He lived a long and vibrant life. As he lay on his death bed and he knew he was soon to pass on to an eternity, his last words were these: "Best of all, God; you are with us."

Best of all, God; you are with us. Whether at the end of a journey like Wesley, or at the beginning of a journey, like we are; God is with us. He will guide and bless as we continue to serve him. God will be with us all the way!

Starting on **July 8th**, we are beginning a sermon series. We will study The Book of Ruth over a period of four weeks. The title of the series is: *"Road Trip."* In it we will explore what God has to say about the spiritual journey of a group of ordinary, good-hearted people. They experience loss, bitterness, and uncertainty, but; despite their tragic circumstances, they find a way to be faithful and honorable as they walk with the Lord. The Book of Ruth has much to tell us about our relationship with God, relationships between men and women, and relationships with our neighbors.

"Lord, if it's you," Peter replied, "tell me to come to you on the water."

"Come," he said. Then Peter got down out of the boat, walked on the water and came toward Jesus. But when he saw the wind, he was afraid and, beginning to sink, cried out, "Lord, save me!" Immediately Jesus reached out his hand and caught him. "You of little faith," he said, "why did you doubt?" (Matthew 14:28-31)

### We Say Goodbye To Our Friend...

**David J. Hall**, 90, passed away at 2 p.m. Wednesday, May 30, 2018 at Integrity Health Care of Wood River. Born Aug. 12, 1927 in Bethalto, he was a son of Homer D. & Agnus M. (Gadville) Hall.

David was a veteran of both the U.S. Army and Navy. He worked for a time at Amoco Oil in Wood River, but spent most of his life as a self-employed contractor.

Survivors include a son and daughter-in-law, Gerald & Janet Hall of Rosewood Heights; a daughter, Connie Hall of Klondike, TX; 6 grandchildren, 10 great grandchildren, and 6 great-great grandchildren; and two brothers and their wives, Norman & Mary Hall and Jack & Cheryl Hall, all of TX; and his friend & former wife, Marjorie Hall of Wood River.

He was preceded in death by his parents; a daughter, Bonnie Hall; a son, Dennis Hall; a granddaughter, Carrie Armendarez; and his sister, Alberta Blackard.

When I visited David on the day before he died, I read these words from Psalm 121:

I look up to the mountains—does my help come from there?

My help comes from the LORD, who made heaven and earth!

During our darkest times, we are not left to muddle through upon our own. We are promised that God is with us as companion and guide. God is an ever present help in our time of need. In the book of Philippians Chapter 4, Paul offers these words of hope: "I've learned by now to be quite content whatever my circumstances. I'm just as happy with little as with much, with much as with little. I've found the recipe for being happy whether full or hungry, hands full or hands empty. Whatever I have, wherever I am, I can make it through anything in the One who makes me who I am. I can make it through anything in the One who makes ense of today on your own...if you try to get through today on your own...you will fail. We need help. We need God.

Paul understands this isn't a cotton candy world. He's already been through shipwrecks, beatings, and still he has survived. In fact, he is sitting in a prison cell in Rome as he writes to the church at Philippi. Paul understands that he will never see the great people in that church again for his death is quite near. Paul knows the score. No matter how strong our self-will...how positive our attitude, we cannot win on our own. Death will defeat us every time. It will destroy all we hold near and dear. It will eliminate all that infuses our life with meaning. Our only hope is if the Resurrection is true. If Christ was not raised from the dead, then death has won. And these words I read from Psalm 121 to David are false:

"The LORD himself watches over you! The LORD stands beside you as your protective shade.

<sup>6</sup> The sun will not harm you by day, nor the moon at night.

<sup>7</sup> The LORD keeps you from all harm and watches over your life.

<sup>8</sup> The LORD keeps watch over you as you come and go, both now and forever."

If Christ were still lying stone cold in that tomb, then He could not watch over David or any of us. For a dead Lord is unable to penetrate the veil of death. As Paul proclaims in I Corinthians 15: "But the truth is that Christ has been raised from death, as the guarantee that those who sleep in death will also be raised.<sup>21</sup> For just as death came by means of a man, in the same way the rising from death comes by means of a man.<sup>22</sup> For just as all people die because of their union with Adam, in the same way all will be raised to life because of their union with Christ." No longer do we live in the fear of death. Now, we live out of the living hope of the resurrection.

Once upon a time it may have mattered to Paul whether he lived in luxury or poverty. It may have mattered whether his stomach was empty or full. It may have mattered whether he lived in Rome or Jerusalem. Once those things may have mattered but no more. Paul was not even concerned whether he lived or died. Whatever happened, Paul's life was securely held in the loving hands of his Lord.

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### We Say Goodbye To Our Friend...

**Mitchell "Mitch" Leon Voorhees**, 58, passed away Thursday, May 31, 2018 at his home. Born Apr. 3, 1960 in Alton, he was a son of Thomas & Ruth (Boker) Voorhees of Rosewood Heights.

He worked as a diesel mechanic for most of his life. He loved to fish and had a love for animals.

In addition to his parents, he is survived by two daughters, Laura Voorhees & Tim Terrell of Belleville and Emily McCall & her husband Joseph of Kimberling City, MO; a granddaughter on the way; three sisters, Susan Chapman & her husband Rob of Alton, Jan Poore of Rosewood Heights, and Linda Voorhees of California; and two brothers, Steve

Voorhees of Wood River and Mike Voorhees & his wife Ricci of Rosewood Heights.

Mitch Voorhees died suddenly. Here is part of what I shared with those attending the Celebration of his life: None of us had planned to be here today, celebrating the life of Mitchell Voorhees. To be honest, we would rather be anyplace but here. Although Ecclesiastes tells us there is a time for every purpose under heaven, we can't help but feel now is not the right time for this. We are still in shock.

As we gather today, I ask us to consider these three questions:

- What gives us hope?
- What gives us help?
- Where does our hope and help come from?

**WHAT GIVES US HOPE?** Many people in this world find hope in the circumstances of their life. If things are going well, they are filled with hope. If things are falling apart, they are plunged into despair.

Paul lifts up the example of Abraham who despite his aging body believes in God's promise that his descendants will be as numerous as the stars in the sky and the grains of sand in the desert. Paul lifts up Abraham as an example for our faith, saying: Even when there was no reason for hope, Abraham kept hoping—believing that he would become the father of many nations...Abraham never wavered in believing God's promise. In fact, his faith grew stronger, and in this he brought glory to God. HE WAS FULLY CONVINCED THAT GOD IS ABLE TO DO WHATEVER HE PROMISES. Abraham's faith was rewarded by the birth of their son, Isaac, to Sara in their old age.

What I appreciate about our faith is its realism. In Hebrews it talks about the saints, how some were delivered from the lions, given strength to defeat their enemies in battle. There were others who were jailed, persecuted, stoned to death. For whatever reason, these saints were not given deliverance from the tough circumstances of their life. Instead, it says: THEY PLACED THEIR HOPE IN A BETTER LIFE AFTER THE **RESURRECTION.** 

A faith centered around a crucified Messiah understands there are times of defeat as well as victory. Times when we remember Jesus told his disciples: **Here on earth you will have many trials and sorrows. But take heart, because I have overcome the world.** Today is a time when our hope arises not out of the circumstances of our life but only out of the reality of the resurrection.

WHAT GIVES US HELP? There are times in our life when we wonder whether God is listening to our cries for help, when we wonder whether He cares about the distress of His people. In Psalm 28, King David laments: I pray to you, O Lord, my rock. Do not turn a deaf ear to me. For if you are silent, I might as well give up and die. So He tells them He is sending a Helper—the Holy Spirit—who will never leave them. While Jesus cannot be with them in the flesh, He will be with them in Spirit. He promises: No, I will not abandon you as orphans—I will come to you. Soon the world will no longer see me, but you will see me. Since I live, you also will live. WHEN I AM RAISED TO LIFE AGAIN, YOU WILL KNOW THAT I AM IN MY FATHER, AND YOU ARE IN ME, AND I AM IN YOU.

As with hope, our ultimate help is not within ourselves but solely in the resurrection. In life, we need to lean upon a power greater than our own and that power is the Resurrection.

FINALLY, WHERE DOES OUR HOPE AND OUR HELP COME FROM? Psalm 62:5-6 says: Let all that I am wait quietly before God, for my hope is in him. He alone is my rock and my salvation, my fortress where I will not be shaken. Psalm 121:1-2 announces: I look up to the mountains—does my help come from there? My help comes from the Lord, who made heaven and earth.

Dr. Arthur John Gossip, a Scottish minister, was shaken to the core of his being by the sudden death of his beloved wife. #### LET'S GET FIRED UP...MOVING FORWARD BY PAUL BLACK

The Illinois Great Rivers Annual Conference gathered around the theme, Let's Get Fired Up: Moving Forward, June 7-9, 2018, at the Peoria Civic Center.

A fairly light legislative agenda enabled conferees to focus a great deal of time on the Our Conference, Our Kids campaign for the spiritual care programs of the five child welfare agencies – The Baby Fold, Chaddock, Cunningham Children's Home, Lessie Bates Davis

Neighborhood House and Spero Family Services. The campaign's chair, the Rev. Dr. J. Keith Zimmerman and the chaplains and staff responsible for spiritual life at each agency told stories of children being impacted by this vital ministry.

An offering of \$51,906.21 was collected during Friday's Morning Manna, pushing the campaign to nearly \$400,000 of its \$2.5 million goal. The campaign was approved by the 2016 Annual Conference session and officially launched at the 2017 Annual Conference.

Other special offerings included: \$6,396.69 by conference laity for the John Kofi Asmah School in West Point, Liberia; \$7,165.24 for the Tom Brown Scholarship at Wiley College; and \$8,113.79 for the Bishop's Ordinands Trip to England that will benefit 2017 and 2018 ordinands embarking on a Wesley Heritage pilgrimage.

The General Board of Global Ministries presented two awards to the Conference. The IGRC was in the Top 10 among U.S. annual conferences in 2017 in two categories – giving for missionary support and giving for international disaster response.

A Mission Fair was held on Friday evening following the conclusion of business, spotlighting the missions and ministries of the annual conference with several interactive experiences.

Legislatively, the conference approved an increase in the health insurance allowance paid to full-time pastors from \$15,000 to \$17,500 to help offset premium increases projected for 2019. In addition, the conference set minimum clergy salaries for 2019 at \$43,382 for clergy in full connection, associate members and provisional elders; and \$39,809 for full-time local pastors.

It was reported that all three conference pension funds are fully funded and no increase was needed in the Clergy Retirement Security Program (CRSP) contribution for 2019 due to good financial returns. No change was also needed for the defined benefits portion of the CRSP plan, which stands at \$5,700 per year for full-time pastors; \$4,275 for  $\frac{3}{4}$  time pastors; \$2,850 for  $\frac{1}{2}$  time pastors. Pastors at  $\frac{1}{4}$  time are not eligible.

Retirees under the pre-1982 pension plan will see a 2 percent increase to \$778 per active year for 2019.

The 2019 budget of \$12,141,878 was approved – a decrease of \$94,897 or 0.78 percent.

The conference approved the discontinuance of six congregations – Bath UMC; Cisne UMC; Clay's Prairie UMC; Hamburg UMC; Jacksonville Brooklyn UMC; and Nye Chapel UMC – with a combined 893 years of ministry.

Four elders and a deacon were ordained. Seven provisional elders and one provisional deacon were commissioned.

A total of 30 pastors with a combined 933 years of service retired.

Membership stands at 122,522 in 2017, down 1,288 from 2016. Worship attendance is 53,295, down 265. Church school attendance stands at 17,034, up 191. Attendance in other small groups and ongoing classes are at 2,636, up 91. Professions or reaffirmations of faith for 2017 is 3,464, up 2.

The 2019 annual conference session will be held June 6-8, 2019, at the Peoria Civic Center in Peoria, IL.
