interaction is grapefruit, which, along with pomegranate, can alter the way certain cholesterol medications work. Other examples include some leafy green veggies, such as spinach or kale. Their high vitamin K levels pose risks for patients being treated with blood thinners to prevent strokes. Eating high levels of these vegetables can counteract the medication's effectiveness.
- 6. If it is a once a day dose, is it best to take this in the morning or at night? Sometimes taking a medication at night or in the morning may be best, depending on the drug. Modifying the timing of drugs to achieve the greatest benefit with the lowest risk of unpleasant side effects is called drug chronotherapy. Simvastatin (Zocor) is an example of a statin that works better if taken in the evening. Studies show that when simvastatin is taken at night there's a greater reduction in LDL cholesterol than when it's taken in the morning.
- 7. Will this medication work safely with my other medications, including over the counter medicines, vitamins and supplements that I take? Drug interactions occurs when the effect of a particular drug is altered when it is taken with another drug, or with food. You can check for interactions yourself on: drugs.com/drug interactions. - 8. *When should I expect the medication to begin to work, and how will I know if it is working?* Any medicine needs time to work. It might take time to find the correct medicine for you and the correct amount.
- 9. *How should I store it?* It's important to follow any storage instructions, such as the need for refrigeration, that are on the label. Most medications can be stored at room temperature, away from moisture and light.
- 10. Is there any additional information that I should know?

Establishing a strong relationship with your doctor or pharmacist can create an open environment where you feel comfortable asking questions and expressing concerns about a medication. Having a conversation with your doctor about how your medication impacts your chronic condition is crucial to managing your condition and taking back your health.

If you don't like what one doctor or pharmacist is saying about taking a medication, get a second opinion from a different healthcare professional. Where you get your advice is also a decision you make. I am also available to review medications with you.

First off, you must not carry on over them like people who have nothing to look forward to, as if the grave were the last word. Since Jesus died and broke loose from the grave, God will most certainly bring back to life those who died in Jesus.
¹⁵⁻¹⁸ And then this: We can tell you with complete confidence—we have the Master's word on it—that when the Master comes again to get us, those of us who are still alive will not get a jump on the dead and leave them behind. In actual fact, they'll be ahead of us. The Master himself will give the command. Archangel thunder! God's trumpet blast! He'll come down from heaven and the dead in Christ will rise—they'll go first. Then the rest of us who are still alive at the time will be caught up with them into the clouds to meet the Master. Oh, we'll be walking on air! And then there will be one huge family reunion with the Master. So reassure one another with these words. I Thessalonians 4 (The Message)

When I met with Deanna, Alex & Nicole, and Jessica, one of the things they shared with me was how many people made this statement to them: I would not be the person I am if it were not for Mark Barnes.

Since Mark's passing, person after person has come up to me to share the positive impact Mark made upon their lives. Some of the people were childhood friends; others met Mark as an adult. Last night, I'm sure that some of you heard stories about Mark helping out someone in need that you had never heard before. Because it wasn't something Mark bragged about. He just did it.

I realize these stories don't fill the empty place in your hearts. The stories don't erase the pain that you feel. I do hope that last night impressed upon you the long reach of Mark's life and reinforced that you are not alone in your grief. We share your pain. Indeed, Paul says that is one of the things we do as Christians: we share each other's burdens. All of us are here today to surround you with the loving arms of Christ.

For the great promise of God is that Jesus is God with us. God with us in times of joy, God with us in times of struggle, and God with us in times of sorrow. God proclaims that even if our mother or father should abandon us--as unthinkable as that may be--He promises never to abandon us. We can count upon God to be with us forever.

TODAY YOU ARE NOT ALONE. YOU HAVE YOUR FAMILY. YOU HAVE ALL OF US, BUT MOST IMPORTANTLY YOU HAVE GOD WITH YOU!

I want to affirm that it is O.K. to grab for the Kleenex and weep because our loss is great. It would be far sadder if there were no one sitting behind you mourning with you. A sea of empty seats would indicate that Mark's life had little impact outside your immediate family. Last night and today is testimony that this was not so.

Jesus wept at the tomb of his friend Lazarus, so that gives us permission to shed tears today. We need to remember that Jesus comforted Martha, Lazarus' sister, with these words: "I am, right now, Resurrection and Life. The one who believes in me, even though he or she dies, will live. And everyone who lives believing in me does not ultimately die at all. Do you believe this?" "Yes, Master. All along I have believed that you are the Messiah, the Son of God who comes into the world."

If we believe as Martha does that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, then we are convinced Jesus is the Victor over Death. It is this belief that has allowed smiles and laughter to slip in among the tears as we celebrate Mark's life in all its fullness. We should not let the illness of these past few years overshadow the joy Mark brought into our lives and the good times we shared together.

MARK'S TIME ON THIS EARTH WAS TOO SHORT FROM OUR PERSPECTIVE, BUT BOY, O BOY, WAS THIS A LIFE WELL LIVED! AND IT WAS FILLED WITH PEOPLE WHO WERE WELL LOVED!

We live this celebration with HOPE. The grave is not the last word for Mark or any of us! As followers of Jesus, we share in Jesus' Resurrection. Just as God raised Jesus from the dead, so shall he raise every one of us. So when we cry, Paul says we do not cry as those who have nothing to look forward to. Our partings are but for a little while. We will see our loved ones again.
