

I encourage you to read 2 Corinthians 9 where Paul talks about the blessings we receive from Jesus Christ. Blessings which we are expected to share with others. He ends that chapter by saying: **"THANKS BE TO GOD FOR HIS INDESCRIBABLE GIFT."** Paul is talking about the gift of the grace—the love, the forgiveness, the blessing—that is ours through Jesus Christ—but he could also be describing the gift of the baby Jesus. Advent when we begin our countdown to the birth of the baby begins on November 27th.

Let me take a moment to explain that as Paul traveled, he collected a special offering for the widows and orphans in the church at Jerusalem. Refusing to renounce their beliefs, some of the men had been killed. Others were persecuted and imprisoned; leaving their families destitute.

The Corinthian Christians had responded generously to these needs in the Jerusalem Church. Paul says, "Thank You," and promises that the Jerusalem Christians will pray for the church at Corinth.

Paul goes on to observe that the Corinthians' generosity does not flow from their own goodness. They are responding to the abundant and overflowing grace of God within their lives. Along with James, Paul believes that ultimately *God is the giver of every good gift.* All we do is pass on to others a portion of what God has given to us.

It is at this point in his letter that Paul exclaims: **"THANKS BE TO GOD FOR HIS INDESCRIBABLE GIFT."** While all of God's good gifts defy description, this is especially true of the baby Jesus. *For unto us a child is born; unto us a son is given.* 

One dictionary defines **"indescribable**" as referring to **"a thing of untellable splendor."** Although I try every Sunday, I fail to adequately convey the splendor of the depth of God's love for us, the splendor of the forgiveness of our sins, the splendor of the eternal life offered to us through this tiny baby.

Jesus is God's indescribable gift. Words cannot capture the value of this gift. This is why I cherish the traditions of Christmas that remind us of the wonder of God's gift of His own Son!

There is a Christmas tradition that we all practice, but rarely speak about: *"re-gifting."* When Meg was three yrs. old, her expression on Christmas morning immediately revealed whether or not she liked the gift she had just opened. We had to teach her to receive all gifts graciously. Later, she could do what we often do with gifts that don't happen to fit in with our style or taste—re-gift it.

Through your commitment to support our ministry on November 5th or 6th, you enable us to re-gift the baby throughout the year. *This indescribable gift that God has given—His own Son—is meant to be re-gifted. We are charged to share the baby with others. Here is the mystery of faith, the more we share God's indescribable gift, the more we have for ourselves. The more we give away, the more brightly and warmly His love burns in our hearts.* 

Jesus is the greatest gift of all because one size fits all. He is the gift that everyone needs for only He is the Savior of all generations. Pastor Daryl

offering," you may choose to designate it for a missionary, a mission project, or a local church special fund like the Capital Campaign. You may also leave it "undesignated."



#### Nurse's Notes for NOVEMBER 2016 from Parish Nurse, Eileen Cheatham RN, BC, B.S.N.

#### This is "American Diabetes Month"

Diabetes is one of the leading causes of disability and death in the United States. It can cause blindness, nerve damage, kidney disease, and other health problems if it's not controlled. One in 11 Americans have diabetes – that's more than 29 million people. Plus, 86 million adults in the United States are at high risk of developing type 2 diabetes.

In *type 1 diabetes*, your body treats the cells that make insulin as invaders and destroys them. This can happen over a few weeks, months, or years. When enough of the cells are gone, your pancreas makes little or no insulin and blood glucose becomes dangerously high. People with type 1 diabetes take insulin by injection with a syringe, an insulin pen, or an insulin pump.

In *type 2 diabetes*, your body does not use insulin properly. This is called insulin resistance. At first, the pancreas makes extra insulin to make up for it. Over time your pancreas isn't able to keep up and can't make enough insulin to keep your blood glucose levels normal. Type 2 is treated with lifestyle changes, oral medications (pills), and insulin. Some people with type 2 can control their blood glucose with healthy eating and being active. Type 2 usually gets worse over time—even if you don't need to take medications at first, you may need to later.

*The good news?* People who are at high risk for type 2 diabetes can lower their risk by more than half if they make healthy changes. These changes include: eating healthy, increasing physical activity, and losing weight.

<u>Physical Activity</u>: Diabetes usually occurs as a result of the body's insulin not working efficiently, which is called insulin resistance. When the body experiences insulin resistance, more insulin is released in order to get sugar into the cells of the body. As a result of endless amounts of insulin released, the mechanism that controls sugar stays in disarray, causing type 2 diabetes. Physical activity can help prevent this from happening altogether. The energy that is used during exercise helps to rid the sugar from the blood. Consider getting **at least 30** minutes a day of brisk, moderate physical activity to help prevent diabetes from getting to you. Consider strength training at least two times per week and make sure to hit every major muscle group to maximize results.

**Pay Attention to Diet:** To prevent diabetes one should be eating portions that are not too large, with protein, plus fruit or vegetables at every meal, and not too many carbohydrates. Eating food that is low on the glycemic index is important. Be mindful that too much fruit can cause the blood glucose to rise due to the abundance of sugar in fruit. Avoid processed carbohydrates (cookies, crackers and white bread) and keep fast foods to a minimum. Rethink your drink and cut back on soda and other sweetened drinks. Maintain Body Weight - Obesity can cause many metabolic problems, as well as heart disease. While all obese individuals do not have diabetes, being obese significantly increases one's risk for having diabetes and high blood sugar.

**Eat Whole Grains:** Consuming grains is necessary in the diet. The grains group consists of breads, pastas, rice, and many others. The best option to prevent diabetes and still be able to eat these foods is to consume whole grains. Whole grains contain more fiber than other grains and while there is more research needed as to why whole grains regulate blood sugar, some believe that it is because whole grains release sugar into the blood at a much slower rate than the regular grain options.

Attend the *Diabetes Fair* at Alton Memorial Hospital in November! The date is **Saturday, November 5th**, **9 a.m.-noon.** You can receive a diabetic foot check, A1C screening, and vision check. You need to call and sign up for the foot and A1C screening. If you call and register you will also receive a free boxed lunch from Firehouse Subs. Celebrity Chef Tiffany Derry will be in the cafeteria starting at 9:30 a.m. for demonstrations. **Call and register at 1-800-392-0936**.

#### We Say Goodbye To Our Former Pastor...

**Rev. Francis "Mike" T. Michels**, 87, of Litchfield passed away Monday October 10, 2016 at 1:45 a.m. at Heritage Health Therapy & Senior Care in Litchfield, IL.

He was born at the family farm home on March 29, 1929 near Albion, IL in Edwards County, IL, a son of Frank C. & Harriett (Holt) Michels. He was the youngest of five sons: his brothers were Vernon, Virgil, James, and Allen. All preceded him in death.

Mike married the former Earline Sanders on August 29, 1952 at Phillipstown Methodist Church near Crossville, IL.

Mike attended the Judge Country School, Albion Comm. High School, McKendree College, A.B. 1953, Temple University School of Theology, S.T.B., M.Div. 1958. He also studied at the University of Edinburgh, Scotland; Switzerland; and Luther's Reformation in East Germany.

Pastorates at Shiloh, IL, Boulder Circuit, New Athens-Freeburg, Bay View in Maryland, Newton/Kedron, Sparta, Greenville, Rosewood Heights, Jerseyville, Norris City-Shiloh, and Litchfield all located in the former Southern Illinois Conference, except Bay View.

He served the Southern Illinois Conference in various agencies: Board of Trustees, (Treasurer); Board Of Pensions, Commission on Minimum Salary, (Treasurer & Chairman); Building and location Committees in three districts; Committee on District Superintendency; District Youth Director; Camp Dean, Little Grassy; Conference Statistician; Conference Chairman On Pastoral Counseling and Care Committee in the planning stage, Board of Directors for United Methodist Village, Lawrenceville, IL and Alton Memorial Hospital in Alton, both in Illinois.

Believing a pastor should be involved in the community, he chose Rotary as the one service. He served in every local club office. He shared Rotary in New Athens, Newton, Sparta, Jerseyville, Carmi, and Litchfield. In retirement serving four years as Assistant Governor, being a "pioneer" the first to hold that office in the pilot year. He was awarded honors: Rotarian of the Year, Hall of Honor, and holds six Paul Harris Awards. Mike refused three times the nomination of being District Governor. He never missed a meeting since first joining, having recorded 55 years of perfect attendance.

When not volunteering, Mike enjoyed ministering with the children of the church and enjoyed woodworking, gardening, and landscaping.

Mike is survived by his wife, Earline of Litchfield, IL; daughter Linda (Robert) Noland of Maryville, IL; and 2 granddaughters, Katie Lee (Kevin) Devany and Leanne Marie Noland; great-granddaughter, Claire Marie Devany; and several nieces and nephews.

He was preceded in death by his parents; son, Stephen Link Michels; and his four brothers.

We were privileged to have Rev. Mike Michels and Earline lead us from 1981 -1985. Even after he retired, Rev. Michels surprised many with a phone call on their anniversaries or birthdays. He'd always end the conversation by telling us that "he'd see us on down the road." Now, we will see Rev. Michels on down the road—the road Jesus leads us on. For Jesus promises that He is the Way, the Truth, and the Life. Please pray for Earline and their family that they might be comforted in the midst of their sorrow. Pastor Daryl

#### Matthew 6: Put your trust in God alone

<sup>19-21</sup> "Don't pile up treasures on earth, where moth and rust can spoil them and thieves can break in and steal. But keep your treasure in Heaven where there is neither moth nor rust to spoil it and nobody can break in and steal. For wherever your treasure is, you may be certain that your heart will be there too!" <sup>25-30</sup> "That is why I say to you, don't worry about living—wondering what you are going to eat or drink, or what you are going to wear. Surely life is more important than food, and the body more important than the clothes you wear. Look at the birds in the sky. They never sow nor reap nor store away in barns, and yet your Heavenly Father feeds them. Aren't you much more valuable to him than they are? Can any of you, however much he worries, make himself an inch taller? And why do you worry about clothes? Consider how the wild flowers grow. They neither work nor weave, but I tell you that even Solomon in all his glory was never arrayed like one of these! Now if God so clothes the flowers of the field, which are alive today and burnt in the stove tomorrow, is he not much more likely to clothe you, you 'little-faiths'? <sup>31-33</sup> "So don't worry and don't keep saying, 'What shall we eat, what shall we drink or what shall we wear?! That is what pagans are always looking for; your Heavenly Father knows that you need them all. Set your heart on the kingdom and his goodness, and all these things will come to you as a matter of course. <sup>34</sup> "Don't worry at all then about tomorrow. Tomorrow can take care of itself! One day's trouble is enough for one day."

As I reflect upon a person's life, I try to find a Bible passage that captures the uniqueness of that life. I settled upon this passage because Ramona Hunt has been ill for a while; yet she did not use her illness as an excuse from living her life. She did not fritter away her life with worry.

Whenever she was able, she joined her Bingo Friends at the KC Hall in Granite City, showed up at her grandchildren's special events like Tyler's graduation from Army Reserve Boot Camp, or simply spending time with her family. She took trips with Wayne to the Smoky Mountains and Branson.

Mona showed up to support us when she wasn't 100% because she loved us and she was determined that her illness would not limit her any more than necessary. The Bible observes in many places that we are fragile—like the wild flowers—here today and gone tomorrow. The line between life and death is exceedingly thin. That is why we need to focus our lives upon what is truly important.

Where was Ramona's heart? Our answer to that question will reveal what she treasured above all else. Her heart was with you gathered here today: her family, her friends, and neighbors. Her heart was given to Jesus Christ as her Lord and Savior. Ramona invested in those riches that can never be taken away from her because she put her trust in God.

Now she has received the *crown of righteousness* that Jesus places upon the head of all who have finished their race of faith upon this earth. The pain and suffering of these past few months and her struggles throughout the years...all that is past. Paul promises that the sufferings we experience upon this earth are small potatoes when compared to the glories of heaven.

None of this truth erases our desire to have Ramona with us for more days of making memories, for more conversations, and simply because we already miss her so very much. There is a piece of us that feels this way even though we know extending her life upon this earth would extend her suffering. We feel like this because we want our loved ones to be present at the great occasions of our life that lay in the future.

That is why Hebrews 12:1 is so important to those who have lost loved ones like Ramona. It pictures all the company of heaven gathered in an amphitheater watching us as we continue to run this race of faith. They are cheering us on, encouraging us to **set our heart on the kingdom and God's goodness, so that all those riches Mona inherited will be ours in due time!** In mysterious ways, we do not fully understand our loved ones are present during the important events of our lives.

Convinced that the end of the world is near, the writer of I Peter provides a guide for how we should act towards other Christians and those in the world. I chose this passage because verse 9 captured Virginia's conduct towards me and others within the church: **Be hospitable to one another without complaining.** 

When we learned early in 2000 that in July we would be moving to Rosewood Heights, we soon received cards of welcome from Florence Hendricks and Virginia Scott. Neither of them served on the Staff-Parish Relations Committee, but both were glad we had been appointed to St. Paul. They were especially thrilled that we had a young daughter so there would be a child in the parsonage.

The cards didn't cease after we arrived at St. Paul. We would get birthday and anniversary cards from Florence and Virginia, but sometimes we would get cards of encouragement and reminders that they were praying for our ministry.

I know that they sent cards to others in the congregation. Like good stewards of the manifold grace of God, serve one another with whatever gift each of you has received. Both Virginia and Florence served with the gift of hospitality.

I could easily imagine how Virginia used this gift of hospitality in her work at the Wood River Bank; cheerfully greeting her coworkers and clients. The gift of hospitality is easily overlooked, but it like all the gifts God imparts to us may be used to glorify our God.

More and more, I hear people remark how uncivil our society has become. Rudeness and unkindness has become commonplace. We have become a society divided into hostile camps. We have forgotten the truth that **love covers a multitude of sins**. We could use more of the hospitality that came so naturally to Virginia.

Virginia wasn't perfect. Like all of us she was a sinner in need of a Savior. She had a Savior in Jesus Christ. Jesus had cleansed her sins and made her whole. Jesus had given her the strength to serve Him and Him only.

It has been hard for all of us to watch Virginia to lose interest in following her beloved Cardinals and other sports teams. Or if no sports were on TV, usually there was Gunsmoke or some other western. She no longer talked about her beloved dogs.

When she slipped away from this earth, Virginia fell into the loving arms of her Savior; Jesus her faithful companion and friend. While I am a little sad for myself, I am happy for Virginia. For she had committed her life to Jesus a long time ago. Whether she was on this earth or in heaven, she is the Lord's. She has always been the Lord's.

The promise Jesus made to Virginia has been fulfilled. She has received the crown of righteousness that awaits all of us when we enter heaven. She has joined the saints singing the songs of victory around the throne. For as Peter notes, to God **belongs the glory and the power forever and ever.** Please keep Virginia's family in your prayers. Pastor Daryl

We must run the race that lies ahead of us and never give up. <sup>2</sup>We must focus on Jesus, the source and goal of our faith. Like Mona, we need to stop worrying and instead live fully in each moment, always trusting in God.

As difficult as it is, let us yield Ramona to God's care, the One who created her and loves her. For Ramona has not gone to a stranger's house, but rather to live in God's house.

Finally, let us be sure that our heart is where Ramona's was: valuing our family and friends, loving our neighbor, and trusting in Jesus as our Lord and Savior. For our heart reveals where our treasure is.

If we do this, then we will have learned well the lessons that Ramona taught us and one day we will see her again. We will join her in our Father's House and there we will dwell together forever and ever.



If you have a question about the thermostats please ask Jim Herndon or Pastor Fansler. Please refrain from just "pushing buttons" hoping to get it to do what you want.

Another bit of work crossed off, the "squirrel" windows were replaced on October 27th. We are making progress!!
