In the movie, *The Wizard of Oz*, Dorothy comes to a crossroads with Toto and wonders out loud: "*Now which way do we go?*" To her surprise, the scarecrow says, "*Pardon me, that way is a very nice way*" while pointing one direction. A moment later, the scarecrow says, "*It's pleasant that way, too*" while pointing the other direction. Finally, pointing both directions the scarecrow says, "*Of course, people do go both ways.*" Dorothy asks, "*Are you doing that on purpose or can't you make up your mind?*" The scarecrow claims his inability to decide isn't his fault because he doesn't have a brain.

There is an old cliché, "Not to decide is to decide." The subtle point is that we have a brain and with it we make choices. Choices do matter. The road taken leads us to a different destination than the road not taken.

The next sermon series, *At the Crossroads*, beginning March 5 has a double meaning. First, it reminds us that this is a season when we retrace the footsteps of Jesus on His journey to the cross. Walking down this road is a conscious choice on Jesus' part. It was love—not nails—that held Jesus upon the cross. Only this sacrifice offers the forgiveness we need and restores our relationship with God. Second, the sermon series reminds us that Jesus challenges all of us to choose which road we will walk. Will we follow in the footsteps of Jesus to the cross that awaits us or will we choose a different, easier way? The choice is ours!

As we stand at the crossroads and consider our options in life, let us remember these words of Jesus: "Don't be troubled. Believe in God, and believe in me. My Father's house has many rooms. If that were not true, would I have told you that I'm going to prepare a place for you? If I go to prepare a place for you, I will come again. Then I will bring you into my presence so that you will be where I am. You know the way to the place where I am going." Thomas said to him, "Lord, we don't know where you're going. So how can we know the way?" Jesus answered him, "I am the way, the truth, and the life. No one goes to the Father except through me. If you have known me, you will also know my Father. From now on you know him through me and have seen him in me." (John 14:1-7 God's Word)

Not to decide is to decide. And what we decide makes all the difference! We need to follow the way of Jesus for only His way leads to the life we desire and to the Father. See you at the crossroads! Pastor Daryl

There are a lot of fun happenings planned for this summer! Be on the lookout for announcements regarding the special services that will be offered during June, July, and August.



#### Nurse's Notes for MARCH 2017 from Parish Nurse, Eileen Cheatham RN, BC, B.S.N.

March is National Kidney Disease Awareness Month! Tucked away just below your ribcage near your spine are two bean-shaped organs known as the kidneys. And when they're quietly getting on with their job, it's easy to forget they're there and how important they are. But their absence, or even less-thanoptimal performance can have dire consequences. 1 in 3 Americans is at risk for kidney disease due to diabetes, high blood pressure, or a family history of kidney failure. There are more than 26 million Americans who already have kidney disease, and most don't know it because there are often no symptoms until the disease has progressed.



Kidney disease is the 9th leading cause of death in the country. More than 26 million Americans have kidney disease, and most don't know it. There are over 95,000 people waiting for kidney transplants. More than 590,000 people have kidney failure in the US today.

Sometimes what you can't see can kill you. Kidney disease is underdiagnosed and excessive protein in the urine (albuminuria) is one of the earliest signs of kidney damage. Usually invisible to the human eye, often this red flag for kidney disease is undetected because not enough people who are at risk are receiving urine testing.

The kidneys are two, fist-sized organs in your lower back. They maintain overall health through the following functions: Filtering waste out of 200 liters of blood each day, regulating of the body's salt, potassium and acid content, removing of drugs from the body, balancing the body's fluids, releasing hormones that regulate blood pressure, producing an active form of vitamin D that promotes strong, healthy bones, and controlling the production of red blood cells. Risk factors for kidney diseased include high blood pressure, diabetes, obesity, being over the age of 60, or having African American, Hispanic, or Asian descent. Diabetes damages the kidneys due to the high amount of sugar present in the body. The excess sugar damages the tiny filters in the kidneys. High blood pressure makes the kidneys have to work harder.

Kidney disease can be discovered with two simple tests: a urine test for protein (protein in the urine is a sign of kidney damage) and a blood test for creatinine which is used to measure the kidneys GFR, or glomerular filtration rate. The kidneys keep the creatinine level in the body at a "just right" level. The GFR is determined by the creatinine level, your age, race and gender. A normal GFR is 90. A GFR 60-89 may indicate kidney disease if there is protein in the urine. At this point you may be asked to lower your use of medications that can lead to kidney disease such as ibuprofen or reduce the dose of medications that are filtered by the kidneys. A GFR below 60 for 3 months or longer indicates kidney disease. A GFR of 15 or below is kidney failure.

What can you do to keep your kidneys healthy? Control your BP, control your blood sugar, lose weight if you are overweight, don't smoke, eat a healthy diet and exercise regularly.

Alton Memorial is once again having our **Daffodil Campaign** to benefit our cancer patients. Each year the hospital sells daffodils, with the money raised going to our Extra Mile fund for out cancer patients. This money helps our oncology patients at what is a very difficult and stressful time in their lives. Many patients have benefited from the fund. We will take pre-orders through Friday, March 3rd and then also sell them in the lobby on March 13th & 14th.

The tragic skiing accident of January 15, 1995, that claimed the life of Meghan Hickerson of Hartford, IL, will never be forgotten.

God has a way of healing hurt and turning tragedy into triumph. Meghan's death immediately gave life to several people, known collectively as "organ donor recipients." Her legacy of faith and service lives on through the "Meghan Hickerson Christian Teen Leader Memorial Scholarship" that is made available through St. Paul UMC.

She also set an example of faith and dedication by spreading God's love through her church and her academic life, to all she encountered. 
We encourage members to notify any student that may qualify and have them complete the application process. Application materials will be available through the counselors at the above mentioned schools or directly from the church office.

## We Say Goodbye To Our Dear Friend...



**Robert "Bob" Moon** 89, of Rosewood Heights passed away Tuesday February 14, 2017 at his home with his family at his side. He was born March 23, 1927 in Gillespie, IL to David Marshall & Pearl Ethel (Culp) Moon.

He married Sylvia F. Wolff April, 30, 1949 in Gillespie; she preceded him in death April 25, 2008.

He was a member of St. Paul United Methodist Church in Rosewood Heights, for over 50 years. He sang in choir and was a member of the Sweets Sounds. Bob was an Engineering Specialist and worked for 32 years at Shell Oil Refinery, retiring in 1989. He was a past Member of the Moose and continued to enjoy meeting there with the Shell Oil Retirement Group. He was a Veteran of the United States Navy and served during WWII. In December he took the Honor Flight to Washington D.C.

Bob was a devoted Christian, who believed in hard work. Honesty and integrity were his hallmarks. He was also a loving father and grandfather.

Bob is survived by two daughters and sons in law, Linda D. (Dennis) Ford of Jerseyville and Laura A. (Dwight) Tungett of Bethalto; three grandchildren and their spouses, Christa (Kyle) Kelly, Stephen (Yasmina) Tungett, and Bethany (Brett) Wassink and two great grandchildren, Addison and Brenley Kelly.

He was preceded in death by his parents, wife; grandson, Brian Robert Ford; brother, Clifford Moon; and sister, Vera Smith.

Bob's grandchildren singing the "Fruits of the Spirit" song during the Celebration of his life led me to share these thoughts.

<sup>27</sup> So God created man in his own image, in the image of God created he him; male and female created he them. <sup>28</sup> And God blessed them, and God said unto them, be fruitful, and multiply, and replenish the earth, and subdue it: and have dominion over the fish of the sea, and over the fowl of the air, and over every living thing that moveth upon the earth. (Genesis 1, KJV)

At first glance, this verse would seem out of place today. We understand this command of God to refer only to procreation—filling the earth with our children. It is true that this verse is interpreted in that narrow sense, but I believe it is too limited an understanding for our limitless God.

We are more than mere animals—cranking out children. We have been fashioned by God's own hands and his very breath breathes in us. We are made in God's own image. Adam and Eve are called to pass on to their children an understanding of their connectedness to God. They are the sons and daughters of God. God has entrusted to them the care of His creation.

Being fruitful for us entails incorporating the fruits of the spirit into our lives: love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control. If Bob and Sylvia had not shared these values with their children so they could in turn share them with their children, they would have failed in living out God's command in Genesis. We are called to be fruitful in all our relationships: with God, with Creation, with each other and with our children. This separates us from the animals over whom we have dominion.

One of the reasons we have gathered together in celebration of Bob's life is because we all have experienced the fruitfulness of Bob's life. We have come to give thanks for those times Bob showed us these fruits of the spirit. Bob's example has inspired us to pass these fruits on to others.

It is not enough to keep the faith, we are to share it. In his own quiet way, Bob shared his faith with his family, his friends and neighbors and those at St. Paul. Bob was not only fruitful, he also multiplied the faith that had been shared with him. While each family member had to take up the faith as their own, the faithful witness of Bob was a powerful factor in their decision. Bob laid a strong foundation for them.

Although he could no longer drive to church, Bob made it clear to Laura and Linda that he intended to still attend worship. I know that Bob's medical condition made them hesitant to allow others to pick him up, so they took turns bringing him to worship on Saturdays or Sundays. I appreciate their faithfulness.




# We Say Goodbye To Our Dear Friend...

**Benjamin "Ben" Moore,** 95, of Rosewood Heights, IL, passed away on Sat., February 18, 2017 at Alton Memorial Hospital in Alton, IL.

He was born on February 22, 1921, near Elwin, IL, the son of Jesse "Clyde" & Polly (Austin) Moore. He graduated from Macon High School and served our country in the U.S. Navy during World War II, stationed mainly at Pearl Harbor and the Philippines. Ben married Beulah Andricks on September 28, 1947, in Macon, IL, and they celebrated 69 years of marriage last fall.

Ben was a member of St. Paul United Methodist Church in Rosewood Heights. He worked for the U.S. Army Troop Support Command in St. Louis, retiring in 1980. He loved nature, fishing, being outside working in the yard, feeding birds, or sitting down with a good reference book. He was handy around the house and used to spend hours tinkering at his workbench. He had a great love of family and enjoyed telling stories about the family and of his early days.



Surviving are his wife, four children, Roger (Cathy) Moore of Cary, North Carolina, Shirley (Gary) Clark of Maryville, Rita (John) White of Rosewood Heights, and Duane (Sandy) Moore of Swansea, eight grandchildren and nine great- grandchildren, a brother, Joseph (Lola) of Bradenton, FL, and many nieces and nephews.

He was preceded by his parents; brothers, Donald, Paul, and Charles; sisters, Velma and Lois; and a grandson, James "Andy" Moore.

Ben and I both feed the birds in the neighborhood. Often, we compared notes on the variety of the birds frequenting our feeders. That was the inspiration behind this sermon.

These words are spoken as Jesus prepares the disciples to go out and share his message with others. It is not an easy message because they are repeating these words of Jesus from Mark: "The time promised by God has come at last!" he announced. "The Kingdom of God is near! Repent of your sins and believe the Good News!"

Just as they did with Jesus, some will accept this message and return to worshiping God while others will persist in their stubborn rebellion against God. When they are rejected, Jesus advises the disciples to shake the dust off their feet and move on to the next home.

Jesus' purpose in mentioning the sparrows is to encourage the disciples to persevere in this difficult ministry. The sparrows aren't sold as pets, but rather in the Temple as an animal sacrifice to God. Sparrows what the poor bought for their sacrifices because it was all they could afford.

Jesus' message is that we have a God who notices if even one sparrow falls to the ground. If God pays attention to the least in His creation, how much more He will take note of us: the very height of creation.

Our God has formed us with His own hands from the earth and breathed into us His own breath. Stamped upon our heart is the very image of God. God knows each one of us intimately and by name. Why God even knows the number of hairs upon our head.

The key to this whole passage is found in verse 28. I love the way The Message puts it: "DON'T BE BLUFFED INTO SILENCE BY THE THREATS OF BULLIES. THERE'S NOTHING THEY CAN DO TO YOUR SOUL, YOUR CORE BEING. SAVE YOUR FEAR FOR GOD, WHO HOLDS YOUR ENTIRE LIFE—BODY AND SOUL—IN HIS HANDS."

While we wept as Ben Moore passed from this world into the next, we knew that his soul never left God's loving hands. A long time ago, Ben had given his life to God. So as we weep today, we weep in the assurance that we will see Ben again. We shall be reunited with Ben and all those who have gone before us.

We believe that we are saved by grace through faith; not good works like attending church. However, showing up Sunday after Sunday reminds everyone which side you are own. I know that Bob & Sylvia showed up because they were thankful for the abundant blessings that God had poured into their lives. God deserved all the praise they could offer Him!

Paul reminds us in the passage from 2 Corinthians that these earthly bodies of ours were never meant to permanent. They are a like a tent that is quickly taken down once it is no longer needed. Nor is this earth our home. We are only passing through.

Bob was a member of our Sweet Sounds group. One of the songs they often sang goes like this:

This world is not my home, I'm just passing through My treasures are laid up somewhere beyond the blue The angels beckon me from Heaven's open door And I can't feel at home in this world anymore.

They're all expecting me and that's one thing I know My Savior pardoned me and now I onward go I know He'll take me through though I am weak and poor And I can't feel at home in this world anymore.

#### Refrain:

O Lord, you know I have no friend like you If Heaven's not my home, then Lord what will I do? The angels beckon me from Heaven's open door And I can't feel at home in this world anymore.

Just up in glory land we'll live eternally
The Saints on every hand are shouting victory
Their song of sweetest praise drifts back from Heaven's shore
And I can't feel at home in this world anymore.

Bob has arrived home and while we weep, we weep as those with hope. The certain hope that we shall see Bob and all of our loved ones again. Meanwhile, we are called to live out the command of God in Genesis—to be fruitful and multiply—especially in terms of sharing the fruits of the spirit with all whom we meet. In this way, we live the lessons that Bob taught us.

When Jesus lays out the plan of ministry for the disciples, he begins with this charge in Matthew 10: "DON'T BEGIN BY TRAVELING TO SOME FAR-OFF PLACE TO CONVERT UNBELIEVERS. AND DON'T TRY TO BE DRAMATIC BY TACKLING SOME PUBLIC ENEMY. GO TO THE LOST, CONFUSED PEOPLE RIGHT HERE IN THE NEIGHBORHOOD."

I lift up these words to reinforce the value of Ben Moore's gentle, kind evangelism. His telling of the good news involved more listening than preaching. His evangelism consisted of loving people where they were at rather than where you wished they were.

We who are gathered here today—family, friends, neighbors, fellow worshipers are proof that you don't have to be dramatic to be an effective witness to Jesus Christ. We are here because the seed of faith in our lives has been planted, fertilized and strengthened by Ben. Without his encouragement, none of us would be as far along as we are in this journey of faith. We praise God for this precious life that has been shared with us.

The God who notices the sparrow has not overlooked Ben Moore. God caught Ben before he hit the ground and gathered him into his loving arms and gently carried him home. This is what we believe. This is what we celebrate today.

Please keep Beulah & Ben's whole family in your prayers. Pastor Daryl







To-date **we have finished 79%** of our original priority work and we are still only at an indebtedness level of \$159,000 of which \$71,000 is owed to the St. Paul Endowment Fund. We appreciate very much the **special fund raising activities**, in addition to the Capital Fund Campaign, that have taken place to help us meet our renovation needs. The **Souper Bowl Party Soup/Chili Cook-Off**, **Singing Telegrams For Your Valentine**, the **WOW Chicken & Noodles Dinner**, and the upcoming **Trivia Night** in these first few months of 2017 have been a God-send in terms of allowing us to look not only at the projects we have left but to also look at meeting additional needs that have "popped up" since our Mission Possible kickoff. As we continue to look at our three levels of priorities, very soon we will be providing you with some information relative to participation in a phone tree opportunity that does not have an annual fee, nor does it require purchasing expensive equipment to run the program, nor will it allow the selling of your contact information to another vendor. This technological opportunity will allow the church to communicate with congregants, above and beyond the newsletter and bulletins, even more effectively and timely, especially as regards inclement weather issues, at a very affordable price. More information to come on this advancement will be posted in next month's newsletter, if not before.

An important focus of the Trustees, as we look at the remaining work and any additional needs that have come along, will be to determine how much, if any, additional loaned money we will need vs. our ability as a church to meet the monthly payment on the loans. In short, we take very seriously our "charge" to serve as good stewards of the St. Paul funds via your contributions. Providing your gift(s):


