Greetings people of infinite worth!

It seems like a year since I have been able to see your faces in worship! I miss your smiles, hugs, and handshakes. I have been paying close attention to what Governor Pritzker has been reporting about our COVID-19 status. He has a tough job! He is taking his responsibility very seriously and I respect him for it. It is a delicate balance between public health and our economy. Let's keep him in our prayers as he makes vital decisions about how and when to open-up the state again. I pray also that our fellow Illinoisans will be wise, caring, and compassionate regarding how to care for our neighbors by wearing masks and maintaining appropriate distance.

I cannot speak for the governor or our Bishop, but it appears that we may be able to meet for worship starting in June. Please do not take this as Gospel; it is more about my hopes than my knowledge. In spite of my dismay, I have taken advantage of the beautiful weather and the extra free time by walking. My time walking is filled with joy because I see children out riding on their bikes. The trees are displaying their spring green foliage. I see elderly folks sitting in front of their homes just waiting to smile and wave at someone for that human contact they need. People are working in their yards, washing their cars, and others are just like me, walking. While I walk, I am reminded of God's promises coming true; spring is a reminder that God makes all things new again.

The Lord Is My Portion

It's ironic that the more we long for Jesus — to know him intimately, love him fully — the more we are deeply satisfied. Most things in life don't work that way. If for example you cultivate a craving for chocolate, you're likely to keep eating it and gain weight or get a stomach ache!



Craving becomes a big problem if what you're longing for is acceptance or self-worth, and you keep striving to achieve it. You can never accomplish enough. Never be attractive enough. Never keep all people happy with you. Many addictions and sadnesses come out of craving for things other than Jesus.

Is the Lord your Portion?

Many times the Psalmist says, "The Lord is my portion." For instance, he prays, "Whom have I in heaven but you, Lord, and earth has nothing I desire besides you. My flesh and my heart may fail, but God is the strength of my heart and my portion forever" (Psalm 73:26-26). In other words, "Lord Jesus, I wouldn't even want to be in heaven if you weren't there and this earth has nothing that satisfies me except you. My own strength and abilities often fail, but with you living in my heart, I have all the power I need and more joy than I can contain."

What if this prayer were really true of you and me? What would it be like to be the kind of person who continually thirsted for Jesus and found delight in him? Imagine if the way you do your work, relate to people, spend your free time, and even the things you think about were an expression of your love for Jesus. I'm not talking about perfection, but growing towards it, by God's grace, little-by-little.

You can find more Joy in Jesus!

To live by the words "The Lord is my portion" requires reprioritizing other pursuits and desires, including good ones. It also requires soul training. Longing for Jesus is the only way to participate in and naturally share with others "the life that is truly life" (1 Timothy 6:19). A wonderful way to cultivate this devotion to the Lord is to pray the Psalms. We can "take heart" from the Psalmist, praying his prayers to absorb his whole-hearted love for God.

A prayer for letting God be my Portion:

Dear Heavenly Father, When I am afraid, you are the strength of my heart. When I feel incomplete, you are my portion. Thank you, Lord, for being more than enough to satisfy my every need. Thank you for comforting me, loving me, and being my portion forever. In Jesus' name, Amen.



Don't forget to invite your family and friends who do not normally attend worship at St. Paul to watch the services online. In this way, we can invite others into the love of Christ.




2020 EASTER CANTATA

DON'T FEAR THE ZOOM

By now, many of us have heard about Zoom meetings. What is a Zoom meeting? It is a meeting that takes place over the internet using a particular program. Zoom is the name of the computer program that allows people to "meet" together without actually being in the same room. It makes use of your computer/laptop camera and microphone. In a Zoom meeting, we can see one another and hear each other talking even though we are in different locations.

Using Zoom is quite easy. The first step would be to download the program on your computer. It is free to meeting participants. The host, or the one who is organizing the meeting, has the option to use the free version of Zoom, or pay a nominal monthly fee to use it. The host schedules a time for the meeting and sends an online invitation to everyone who is invited. A few minutes before the meeting starts, the guests follow the link from the invitation. It is important for the guests to be able to use their camera and microphone on their computer/laptop. When the host admits the guests, the entire group can see and hear each other. It reminds me of the opening sequence from the TV show, The Brady Bunch. Everybody is visible in their little square of the screen.

I have been to numerous meetings using an online program. I have met with Bishop Beard, our District Superintendent, my Clergy Women's group, and Joe & I had our Easter "family gathering" online. Meeting online is not the perfect answer, but when distance, or weather, or pandemic throw a wrench into face to face meetings, online meetings are a great option.

For those who are reading this article from your email, here is the link to download Zoom onto your device. https://zoom.us/download. If you are reading this from a paper copy, you can type the link into your browser. Either way, follow the directions and you will be ready to go. I anticipate that we will have Bible studies and perhaps other meetings using Zoom.

WHERE DO WE GO FROM HERE?

As we consider a return to group worship, there are several issues we need to prayerfully and carefully consider. We cannot go back to "business as usual" when doing so might endanger our more vulnerable members. Here are some considerations for best practices as we go forward. I don't have answers for them all; our response as a church will depend on what Governor Pritzker and Bishop Beard recommend.

<u>Seating</u> – If social distancing requirements continue, we will need to discuss options. Perhaps blocking off every other row of pews to keep people further apart.

<u>Passing the Peace</u> – Do we dispense with this tradition, or find another way to greet one another? We were getting extremely creative just before COVID-19 pressed pause on our in-person services. Waving to one another from our seats may be the best option. **Greeters** – Will we have greeters/ushers? How will their task change?

<u>Communion</u> – We must change the way we offer communion. How exactly we proceed depends upon social distancing rules. However, the method of intinction, in which I tear off a piece of bread, give it to the recipient, and he or she dips it into the cup cannot continue. We will in all likelihood use the individual plastic communion cups and pieces of bread. Or we could use the pre-packaged individual cup and wafer packets. We will continue to consider our options.

<u>Vacation Bible School</u> – VBS has always been a time of large, fun gatherings; what do we do this year? How do we keep our children safe and still offer them a fun time to learn about Jesus? Our VBS director, Jamie Gwaltney, and I have been in conversation about if/how to offer VBS this year. We are poised to hold VBS if restrictions are lifted enough to make it possible. We are considering holding it outdoors and having only pre-wrapped snacks and drinks. This is still in the planning stage. We are awaiting direction from the powers that be.

<u>Offering</u> – Passing the offering plate may no longer a safe option. No one wants to be the last person to hold the plate. We could put greater emphasis on mailing our offerings or online giving or bill pay from a bank / credit union. Another option would be to have a box or basket in which people place their offerings as they enter the sanctuary. Maybe all of these things.

<u>Sanitizing the church</u> – Our Custodian, Joe Hanfelder, has been hard at work to sanitize door handles and other frequently touched surfaces. Naturally, we will want to continue this practice for the foreseeable future. Will we need to install hand sanitizer stations like they have in hospitals?

This list of things to consider is not exhaustive; in fact it is only a beginning. Some of the changes will be greeted with dismay. In truth, I am already dismayed as I consider some of them. We will be entering into another world when we begin to meet in-person again. Perhaps it is a good time for us all to remember that worshiping Jesus is not about our preferences, comfort, or wants. It is not about our favorite music or sitting in the same pew we have always occupied. While our greeting time has always been a source of warmth and joy for me and for many, we will need to drastically change or even eliminate it. Worship is not about us, and it never was. Worship time is when we gather to praise God, to ask forgiveness for our sins, and to give thanks for our blessings. Worship is a reminder of the great God whom we serve. Lamenting the changes is okay. Lamenting is Biblical; an entire book is dedicated to it. If you glance through the Psalms, you will find examples of lamenting everywhere. It is okay to be sad, but let's not get stuck there. Instead let's go forward with courage. Let's be open and curious about how we can worship together while still caring for one another and especially our most vulnerable. That's what Jesus was all about.

In the many phone calls I have made in recent weeks, I have heard about feelings of fear and loneliness that have crept into people's lives. Many are bored with isolation and long to embrace their loved ones. The irony is this, that their loved ones love them too much to embrace them, because to do so would put them at risk. What a strange world we live in, where keeping our distance is a sign of love and a desire to protect. In many of the phone conversations, people are feeling supported by the love and care their family and friends have lavished on them. Despite the loneliness, they feel blessed and well-cared for.

For those who have not been able to view our worship services on-line, please know that you are all on my mind and in my heart. I hope you have been able to access televised or radio worship services that have blessed you. As your pastor, I want you to contact me if you have prayer needs or just need to talk. Sometimes a phone call can help to calm loneliness. My cell phone number is: 618-406-5244. Please feel free to contact me. I am in prayer for your safety and well-being.

Many people have **DVD players** in their homes, even if they do not have a computer. Very often our TV's have built-in DVD players. It is possible for us to record our services onto a DVD and distribute them to members who would be interested in viewing the services in that way. Here is my prayer for you and for our world:


