

"The message of the cross is foolish to those who are headed for destruction! But we who are being saved know it is the very power of God." I Corinthians 10:18

It is interesting that in many of the churches we baby boomers built, the cross was absent. Some argued that it was meaningless to those outside the church while others viewed it as a negative symbol.

Now, there is no rule that says a church has to have a cross. You could have the most elegant cross in the world adorning the front of your sanctuary and still not be living the teachings of Christ.

However, it is interesting to note that those churches that are being repurposed or built by millennials have crosses. Symbols that signify our faith are important to this generation. The cross is a reminder of so many truths: Jesus lives, Jesus is at the center of our faith, Jesus' way is a way of sacrifice. You may wish to add some thoughts of your own.

The millennials present in our churches want the world to know that the cross is the very power of God. There is no other way for a disciple of Jesus than the way of the cross.

Writing to a church that has lost its way and is mired in spiritual conflict and confusion, Paul mentions Jesus 10 times within the first 10 verses of the first letter to the church at Corinth. He is convinced that the first step out of their troubles is to restore Christ to His place at the center of the church. We are not followers of Apollos or Peter or Paul. We are followers of Jesus! All that we say and do should glorify Jesus!

For Paul, the crucified Christ is always at the center of our faith. Paul makes it clear that if we want to follow Jesus, then we need to take up our crosses. The way of the cross alone leads to the life we truly desire. It is the way of the cross that leads home.

THE WAY OF THE CROSS IS ONE OF DISCIPLESHIP. Bishop Will Willimon has written: "*Christian discipleship means finding out where Jesus is going and then following him.*" We are called to follow a person, not a new law. The goal for each of us is to become more like our Lord. You and I will never be perfect like Jesus, but the good news is that we can come closer this year than last. And we will certainly be closer than if we had never tried to model ourselves after our Lord.

THE WAY OF THE CROSS IS ONE OF COMMITMENT. In a small college town, a bar frequented by students ran the following ad in the campus paper during the day before Parents' Weekend: "Bring your parents for lunch on Saturday. We'll pretend that we don't know you." The ad was soon answered by the college chaplain, who posted a revised version on the campus bulletin board. It read: "Bring your parents to chapel on Sunday. We'll pretend we know you well."

It's so easy to slip onto other paths than the pathway of Jesus. It is difficult to keep our feet committed to the way of the cross. So often before I step into difficult situations I pray saying, "Lord, what have you gotten me into? I didn't sign onto doing this when you said, 'Follow me.' And Jesus answers, 'Yes, it's all in the small print. Anyway, I'm with you so everything will be alright.' " Jesus leads us down paths we would rather not walk, ministering to people we would rather not meet. Still, we go, not because we want to, but because we have made this promise to Jesus. We only need to see far enough to see Jesus walking before us. We only need to trust in Jesus.

THE WAY OF THE CROSS IS HARD. On Good Friday Christians in Jerusalem retrace the steps of Jesus along the Via Delorosa, the road leading to the cross. While that is a meaningful spiritual pilgrimage and one I hope to make one day, the truth is that every day we Christians walk the Via Delorosa, the way of the cross.

Dr. Rodney E. Wilmoth, pastor at St. Paul's United Methodist Church in Omaha, Nebraska asked a group of 9 & 10 yr. olds to write a letter about their experience in the worship service. Loreen, 9, wrote: *"Dear Reverend, I think more people would come to church if you would move it to Disneyland."* Children are honest. We always want an easier, softer way. We always seek a way that doesn't require much sacrifice from us.

It's hard to walk the way of the cross, but it is the true way. This is the only way that leads home. Home to God.

I am thankful for the millennials who are leading us back to the basics of faith. We need a cross at the front of our churches to remind us that the church isn't Disneyland. Our churches are filled with sinners whom the cross has transformed and Christ has called. Our churches are filled with those who are saved—not by their own good-ness—but only by the free-wheeling grace of God. The blood of Christ shed upon the cross washes us clean and sets us upon the way that leads to life; not destruction. The cross at the front of our church proclaims that what draws us together into this community is the crucified Christ who has saved us all.

THE WAY OF THE CROSS IS REWARDING. After the death of Jesus, the way of Jesus seemed to hit a dead end. It was the end of the road. On the cross, evil seemed to triumph. The way of Jesus seemed to promise the disciples an early death instead of eternal life. The Resurrection is the sign of our victory in Jesus. The Resurrection reveals that the way of Jesus is no dead end, but the only way that leads to the abundant life we desire.

Ernst Kasemann, the New Testament Scholar, takes us back to the beginning of the church when the cross was a scandal. The cross was a roadblock to belief. If you were a Jew, one who died upon a tree was cursed. If you were a Greek, why would you follow a teacher whose teachings resulted in his death? It was not a popular decision to follow Jesus. This is why Paul remarks that: *"The message of the cross is foolish to those who are headed for destruction! But we who are being saved know it is the very power of God."*

There is an old gospel hymn, The Way of the Cross Leads Home. It goes like this:

I must needs go home by the way of the cross, there's no other way but this; I shall ne'er get sight of the Gates of Light, if the way of the cross I miss.


I must needs go on in the blood-sprinkled way, the path that the Savior trod, If I ever climb to the heights sublime, where the soul is home with God.

Then I bid farewell to the way of the world, to walk in it never more; For my Lord says "Come," and I seek my home, where he waits at the open door.

The way of the cross leads home, the way of the cross leads home; It is sweet to know, as I onward go, the way of the cross leads home.

As we gather for worship on Sundays, the cross at the front of our sanctuary beckons to us to follow this way. It isn't the popular way, the easiest way, but ultimately it is the most fulfilling way. It is the way that leads us home. Pastor Daryl

P.S. I along with other leaders in the church have been reading "*I Will: Nine Traits Of The Outwardly Focused Christian*" by Thom Rainer and this was a message that I needed to hear once more. Rainer pushes us to move from saying "*I want,*' to saying '*I will.*' I believe the key for me to make this transition is to focus once more on the *crucified Christ.* This isn't my church. It isn't our church. It is Christ's church.



Nurse's Notes for AUGUST 2017 from Parish Nurse, Eileen Cheatham RN, BC, B.S.N.

Sitting is the new smoking. Or at least this is part of the research being done at Mayo Clinic in Arizona. According to Dr. James Levine, who commented in a recent interview, "Sitting is more dangerous than smoking, kills more people than HIV, and is more treacherous than parachuting. We are sitting ourselves to death." One of his studies involved people who sat in front of the TV less than two hours each day and compared with those who had more than four hours. Sitting in front of the TV isn't the only concern, **any extended sitting** — such as behind a desk at work or behind the wheel — can be harmful. What's more,



spending a few hours a week at the gym or otherwise engaged in moderate or vigorous activity doesn't seem to significantly offset the risk. It has to do with getting up and moving during the day; the solution seems to be less sitting and more moving overall. You might start by simply standing rather than sitting whenever you have the chance, or think about ways to walk while you work, or while at home.

Here are some facts concerning sitting...whether it's sitting at work, while driving or watching TV, playing video games, or staring down at our cell phones-

•Excessive sitting has been linked to heart disease, diabetes, cancers, muscle degeneration, leg disorders, obesity, poor mental health and abnormal cholesterol levels, to name just some.

•Our metabolism slows down 90 percent after 30 minutes of sitting, causing our muscles to burn less fat and our blood to flow more slowly.

•In a study that compared adults who spent less than two hours a day sitting verses those who sat more than 2 hours a day-those who sat had a 50 percent increase in death and a 125 percent increase of a cardiovascular incident.

•The results of a large scale epidemiological study reported that children throughout the world sit for about 8.5 hours each day. Findings suggest children who sit too long suffer from the same negative health consequences as adults.

•Activity levels among children drop significantly after age 8, especially for girls.

•The muscle activity needed for standing and other movement seems to trigger important processes related to the breakdown of fats and sugars within the body. When you sit these processes stall. This could attribute to an increase risk of diabetes or obesity.

•The average American sits for between 7.7-15 hours a day!

So what can you do to increase your physical activity and improve your health? Move!

•Stand while talking on the phone or eating lunch. Park farther out in the lot if eating out.

•Walk laps with your friends, either instead of gathering for coffee, or right after you finish.

• Take the stairs whenever possible. Take a walk after you eat. Getting short bursts of activity, even as little as working out for 10 minutes a day, is very beneficial for your health and can offset the detrimental effects of being sedentary.

•Breaking up your activity is the key to keeping your body healthy; try this every 30 minutes for every half hour of working at your desk, sit for 20 minutes, stand for 8 minutes and move around and stretch for 2 minutes. Sitting itself is not the real issue; it is extended sitting that needs to be recognized and addressed.

Check out the bulletin board for more ideas! Just stay as active as possible, so that you can be available to serve the Lord more effectively each day!

such items, you may want to buy them for the fall collection during the summer.


When the worker from Head Start picks the items up in early

November they are distributed within the week to low income families in our area. Thank you so much!







The school supplies will be distributed the week of August 13th!




CAMPING...CAMPING...CAMPING
