At its May meeting, the Church Council asked the Awakening Team and the Worship Ministry Team to work together on a new design for the worship service at 10:30 a.m. on Sunday morning. The redesigned service would be rolled out in September and include music played by a worship band. (When this service debuts, the Awakening Service on Saturday nights would cease.) The 8:15 a.m. worship service would remain a traditional service (except during the summers whenever we worship outside).

Our desire is to create a worship service at 10:30 a.m. that would connect more generations and more people with Christ. I will share more specifics with you as our worship group does its work. At this point the only label that I will place upon our work is that I desire to create a worship service at 10:30 a.m. that is *indigenous*. The definition of *indigenous* is: *originating in and characteristic of a particular region or country; native*. We want a worship service that is natural for those who worship at St. Paul. The Church Council, for example, has decided that the Worship Choir and Bell Choir will continue to sing and play during the 10:30 a.m. service.

In his book, *How to Start a New Service*, Charles Arn says that two themes should be present in every worship service: *1/You are loved by a personal God and personally by God's family, and 2/There is hope. Love helps us manage the present; hope helps us face the future.* I have shared these two themes with the worship group, so we may strive to design worship that assures us of God's love for us and gives us eternal hope. In this crazy world we live in, we need these two things more than ever. We want to share with our neighbors the love and hope that we have found in Jesus Christ!

We know that our work needs to be surrounded by prayer. We ask all of you to pray each day for the worship group involved in this redesigning process. Please pray that we may offer a service at 10:30 a.m. that connects multiple generations to Jesus Christ. Please pray that we may start small groups that help people grow in discipleship. Please pray that we provide more opportunities for hands on service for those attending our worship services. Please pray that God may do a *new thing* through us that will enable all of us to be more faithful disciples of Jesus Christ. Pastor Daryl



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Nurse's Notes for JUNE 2017 from Parish Nurse, Eileen Cheatham RN, BC, B.S.N.

As spring turns to summer and you spend more time outdoors, don't forget how important it is to protect your skin from the sun's harsh rays. One in five Americans will develop skin cancer in the course of a lifetime. Skin cancer takes on a very personal meaning for me as my dad died from squamous cell carcinoma. It started on the inner cheek in his mouth, but he did not have it checked as recommended by the dentist until it was too far advanced. He died a very painful death in 2009.

Skin cancer occurs when mutations form in the DNA of skin cells, causing them to grow out of control. Usually, the damage results from exposure to ultraviolet (UV) radiation, which comes from the sun and artificial rays (tanning beds, sunlamps). Skin cancer most often appears in areas that are exposed to the sun, such as the face, head, neck, hands, lips, ears and scalp. However, the disease can also develop in other areas. About 90 percent of non-melanoma skin cancers are associated with exposure to ultraviolet (UV) radiation from the sun.

Some statistics: 1. On average, a person's risk for melanoma doubles if he or she has had more than five sunburns. **2.** Regular daily use of an SPF 15 or higher sunscreen reduces the risk of developing squamous cell carcinoma by about 40 percent, and the risk of developing melanoma by 50 percent. **3.** More than 419,000 cases of skin cancer in the U.S. each year are linked to **indoor tanning**, including about 245,000 basal cell carcinomas, 168,000 squamous cell carcinomas, and 6,200 melanomas. **4.** People who first use a tanning bed before age 35 increase their risk for melanoma by 75 percent.

5. The estimated 5-year melanoma survival rate for blacks is only 69 percent, versus 93 percent for whites.

People with certain risk factors are more likely than others to develop skin cancer. Risk factors vary for different types of skin cancer, but *some general risk factors* are:

A lighter natural skin color... Family history of skin cancer... A personal history of skin cancer... Exposure to the sun through work and play... A history of sunburns, especially early in life... A history of indoor tanning... Skin that burns, freckles, reddens easily, or becomes painful in the sun... Fair skin... Blond or red hair... Large number of moles...

The incidence of melanoma in African Americans is much lower than in Caucasians due to the additional melanin, or pigment, in the skin. While this pigment offers some sun protection, dark brown or black skin is **not** a guarantee against melanoma. Once African Americans are diagnosed with melanoma, studies have shown that their long-term survival is **significantly lower** than that of Caucasians, 58.8 percent compared to 84.8 percent.

<u>The Skin Cancer Foundation</u> recommends a sunscreen with an SPF 15 or higher as one important part of a complete sun protection regimen. Sunscreen alone is not enough. Here are other tips:

- ► Seek the shade, especially between 10 AM and 4 PM.
- ▶ Do not burn. Avoid tanning and UV tanning booths.
- ▶ Cover up with clothing, including a broad-brimmed hat and UV-blocking sunglasses.
- ▶ Use a broad spectrum (UVA/UVB) sunscreen with an SPF of 15 or higher every day. For extended outdoor activity, use a water-resistant, broad spectrum sunscreen with an SPF of 30 or higher. Apply 1 ounce (2 tablespoons) of sunscreen to your entire body 30 minutes before going outside. Reapply every two hours or immediately after swimming or excessive sweating.
 - ▶ Keep newborns out of the sun. Sunscreens should be used on babies over the age of six months.
 - **► Examine your skin** head-to-toe every month.
 - ▶ See your physician every year for a professional skin assessment each year.

When UV rays reach the skin's inner layer, the skin makes more melanin. Melanin is the pigment that colors the skin. It moves toward the outer layers of the skin and becomes visible as a tan.

<u>For the Littles</u>....Just a few serious sunburns can increase your child's risk of skin cancer later in life. Kids don't have to be at the pool, beach, or on vacation to get too much sun. Their skin needs protection from the sun's harmful ultraviolet (UV) rays whenever they're outdoors.

<u>Seek shade</u>. UV rays are strongest and most harmful during midday, so it's best to plan indoor activities then. If this is not possible, seek shade under a tree, an umbrella, or a pop-up tent. Use these options to prevent sunburn, not to seek relief after it's happened.

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<u>Cover up.</u> When possible, long-sleeved shirts and long pants and skirts can provide protection from UV rays. Clothes made from tightly woven fabric offer the best protection. A wet T-shirt offers much less UV protection than a dry one, and darker colors may offer more protection than lighter colors. Some clothing certified under international standards comes with information on its ultraviolet protection factor.

<u>Get a hat</u>. Hats that shade the face, scalp, ears, and neck are easy to use and give great protection. Baseball caps are popular among kids, but they don't protect their ears and neck. If your child chooses a cap, be sure to protect exposed areas with sunscreen.

Wear sunglasses. They protect your child's eyes from UV rays, which can lead to cataracts later in life.

Apply sunscreen. Use sunscreen with at least SPF 15 and UVA and UVB (broad spectrum) protection every time your child goes outside. For the best protection, apply sunscreen generously 30 minutes before going outdoors. Don't forget to protect ears, noses, lips, and the tops of feet. Take sunscreen with you to reapply during the day, especially after your child swims or exercises. This applies to waterproof and water-resistant products as well.

Follow the directions on the package for using a sunscreen product on babies less than 6 months old. All products do not have the same ingredients; if your or your child's skin reacts badly to one product, try another one or call a doctor. Your baby's best defense against sunburn is avoiding the sun or staying in the shade.

Keep in mind, sunscreen is not meant to allow kids to spend more time in the sun than they would otherwise. Try combining sunscreen with other options to prevent UV damage.

Oops! Kids often get sunburned when they are outdoors unprotected for longer than expected. Remember to plan ahead, and keep sun protection handy—in your car, bag, or child's backpack...**Too Much Sun Hurts!** Turning pink? Unprotected skin can be damaged by the sun's UV rays in as little as 15 minutes. Yet it can take up to 12 hours for skin to show the full effect of sun exposure. So, if your child's skin looks "a little pink" today, it may be burned tomorrow morning. To prevent further burning, get your child out of the sun.

Tanning and Teens? There's no other way to say it—tanned skin is damaged skin. Any change in the color of your skin after time outside—whether sunburn or suntan—indicates damage from UV rays.

The Weather: Cool and cloudy? Children still need protection. UV rays, not the temperature, do the damage. Clouds do not block UV rays, they filter them—and sometimes only slightly.

If you find something suspicious you can also take advantage of the free skin screenings at Alton Memorial Hospital. The screenings are offered the second Wednesday of each month at our Cancer Center. You can call 1-800-392-0936. The skin screening is just what is says- a "screening". If something looks suspicious enough for a biopsy or special medication then an appointment will need to be made with Dr. Ahmed or a dermatologist of your choice. If you have any questions, please ask.

The following information is provided to clarify information about our Mission Possible campaign and to further clarify how one might give to the cause. **Mission Possible** is a campaign to provide funding above and beyond our normal operational costs to address some much needed maintenance and renovation work at St. Paul. The primary target of the campaign is the replacement of our aging heating and air conditioning system (HVAC) as well as other much needed items for our church building and senior parsonage. We do this in large part as we consider the future of the ministry of St. Paul UMC and the over 50 diverse ministries that radiate from our church home, and as we consider the role our church building will play in future ministry.

The October 2015 Mission Possible Commitment Weekend was the kickoff to our fund raising campaign. So if you were absent or did not give to the campaign during that time, but now feel led to participate with your financial gifts, there is still plenty of time to participate. In order that we can know where we stand with pledges, we ask that you fill out a commitment card (which is available in the church office) if you plan to give to the Mission Possible Campaign.
