People of Infinite Worth,

Two men travel the road between Jerusalem and Emmaus; their gait is slow and their heads are bowed in sorrow. They speak in desperate whispers about the man called Jesus whom they supposed was the Messiah. "We thought he was the One", they lamented. "We believed he was the Son of God who was going to free our people from bondage. Yet we just witnessed his execution on a hill outside of Jerusalem, how can this be?" In subdued misery, they trudge home to Emmaus.

Seemingly out of nowhere, a stranger meets them; they invite him to walk with them. They are amazed, because; he claims ignorance about the execution that had just taken place. Who is he, and how has he not heard? As they continue their journey home, they tell him of the events that had just transpired. But when they finish informing him of recent events, *he begins to teach them* about the scriptures. His words illuminate their understanding of God's Word. Inwardly, they marvel at his wisdom and powerful teaching. Who is he; they wonder?

The two men arrive home and invite their companion to have supper and spend the night, before he continues his journey. The stranger agrees, but he does something so odd; he is their guest, yet he usurps the role of host, picks up the bread and blesses it. As he breaks the bread, the two men recognize him; he is the Lord! In the exact moment they realize his identity, he disappears! In that instant they know with all their heart that Jesus is alive. The two men are so energized, they run the seven mile distance back to Jerusalem to spread the Good News that Jesus the Christ is alive!

I am sure you recognize this story from the Book of Luke 24:13-32. It illustrates the way Jesus is always present and how he wants to teach us. His purpose in teaching is to give us hope for the future and to motivate us to trust him and make his name known! The Walk to Emmaus is not just a story from the Bible, but it is also a community of Christian men and women who seek to spread the hope of salvation and to energize Christians in their faith walk.

I have been involved in the Walk to Emmaus community (WtE) for over ten years. I have served as spiritual director for several walks and I can tell you, the participants are blessed and amazed by what they learn. You may have heard of people going on a WtE; the people who attend the first time are called pilgrims. Thankfully, pilgrims do not need to walk (or run) seven miles. A WtE is a 72 hour spiritual retreat; it is a time away from the day-to-day life. It is time of learning and reflection. Some call it a 72 hour short course in Christianity. Pilgrims are reminded of God's love for them through talks they hear, the activities they experience, and by the actions of the workers.

Typically, a WtE begins on a Thursday evening and concludes Sunday afternoon/evening. The men's walk and the women's walk occur on separate weekends and they are separate from each other; the walks are held in the fall and the spring. The idea behind a WtE is to inspire, challenge, and equip Christian men and women to grow in their faith – to renew and re-energize our churches, homes, and places of work through loving service in the name of Jesus!

If attending a WtE appeals to you, or if you have questions, I would be delighted to talk to you about it. Our next walks will be held: Men's walk - September 6th – 9th and the Women's walk September 13th – 16th. A WtE can be a life-changing experience that brings new friendships and a deeper faith in Jesus Christ. I pray you will consider attending!



### Sundays at St. Paul in AUGUST 8:15 & 10:30 A.M. Services

Our 8:15 a.m. worship service is held in the amphitheater in the park during the summer. Wear casual clothes; bring your coffee and lawn chair. In case of rain, the service is held in the sanctuary.



Our 10:30 a.m. service—Awakening—is based upon this verse from 2 Chronicles 16:9: "God's eyes range from to and fro throughout the Earth looking to strengthen

the person that would bend their heart toward Him." The preaching focuses upon life lessons from the Bible. Music is played by a worship band. Words to the songs are projected on the screen or are available on the entryway table. Communion is celebrated at the end of every service. The intent of both worship services is to connect, to reconnect, and to draw people into a closer connection with Jesus Christ. ### **Activating the Healing Power of God's Word**

"Your words were found and I ate them. And Your word became to me the joy and rejoicing of my heart, for I am called by Your name, O Lord God of Hosts" (*Jeremiah 15:16*).

It is encouraging to find that many of the passages of Scripture that deal with healing point us to the healing power of God's Word. The reason it is so encouraging is that we have the Word of God in our hands and so can plead with God to fulfill these promises in our lives by faith

and the work of His Spirit. Solomon counsels us to cling to God's Word in our hearts (Prov. 3:1).

The mercy and truth that God speaks forth to you from the Word are designed to work in you a life that will "Trust in the Lord with all your heart, and lean not on your own understanding; in all your ways acknowledge Him, and He will direct your paths" (*Prov. 3:5-6*).

The truth embraced and lived is health. "It will be health to your body, and strength to your bones" (*Prov. 3:8*). The Message paraphrases it like this: "Your body will glow with health, your very bones will vibrate with life!" The ways of God marked out for you in His Word are said to be "ways of pleasantness, and ... peace. She is a tree of life to those who take hold of her, and happy is everyone who retains her" (*Prov. 3:17-18,* MEV).

Embracing God's truth activates all that is good, all that is honoring to God, and all that is concerned with true joy. Here is how you find the satisfaction, contentment and appreciation of God and His created gifts and joys. By doing so you implement what God calls you to and you know the fulfillment of God's promises. You will know the joys of serving your wife or husband, family and community (*Ps. 112*). By embracing God's truth, you will know the love of God poured out into your heart (*Rom. 5:5*). You will know how to deal with fear: "He shall not be afraid of evil tidings; his heart is fixed, trusting in the Lord" (*Ps. 112:7*).

It is life renewed to enjoy daily the majesty of God in appreciation of all His gifts to us and callings that rest upon us in a life with anointed purpose.

The healing that comes from the Word of God is described in Nehemiah. The captives who returned from Babylon gathered to hear the Word of God read and explained. The effect of that day was to teach them that "the joy of the Lord is your strength" (*Neh. 8:10c*).

The message of the healing power of God's Word is found throughout the Bible. *Psalm 107:20* says, "He sent His word and healed them and delivered them from their destruction." God sends His Word to us. We are often jarred off-center when illness comes our way; we easily get discouraged and flounder in a disoriented perspective of our lives.

Prayer is the opposite of self-reliance. Joy is the opposite of self-pity. A thankful spirit is the opposite of cynicism. These negative dispositions are the things that destroy you; joy, prayer and gratitude are the graces that enliven you and keep you living in the presence of God who is your only source of lasting and satisfying peace. When this new principle dwells in you, you see the folly and vanity of life and understand that everything is contingent upon divine goodness and grace.

When your heart is infused with God's Word, you observe a wholeness and balance, and understand that the love and joy you experience today, and the appreciation you can offer in worship now, are elements in your eternal life with Him. This is healing.






## Teams from the BATTLE OF THE CHURCHES for Capture The Flag! St. Paul UMC VS. East Alton FUMC! It was great fun!
