"Silent night, holy night, all is calm, all is bright round yon virgin mother and child.

Holy infant, so tender and mild, sleep in heavenly peace."

One of my favorite childhood memories is the 11 p.m. Christmas Eve service at our church. The sanctuary would plunge into darkness. The choir would light their candles from the Christ candle and pass the light to us. Gradually, the light of Christ would pass from person to person until every corner of the sanctuary glowed with the light. Then, we would sing "Silent night, holy night."

Although I knew how the service would end, awe always filled my soul. What wondrous love is this that almighty God entered into our lives as a baby. What wondrous love is this that the baby was born to die, so I might live. Kneeling in my mind at the foot of the manger, I realized how undeserved and amazing is God's grace.

As I plan the Christmas Eve services, sometimes I momentarily consider slipping another carol into the "Silent night, holy night" slot. I quickly abandon these thoughts because no other carol evokes the same feelings for me. "Silent night, holy night" is the porthole that transports us from this world into the holy presence of God. There we receive the infusion of awe and grace that we so desperately need.

In Debra's church, the children's Christmas pageant would be presented every Christmas Eve. Debra remembers the thrill of portraying Mary. Once you've been a Mary you're connected with her forever. In a small way, the Mary moments and feelings become your own: the wonder that almighty God would choose you as the mother of the savior. The pondering about all the events that first Christmas night. The great sorrow that arises from watching your baby boy die upon a cross.

At St. Paul, Meg loved the Christmas plays. Not only did she enjoy retelling the Christmas story, but this stage experience sparked a love for the theater that continued throughout High School. I am convinced it is why Meg looks forward to returning to New York and seeing Broadway shows.

I'm looking forward to seeing this year's Christmas Play, *The Christmas Cupcake*. It is my hope that our children become so caught up in the retelling the story of the first Christmas that it makes the story more real. And, in a mysterious way, the Christmas story becomes an integral part of their life story.

I want Christmas at St. Paul to be special for every child (and the child in every one of us.) This is my Christmas prayer for your family.

When we light our candles on Christmas Eve and sing "Silent night, holy night," I won't dismiss the moment with the thought: "Been there. Done that!" No, I'll think: "Been there. Done that. Need this!"

I need Christmas so very much, because I need to be transported once more into the presence of God. I need to hear these words: "For a child has been born for us, a son given to us; authority rests upon his shoulders; and he is named Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace."

We invite you to join us on Christmas Eve for the Family Service at 5 p.m. or the Traditional Service at 7 p.m. Those words from Isaiah will be the centerpiece of both services. See you on Christmas Eve. Pastor Daryl

P.S. We have one service on Christmas Day at 8:15 a.m.

We will sing the beloved Christmas carols another time before putting them away until next year.





Nurse's Notes for DECEMBER 2016 from Parish Nurse, Eileen Cheatham RN, BC, B.S.N.

Silent night, Holy Night, all is calm, all is bright- at least that is how we want our family Christmas to be! But not all of them turn out to be all merry and bright- do they? Christmas is a time to celebrate the birth of the Savior- celebrating with friends and participating in family get- togethers. Christmas celebrations are at church, at work, and at school. We even get with others to serve at volunteer opportunities- do you see where this is leading? Stress! Plus a lot of pressure to get everything just right. The kids are overexcited, and you are busy! There are trees to decorate, presents to buy and wrap, and food to cook; and don't forget choir practices! For others, Christmas is often a lonely time as family may not live close by- or maybe even passed away. For some, perhaps a relationship ended, or a loved ones is very ill, or may have died unexpectedly. Or a friend betrayed you, or something didn't go your way at a meeting. It's no wonder the joyous, festive holiday feeling can fizzle out. There is evidence that Christmas can put a strain on families. I wonder what the holiday would be like if we just took a rest from retail, a little break from Amazon and just focused on being still. What if we were able to have a real silent night? "Be still, and know that I am God; I will be exalted among the nations, I will be exalted in the earth." Psalm 46:10 NIV

Christmas is a joyous time, but the reality is that for many of us it's hard to experience that joy in the midst of all the turmoil and trials that are happening around us. But, just as God protected and guided Mary through a difficult time, allow Him to guide you this Christmas. Pray and share with Him what troubles your spirit, and allow Him to restore the joy of Christmas within you by holding you together.

Be still.... These words do not seem to have a place in the hustle and bustle of a busy life, especially at Christmas time. Parties, presents and projects usually have us in a frantic frenzy as we rush from one event to the next. Often, before we know it, Christmas day has come and gone and we realize that, despite our good intentions, we never experienced the peace that comes from truly relishing in God's amazing love for us. Isn't it interesting that God commands us to "**Be still**"? Do you think it's because He knows we sometimes have a hard time doing it on our own? That's what I think! What happens when we actually take time to be still? The answer lies in Psalm 46:10..."**Be still and know that I am God: I will be exalted among the nations, I will be exalted in the earth."**

When you are still before God, you better understand that whatever you are facing, whatever your day has been like, you can completely rest in the fact that God is God. He's sovereign. He doesn't need our help- and knows exactly what is going on every minute of every day. Even better, He knows you by name and longs to be present with you in the still, quiet time- right smack dab in the middle of the Christmas season! Spend time today purposely pursuing stillness in different moments.

Perhaps you could wrap up in a blanket & head outside for a peek at the stars, wondering what that holy star looked like, the one that signaled Christ's birth many years ago. Maybe take a minute to watch your young child sleep as you wonder what Mary and Joseph thought of their newborn son as you gaze at your own child's (or grandchild's) sweet face.

Open your Bible, read a favorite Scripture... then sit and be still. This year, don't miss out on what is better. Be present where you are, in His presence. That is the greatest gift!



Letter From the Council of Bishops of The United Methodist Church to President-elect, Donald Trump

Dear President-elect Trump:

On behalf of the Council of Bishops of The United Methodist Church, I offer congratulations to you, Mr. Trump, upon your election as the 45th president of the United States. Further, I thank Secretary Hillary Clinton for the gracious way she has accepted the voters' decision.

The Council's prayers are for you, your wife, Melania, and your family, and for Secretary Clinton, her husband, Bill, and their family, after such a tightly contested presidential race.

We are a deeply divided nation in a world community marred by division, war and unprecedented forced migration. This is a time for all Americans, particularly our political leaders, to put aside divisiveness and rancor and come together for the common good of this nation and the world. Thus, we pray for the healing of the nations and for God to grant you wisdom, compassion, moral conviction, courage and protection in your presidential leadership.

The Council of Bishops pledges to contribute to all efforts to build bridges to understanding that will lead to overcoming the gulfs that divide the nation and the world. I call to mind the best that is in us: we live under God; we are indivisible; and liberty and justice extend to all.

The following information is provided to clarify any misconceptions about our Mission Possible campaign and to further clarify how one might give to the cause. **Mission Possible** is a campaign to provide funding above and beyond our normal operational costs to address some much needed maintenance and renovation work at St. Paul. The primary target of the campaign is the replacement of our aging heating and air conditioning system (HVAC) as well as other much needed items for our church building and senior parsonage. We do this in large part as we consider the future of the ministry of St. Paul UMC and the over 50 diverse ministries that radiate from our church home, and as we consider the role our church building will play in future ministry.

The October 2015 Mission Possible Commitment Weekend was the kickoff to our fund raising campaign. So if you were absent or did not give to the campaign during that time, but now feel led to participate with your financial gifts, there is still plenty of time to participate.
