

"I'd had a phrase banging around in my brain for some time: *My life exists to put Christ at the PULSE of a generation.* I knew that's what God was calling me to do." Nick Hall

What began as an effort to bring spiritual renewal to a college campus in North Dakota has spread across the nation to other campuses and churches. Nick Hall and his friends were Christians-trying to live faithful lifestyles—but the passion that should be burning in their bones was lacking. Hall says: "My buddies and I looked inside the church and saw disunity, hypocrisy, and way too many people bored out of their minds, and we looked outside the church and saw despair that was leading to self-harm, substance abuse, and suicide. Something had to give." So, they prayed for wisdom and change upon their campus.

With the blessing of a professor, Nick Hall developed for a class assignment a fifteen-page proposal and a fifteen-minute presentation on some product or service that he thought could impact the campus. After explaining the devastating trends on campus, he proposed the answer: Jesus' invitation for us to start again. To reset.

Hall sent his proposal to friends who joined him in founding PULSE on campus. Their first efforts were to involve as many people as possible in prayer groups. Soon they had 20 prayer groups that met every morning and every evening of the week and some afternoons. The next was to sponsor a spiritual renewal event that attracted 5,000 students the first year and 10,000 the next. The reason I mention this isn't because we are striving to replicate the response that Nick Hall received on his campus in North Dakota.

I want to remind you that we are spending an entire month exploring what a spiritual reset might involve for us and to invite you to get involved. We all wish we had a reset button that would allow us to start over. While we may not have a physical button to push, we have the forgiveness of Jesus Christ that enables us to begin life anew.

Hall observes in his book, *Reset*, that he has met people across the nation seeking a reset. He says: "They are dog-tired from pretending they have it all together, they are disillusioned by their letdown of a life, and they are desperate for a solution that works. They need a do-over in their marriage. Or in their finances. Or in their relationships with their friends. They need a do-over at work, at school, at home, or in their thought life. Their habits are distracting them. Their priorities are paralyzing them. Their self-talk is beating them down. And by the time they are standing there in front of me, they've reached what is now a very fraved end of their rope."

If this describes you, we invite you to join us for the sermon series, Reset. Last week, I spoke about Jesus, Reset My Heart. You will find that talk on the Awakening page. From March 4-18, I will discuss: Jesus, Reset My Mind; Jesus, Reset My Voice; and Jesus, Reset My Hands. For those desiring to delve deeper into these topics, a small group is meeting on Sundays at 5 p.m. and Mondays at 6:30 p.m. The small group

There is an old joke: *How many psychiatrists does it take to* **CIT** IS A TIME TO change a light bulb? One, but the light bulb has to want to change. Life may be different for us, but we have to want to change...with Jesus' help. That is the assumption at the core of *Reset.* Make this a season of significant, glorious change in your life. Our 8:15 a.m. service is a traditional service with hymns played on our beautiful pipe organ by Rhonda Griffin. The Pastor leads worship clothed in a robe and stole. Communion is usually celebrated on the first Sunday of the month.

WAKING Our 10:30 a.m. service—Awakening—is based upon this verse from 2 Chronicles 16:9: "God's eyes range from to and fro throughout the Earth looking to strengthen the person that would bend their heart toward Him." 

THE HEALING POWER OF FAITH:

Science Explores Medicine's Last Great Frontier by Harold Koenig, M.D.

Healing can include dramatic, sudden physical cures, but is not confined to the 'miraculous' or the spectacular. Perhaps for most people, the healing power of **faith** involves a healing of the mind and emotions, the intangible spirit, and of relationships with others.

Faith can put physical illness beneath us, where it belongs, return dominion to us, and give us power to live victorious and fulfilling lives.

People who regularly attend church service, pray individually, and read the Bible are 40% less likely to have diastolic hypertension than those who seldom participate in these religious activities.

People who attend religious services regularly may have stronger immune systems than their less religious counterparts. Those who never or rarely attend church or synagogue tend to have the highest levels of Interleukin-6, perhaps indicating a weakened or overactive immune system.

People who attend church regularly are hospitalized less often and leave the hospital sooner than people who never or rarely participate in religious services. The deeper a person's religious faith, the less likely he or she is to be crippled by depression during and after hospitalization for physical illness.

Religious people have healthier lifestyles. According to one study, people who attend church at least weekly have about 1/3 the rate of alcohol abuse and are about 1/3 as likely to smoke than those who seldom participate in congregational worship.

Religious youth show significantly lower levels of drug and alcohol abuse, premature sexual involvement, and criminal delinquency than their non-religious peers. They are also less likely to express suicidal thoughts or make actual attempts on their lives

Elderly people with a deep, personal religious faith have a stronger sense of well-being and life satisfaction than their less religious peers.

Religious people live longer and physically healthier lives than their non-religious counterparts.

What I appreciated most about Chuck is that life gave him opportunities to complain or to be bitter or angry, but instead Chuck spoke of God's blessings. He told how easily he could have died in the accident where he lost his arm. And, yet he lived and went on to live a good life. Several years ago, when he had the heart problem at DePaul Hospital it was touch and go for a while. He emerged on the other side of surgery testifying once more to the goodness of our great God and the power of his healing.

And, within the last year our conversations were filled with thanksgiving: for his family, for his friends, for his church, and his faith. During every visit, we shared moments of laughter. I never left Rosalie's and Chuck's home feeling depressed because every time Chuck shared how abundantly God had blessed him.

That's why I wanted to read today those verses from Psalm 145.

³ The LORD is great, and he should be highly praised. His greatness is unsearchable. ⁴ One generation will praise your deeds to the next. Each generation will talk about your mighty acts.

Chuck did not hesitate to talk about God's great deeds and miraculous acts to his children, grandchildren and great grandchildren. His bedrock faith was always a comfort and help to us in every time of trial.
