Our sermon series, *Finding Your Way Back to God*, ends on October 22nd with the theme: *Awakening to Life: "Now this is living!"* Besides highlighting that Jesus provides the opportunity to be a new creation, I will remind us that this new life is lived in community. We were created to live in relationship with God and each other.

Unless some people will have connected, reconnected or grown deeper in their connection with God, I will have failed in my goal for this sermon series. More than this, we should recognize that we are not meant to live the Christian life alone. John Wesley, the father of Methodism, said: "There is no such thing as solitary Christians." Dave & Jon Ferguson end their book, Finding Your Way Back to God, with these words: "we encourage you to find your place in the community of other grateful sons and daughters of the Father. Connect with them, learn from them, and work alongside them to make a difference for good in marriages, homes, schools, workplaces, and communities. And together, let's keep helping others find their way back to God. That's where the real celebration is waiting." My expectation is that we will welcome and find places of service for those newly connected to our church.

I once read an article about the Academy Awards that told how they employ people to serve as place-holders. When a star gets up to present or receive an award, the placeholder slips into their seat. When the camera pans the crowd, the producer doesn't want to see any empty seats.

Sometimes, we feel like placeholders in the church. We are filling the pews until the real stars show up to reclaim their place. We are certain that God should have chosen someone wiser and more talented than us to be the church. So we keep looking around for someone else to step up and be the church. This isn't how God feels about us. This is how we feel about ourselves. No, God tells us in I Peter 2: "But you are the ones chosen by God, chosen for the high calling of priestly work, chosen to be a holy people. God's instruments to do his work and speak out for him, to tell others of the night-and-day difference he made for you—from nothing to something, from rejected to accepted." The Message

We aren't placeholders, but rather we are the church. We are the Body of Christ in Rosewood Heights. God doesn't twiddle His thumbs until the best and brightest show up to accomplish His work. God uses us, even us to do the good works He created us to do!

A preacher tells the story of a discussion between the angel Gabriel and Jesus shortly after Jesus has left his disciples. Gabriel and Jesus are looking at the ragtag band of disciples and apostles praying in the Upper Room on the Day of Pentecost.

"Master," asked Gabriel, "what's your plan? Are these the ones you're sending out into all the world to spread your glorious gospel?"

Jesus answered, "That's right, Gabriel. Those are the ones."

"You're trusting them with the Good News? Just those disciples?" Gabriel wondered.

"Yes, I am," Jesus stated firmly.

"But Lord," the angel protested, "what if they fail? What's your plan then?"

Jesus told Gabriel, "I have no other plan. I'm counting on them."

Jesus doesn't have a Plan B. We are it. We are the church. Jesus is counting upon us; no one else. Do not fear for our God is a great God who can use even us to accomplish His work.

I have encouraged everyone to bet on God for 30 days—the length of the sermon series. At the crux of the bet is this prayer: "God, if you are real, make yourself real to me." I believe that God will answer



this prayer for many. People will find themselves living the abundant life offered by Jesus. And, when this happens it is our role as the church to pray for them, encourage them, and teach them how to be followers of Jesus. In other words, we must be the church! Pastor Daryl


Sundays at St. Paul in OCTOBER 8:15 & 10:30 A.M. Services

"More Jesus Time" for Pre-school - 5th grade and Nursery is provided during the 10:30 a.m. service.


Our 8:15 a.m. service is a traditional service with hymns played upon our beautiful pipe organ by Rhonda Griffin. The Pastor leads worship clothed in a robe and stole. Communion is usually celebrated on the first Sunday of the month.

Our 10:30 a.m. service—Awakening—is based upon this verse from 2 Chronicles 16:9: "God's eyes range from to and fro throughout the Earth looking to strengthen the person that would bend their heart toward Him." Nurse's Notes for OCTOBER 2017 from Parish Nurse, Eileen Cheatham RN, BC, B.S.N.

The arrival of a new school year and cooler temperatures also means the arrival of flu vaccines in doctors' offices, pharmacies, clinics, work places, and school campuses. Influenza (flu) is a contagious respiratory illness caused by influenza viruses. It can cause mild to severe illness. Serious outcomes of flu infection can result in hospitalization or death. Some people, such as older people, young children, and people with certain health conditions, are at high risk of serious flu complications.

Signs and Symptoms of Flu: People who have the flu often feel some or all of these signs and symptoms: Fever or feeling feverish/chills, cough, sore throat, runny or stuffy nose, muscle or body aches, headaches, and fatigue. Some people may have vomiting and diarrhea, though this is more common in children than adults.

How Flu Spreads: most often it is spread by droplets when people with the flu virus cough, sneeze or talk. These droplets can land in the mouths or noses of people who are nearby. Less often, a person might also get flu by touching a surface or object that has flu virus on it and then touching their own mouth, eyes or possibly their nose.

Period of Contagiousness: You may be able to pass on the flu to someone else before you know you are sick, as well as while you are sick. Most healthy adults may be able to infect others beginning 1 day before symptoms develop and up to 5 to 7 days after becoming sick. Some people, especially young children and people with weakened immune systems, might be able to infect others for an even longer time.

Onset of Symptoms: The time from when a person is exposed to flu virus to when symptoms begin is about 1 to 4 days, with an average of about 2 days.

Can a flu shot give you the flu? The flu shot doesn't cause flu infection. The shot is not a live virus vaccine, it's an inactivated vaccine, and it can't replicate in the body.

Side effects from the influenza shot are soreness, redness, tenderness or swelling where the shot was given. Low-grade fever, headache and muscle aches also may occur.

What about people who get a seasonal flu vaccine and still get sick with flu symptoms? There are several reasons why someone might get a flu symptoms, even after they have been vaccinated against flu.

- **1. Some people** can become ill from other respiratory viruses besides flu such as rhinoviruses, which are associated with the common cold. They can cause symptoms similar to flu, and also spread and cause illness during the flu season. The flu vaccine only protects against influenza, not other illnesses.
- 2. It is possible to be exposed to influenza viruses, which cause the flu, shortly before getting vaccinated or during the two-week period after vaccination that it takes the body to develop immune protection. This exposure may result in a person becoming ill with flu before protection from the vaccine takes effect.
- 3. A third reason why some people may experience flu like symptoms despite getting vaccinated is that they may have been exposed to a flu virus that is very different from the viruses the vaccine is designed to protect against. The ability of a flu vaccine to protect a person depends largely on the similarity or "match" between the viruses selected to make the vaccine and those spreading and causing illness. CDC and the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP) recommend that flu vaccinations begin by the end of October, if possible.

Is the "stomach flu" really the flu? No. Many people use the term "stomach flu" to describe illnesses with nausea, vomiting or diarrhea. These symptoms can be caused by many different viruses, bacteria or even parasites. While vomiting, diarrhea, and being nauseous or "sick to your stomach" can sometimes be related to the flu — more commonly in children than adults — these problems are rarely the main symptoms of influenza. The flu is a respiratory disease and not a stomach or intestinal disease.

What are the benefits of flu vaccination? While how well the flu vaccine works can vary, there are a lot of reasons to get a flu vaccine each year. The flu vaccination can keep you from getting sick with flu.

Flu vaccination can reduce the risk of flu-associated hospitalization, including among children and older adults. Flu vaccination also may make your illness milder if you do get sick. Getting vaccinated yourself also protects people around you, including those who are more vulnerable to serious flu illness, like babies and young children, older people, and people with certain chronic health conditions.

Dr. Jill Woodward, pharm D will give the flu vaccines at St. Paul's on Tuesday, October 17th from 9 to 11 a.m. Should you want to have another vaccine, such as shingles or the pneumonia vaccine you can call her at the Wood River Medicine Shoppe at 618-259-0085. At that time she will be able to take your insurance information and tell you the price of the vaccine (if any) and then will have it available for you that day.

Enjoy your October- and please remember to get vaccinated!


We Say Goodbye To Our Friend...



He was involved in the farm implement business, tractor and truck sales, and former co-owner of Dougherty-Sullivan John Deere Dealership in Effingham, IL. He was also member of the Lions Club of East Alton, IL, and former President of the Board of Directors of IHSA (Illinois High School Association). He enjoyed watching sports, particularly rooting for the St. Louis Cardinals. His hobbies included, boating, fishing, snowmobile riding, golfing, and badgering Cub fans. Mr. Sullivan will be dearly missed.

Pat used his Administrative skills not only in his work as the principal of Roxana High School, but also in service of his Lord. Among the positions he served during my time at St. Paul were Chair of the Administrative Council, Vice-Chair of the Elevator Committee, and member of the Finance Committee. Pat was always willing to share in a concise, clear presentation why participation in the church is important for your spiritual life.

Whenever we met to prepare agendas and discuss church business, our conversations usually strayed to a discussion of high school and college basketball. Although Pat no longer coached, he remained an ardent hoops fan. I know Pat spent a lot of time working with the IHSA to ensure the fairness and safety of high school athletics.

I admired the way that Pat took care of Becky during her illness until he himself was felled by disease. I pray that we all might be comforted in our grief by the words of Jesus to Martha. Lazarus, her brother, has died and Jesus reminds her that Lazarus will rise from the dead. Martha says she knows he will rise when the dead are raised at the end of time. Jesus says to her: 25 "I am the one who brings people back to life, and I am life itself. Those who believe in me will live even if they die. 26 Everyone who lives and believes in me will never die. Do you believe that?" We believe that Pat has been raised with all the faithful of God from the dead. Jesus is the Resurrection and the Life. This is our comfort: because Jesus lives, we live also. 
FALL FESTIVAL THURSDAY, OCTOBER 12th

Also surviving are two step daughters, Deana & Nick Keller of Florence, MT, Danielle & Tim Francis of Ellisville, MO; a step-son, Christopher Carr of Mattoon; four step-grandchildren, Riley Francis, Kinsey Francis, Dagay Keller and Paul Keller; he was like a father to Brian and Tara Kieninger of Springfield, Christopher and Susie Strong of Forsyth, MO, and like a grandfather to Mia and Seth Kieninger, Corgan and Carlie Strong; one sister Shirley Wells and her husband Leonard of KY; mother-in-law, Alice Burrows of Wood River; sisters-in-law, Celeste Vincelett of McDonough, GA, Betty Sims and her husband Tom of Bunker Hill, Patricia Magary of AZ; brothers-in-Law, Richard Jones and his wife Juan of Baytown, TX, Leonard Jones and his wife Linda, of Friendsville, TN, Richard Feyerabend and his wife Patricia of Marshville, MO; many nieces and nephews.

Besides his parents and first wife Connie, Richard was preceded in death by a brother, Elmer Carr.

An Army veteran, Richard served during the Vietnam War from 1966 to 1969. Richard was a life time member of DAV, the Christian Motorcycle Association, the Hollister Lighthouse Church in Hollister, MO, and the Wood River Kiwanis Club. He rode with several motorcycle groups in the greater Alton area.

2 Corinthians 4: ⁶ The God who said, "Out of darkness the light shall shine!" is the same God who made his light shine in our hearts, to bring us the knowledge of God's glory shining in the face of Christ. ⁷ Yet we who have this spiritual treasure are like common clay pots, in order to show that the supreme power belongs to God, not to us. ⁸ We are often troubled, but not crushed; sometimes in doubt, but never in despair; ⁹ there are many enemies, but we are never without a friend; and though badly hurt at times, we are not destroyed. ¹⁰ At all times we carry in our mortal bodies the death of Jesus, so that his life also may be seen in our bodies. ¹¹ Throughout our lives we are always in danger of death for Jesus' sake, in order that his life may be seen in this mortal body of ours. ¹² This means that death is at work in us, but life is at work in you.

Although the Bible underlines the fragility of life, we are in shock at the suddenness of Richard Carr's death. While we want to celebrate Richard's life today, the primary emotion we feel is raw, numbing pain.

What we find so difficult is that Richard is the very person upon whom we would have leaned to see us through. For Sue, Richard was her rock. For others, Richard was a cherished friend and we feel cheated because our relationship with him upon this earth has ended.

If we try to make it through this time of grief depending upon our own understanding and strength, we're sunk. There is no satisfying answer to our cries of "Why Richard? Why now?" On our own, we will never rise above the flood of our tears.

We need to preach Jesus Christ as Lord. Jesus—the One who took upon himself our death—so we might live His life. We preach what we know to be true: **We know that God, who raised the Lord Jesus to life, will also raise us up with Jesus and take us, together with you, into his presence.** While there are many things, we don't know. We know that Richard has been raised to join those saints gathered around the throne of God; singing God's praises forever and ever.

We are common clay pots. The Styrofoam of the first century. Turned out quickly upon the potter's wheel, these pots often had cracks or flaws that caused them to break. Or they were dropped by clumsy servants. Common clay pots were never destined for a long life. And, neither are we.

Still, within each of us burns the divine light of Jesus Christ. A light so powerful that we see it clearly within these fragile bodies of ours. And, unlike our bodies that light is eternal. In fact, as our bodies are diminished by disease and simply aging the light of Jesus burns ever brighter within us. Nothing on this earth, above this earth, or below this earth may extinguish that divine light.

So when these common clay pots—these physical bodies of ours—shatter into a thousand pieces upon our death, we aren't left with a mess. Stripped of our outer shell, the light of Jesus is seen in all its purity and holiness. I offer all of us this assurance and comfort today: this divine light—not the common clay pot that houses the light upon this earth—is the essence of us. The light is who Richard is. And, this light is eternal.

Richard Carr's light still shines. It shines in the ways his love has shaped and molded our lives. It shines as we share with our children the lessons he taught us. Richard Carr's light still shines because Jesus is the Resurrection and the Life. Those who believe in Jesus even though they die, yet shall they live.

We ask you to please pray for Sue and for Richard's entire family. His sudden death has been a great shock to everyone. Pastor Daryl

- You can also provide financial contributions via securities, real estate, personal properties, or an estate gift by contacting the church office or Jim Herndon.



2nd Year "Mission Possible" Report...

Believe it or not we are almost at the end of year two of our church renovation project, "Mission Possible." Through your generosity and prayerful diligence, we have been able to complete almost all our original goals including the following;

The church has a new heating and air conditioning system, new lighting and ceilings throughout the church, new main floor carpeting, fresh painted walls, a security system including instant access to law enforcement, if ever needed. Bell tower windows were replaced with more efficient and attractive windows. Recently, we purchased a more up-to-date and functional church vehicle. We corrected damaged window sills in several areas of the church. We performed a major renovation of floors, lighting, window coverings, a cracked basement wall, air conditioning replacement, entry doors, tv room ceiling and flooring in the senior parsonage as well as a new roof. We replaced the church garage guttering and repaired a damaged wall in the sr. parsonage garage. We are putting the finishing touches on a new "all-call" system for telecommunication to church members. Trustees also picked up on several odds and ends throughout the process while at the same time tackling previously unknown areas of deficiency including a new bell tower roof, new a/c in parsonage (previously mentioned) and (upcoming) new windows in the fellowship hall, kitchen, basement rest rooms, and choir practice room.

Only **two significant projects remain** to be reviewed by Trustees for possible implementation including a new automated front sign and renovation of the front handicapped parking area. Potential cost for the two projects is about \$50,000. Trustees are currently trying to determine whether we can afford to follow through with these projects or whether to relegate them to a list of future needs.

As we near the end of the actual physical work on the Mission Possible campaign we are happy to say Trustees have worked diligently to be good stewards of your generous donations by limiting, to date, our actual indebtedness to \$159,000 of which \$71,000 is an internal loan from our St. Paul Endowment Fund. The remainder will be owed to First Mid America Credit Union.

Thank you again for your prayers and your generosity as we have all endeavored to continue our mission to make St. Paul UMC a viable and effective place of ministry in our community and beyond.

New Church Vehicle...

As of this report the "Mission Possible" project has replaced our used 20-year van with a newer used vehicle (2014) which provides a more aesthetic and functional vehicle for use by the various church groups. The van was purchased from Southern Bus & Mobility Company out of Breese, Illinois. The new vehicle is a 15-passenger van (which allows for a regular

driver's license to drive rather than a CDL) with storage in the rear of the vehicle, a raised roof (turtle top) for head clearance inside and a main aisle making the vehicle easier to transverse. Trustees have decided that the offer on trade-in was so minimal that we will look for another religious group or organization in need of a vehicle and donate our old van to that group. Kind of paying it forward if you will!

It is important for everyone to remember that this is the church's van and therefore open to use by groups and organizations within the church. As such, the obvious expectation is that if a group uses the van that the responsible parties will take care of cleaning up the van, removing trash, etc. after each trip. Furthermore, to make sure that if there is a problem of any kind with the vehicle it is to be reported, in a timely manner, to the church office.

We hope that in the future everyone will have the opportunity to enjoy this vehicle and as a result we can grow our ministry into yet unknown areas.
